REV. MEGHAN MUSINGS

Greetings UUCMers,

Having some time away from my responsibilities at UUCM these past few weeks has been wonderful and restful and rejuvenating. It is especially wonderful to know that while I am away the leaders of the congregation are keeping things running smoothly, and that when I step back in early August all will be well. I am filled with a deep sense of appreciation when I think of how hard so many people work towards making our congregation the radically welcoming, spiritually nurturing, and justice seeking community we strive to be together.

My colleague the Rev. Sean Dennison wrote a thoughtful piece about developing a culture of appreciation that I resonated with. He writes:

“It’s nearly impossible to create a congregational culture where people feel too appreciated. And it doesn’t take long to cultivate an attitude of noticing the good things that people do. Look around for someone doing something to

help out and say thank you. Hey, I saw you clear the table and make sure all the recycling got separated. Thanks! I think it’s wonderful that you give Walter a ride to church when you can. Your calm presence really made a difference in how that meeting went.”

Once you get used to it, a practice of appreciation is easy. It also benefits you as much as the people you appreciate. When you begin to focus on the good things, you see more of them. And the moments when people aren’t at their best are easier to handle because you can put them in context. When someone you know who is usually caring and level-headed makes a comment that was uncomfortably pointed, you might think, “I wonder what’s wrong...” instead of “how dare she say that to me?” And if you ask, you may find out something that helps you build a deeper and more caring relationship.

A culture of appreciation is a great preventative to so much of what ails churches. When people feel noticed and appreciated they rarely get to a place of feeling burned out.... And best of all, a culture of appreciation and a culture of complaining can’t coexist. And that makes church more fun.

Together we can create a culture of appreciation at UUCM this coming year. It starts when each of us look beyond what we are doing and notice the actions of loving care, both large and small, that other people are doing to tend to our building and our community. Looking forward to being with you all again very soon,

GREEN SANCTUARY GROWTH

This installment of Green Sanctuary Accomplishments continues the list of action items under the heading of Sustainable Living. The overall Green Sanctuary Action Plan addressed four general topics: Ministry and Celebration, RE, Sustainable Living, and Environmental Justice. Over the past several months this article has explained the history of Green Sanctuary and listed the action items and accomplishments in the areas of Ministry and Celebration, and RE. In March the Sustainable Living action item goals were listed. This month we will look at the steps taken to accomplish the fourth action item under the topic of Sustainable Living.

(4a)

Congregation member, Clarita Nolan, led the Women's Group in The Circle of Simplicity by Cecile Andrews four years ago but there were not enough people interested in forming a permanent Simplicity Circle to carry the idea forward beyond the four or five meetings it took to go through the book. Clarita is a great believer in the ideas of Simplicity Circle and will consider reintroducing the idea at some later date.

(4b)

- The UUCM women held a clothing swap party in 2008 and again in April 2009. These were very popular and successful. The intention is to hold at least one per year.

- A mending bee was held in April 2009. Kia Hatch headed the effort along with Anita Wald-Tuttle. It was very much appreciated by those who attended.

- Kia also headed a class in quilt making that met weekly until everyone in the group had completed a quilt. The finished quilts were displayed in the UUCM chapel for several months and served as inspiration for others to make rather than to buy such items.

- A group got together in 2008 to make mailing envelopes out of old nature calendars. It was a great lesson in recycling and the finished products were unique and beautiful. This gathering was lead by Barbara Barr.

- A group led by Robin Hart got together in 2008 to make reusable carry-bags which were distributed to Hospitality House.

- UUCM acquired many reusable carry-bags in 2008 and distributed them to its members.

All of these activities will be repeated as time allows and popularity demands.

Additional ideas are being formulated. We are always looking for suggestions on new ways to reuse, renew or recycle.

Cucumber and Melon Salad
Quick and cool for summer! Serves 4-6

1 medium cucumber, peeled
3 c cantaloupe chunks (about ½ of a medium melon)
10 large mint leaves, torn
1 T lemon or lime juice
1 T olive oil
¼ t ground chili powder
Cut cucumber lengthwise and discard seeds. Slice into ¼" pieces.
Toss in a bowl with the cantaloupe, mint, oil and juice.

Chill. Sprinkle with the chili powder before serving.

SUNDAY SERVICE SURVEYS CONCLUDE WITH EXCELLENT RESULTS

During this past May and June many UUCM members participated in after-service surveys that were designed to assess how the services are meeting member's needs. The Worship Committee, which is charged with planning and producing all Sunday services, wanted to know what people thought of service topics, the quality of the presentation, how the music supported the topic, how well the music was presented, and how well the overall flow and facilitation of the services went. In addition the Committee asked what was best and what most needed improvement about the different services. Finally suggestions were sought for future sermon topics. Thank you to those who completed a survey, and many of you did, enough so that we consider the results to be quite valid.

So what did we find out? Well, here is a summary of what you told us and it is mostly very good. Not everyone, but the vast majority felt, for the six services represented, that the topics were excellent, very useful and thought provoking and that the presentations were skillfully and clearly delivered, connecting with congregants. Almost everyone agreed completely that the music offered variety, supported the topic and demonstrated preparedness and skill on the part of the choir/musicians. Again, almost everyone felt the flow and facilitation of the various services was smooth and well coordinated. Not everyone agreed with these sentiments, but if a grade were issued you gave an overall mark of A to A- for each of the survey areas.

In addition we asked what you thought was best about each service and your responses included, "Pleasant smooth flow,"

Loving presenters," "Message that we all need to hear," "The depth of the message," "Good feelings of being part of this community," "The connection of the story to the sermon and a life theme," "It spoke to my heart," "The talk was inspiring and provided insights," "Based on a problem we all have struggles with." "It spoke to me in exactly the right way and time," "Made me think about issues I know little about," "Feeling of spiritual connectedness," "I enjoyed the discourse from members," and "The awareness of (once again) we are all part of this wonderful world."

To our question about the thing about each service that most needed improvement there were not many comments offered nor was there any clear agreement on any specific items. However, we have learned of a sprinkling of individual concerns, among others, about the public address system, providing time for Candles of Joy and Concern, acknowledgment of current holidays, and keeping topics and presentations concise and clear. Finally we asked for your suggestions for future sermon topics and you have offered some excellent ideas.

A big thank you to the Board of Trustees who helped with survey collection and to everyone who completed a survey. The Worship Committee expects to bring the surveys back once or twice each year for a month or two, during varying seasons, to assess how you like your Sunday services. In the mean time please seek out a member of your Worship Committee at any time with your comments.
