Greetings and Happy Spring!

I've been thinking about a study I read recently that found that the number of friends you have at your place of worship has more to do with how happy you are than does theology or spirituality. The researchers discovered that people who have three to five close friends in their congregation are more likely to report they are extremely satisfied with their lives than those people who attend a place of worship but don't have close friends there.

This is not a particularly surprising finding, and I am glad to say there are many opportunities for you to begin to cultivate friendships or nurture the ones that

may have already sprouted here at UUCM. There is a book group, a women's study circle, a men's group, the quilters, a drumming circle, and a writer's group, as well as religious education classes offered several times a year. Certainly all of these social groups help people find and make friends.

But it has also been my experience that something unexpected happens when we engage in service to the community: we find that our connections to one another and our sense of belonging to the congregation as a whole have grown and deepened. Whether it is gardening side-by-side at the monthly work party, planning the next fun-fund-raising party, joining a committee or task force, or serving the guests at the Hospitality House, some of the best conversations tend to happen between people working toward a common goal.

If you are new to UUCM, have been coming for a while, or are a long-time member, there are more friends to be made. Let me or someone on the Membership Committee know if we can help you find a way to make more friends at church and become a happier person!

We have Faith in our Future.

If you have been watching this newsletter for the past few months, you will have seen that the Board has been concerned about the level of our income this fiscal year. It looks like we may very likely end with a deficit of close to \$13,000. It is true that we have enough in our reserves to handle this year, but we cannot continue to spend at this rate if our income does not increase.

This has been a tough economic year for a few of our families, and a few have had to come to Stewardship to say they would not be able to meet their full financial commitments. In addition, we have lost some treasured UUCM members. Life transitions such as aging, death and needing to relocate have affected us all.

Our Sunday collection plate is about 40% below what it has been in the past and we are no longer renting out the offices upstairs. All of these things contribute to our shortfall. Though I personally have confidence in our ability to bounce back in the upcoming fiscal year, we must be prudent and your Board of Trustees is exercising leadership in this arena. Some members who were in financial distress last year have begun to recover. This gives me hope.

Committee expenses have been on target with our budget. Our committees have done a superlative job of managing our beloved programs and not exceeding their budgets. However, and this is a big HOWEVER,

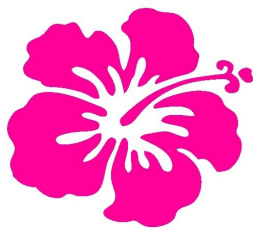
Notes From the President

Green Sanctuary Films

On Sunday, April 3, at 12:30 pm, the Green Sanctuary Committee focuses on water justice issues. We invite you to view 5 short films from the 2011 SYRCL Wild and Scenic Film Festival. The films last a total of 40 minutes.

The Story of Bottled Water

Why do Americans buy more than half a billion bottles of water every week when it already flows from the tap? The film explores the bottled water industry's attacks on tap water and its use of seductive, environmental-themed advertising to cover up the mountains of plastic waste it produces. 8 Min.

The Majestic Plastic Bag

Follow a plastic bag from supermarket to its final migratory destination in the Pacific Ocean gyre. Jeremy Irons narrates this mock nature documentary. 4 min.

The Coast is Clear

The Canadian government is considering a proposal from Enbridge for a 1,170 km pipeline from Alberta's tar sands to the coast of British Columbia. The pipeline would bring more than 200 crude oil tankers annually to this spectacular coast. With this kind of traffic, it will not be a question of IF a spill will happen, but WHEN. 3 min.

Farmed Salmon Exposed: The Global Reach of the Norwegian Salmon Farming Industry

Open net cage salmon farms dump their waste, toxins, parasites, and diseases directly into the surrounding marine environment, taking a heavy toll on wild fish and the ecosystems, indigenous and coastal communities that depend on them. 23 min.

Change for the Oceans

Free Range Studios created this 3D animation for Monterey Bay Aquarium's campaign to raise public awareness about the impacts global climate change is having on ocean life. We can slow the climate crisis by making little changes on our own and big changes together. Narrated by John Cleese. 2 min.

Eat Local

Resolve to buy food from small-scale local suppliers, so you can confirm that it's being raised in an earth-friendly and humane fashion and didn't burn up a lot of fossil fuels en route to you. Ask farmers and ranchers about their practices - learn the philosophy behind the food. (Bonus points for finding a dairy that offers returnable milk bottles.) Check out our local CSAs and decide to get involved in one or more of them THIS year. (Check with Green Sanctuary for details.) Use similar logic when dining out. Give your business to restaurants committed to cooking with local, organic ingredients.

As the Season for Peace and Nonviolence comes to an end I share the following from Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr: "The ultimate measure of a man (or woman) is not where he (or she) stands in moments of comfort and convenience, but where he (or she) stands at times of challenge and controversy."

UUAM Recipe

Beer Bread in under an hour

3 ½ C flour
3 T sugar
1 T baking powder
1 ½ t salt
12 oz beer
1 beaten egg (optional)

Heat oven to 375, with rack in lower middle position. Mix dry ingredients. Add beer and stir with fork until just blended. Turn dough onto floured surface, knead quickly to form a ball. Place bread on baking sheet and slit an x on top with sharp knife. Brush with beaten egg if desired. Bake 45 minutes or until golden brown.

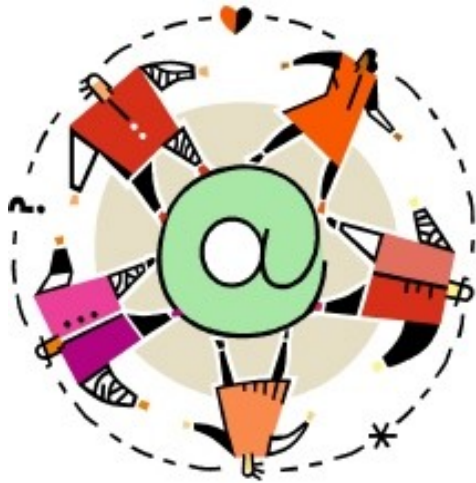
Astrology for Yourself
