The vote has now been taken.

1000+ votes to keep our focus on white supremacy explicitly.

100+ votes for the proposal to take a broader focus.

Unitarian Universalism is in the midst of some remarkable turns, including this passionate collective commitment to face and challenge our own white supremacy and that of our communities and nation. These turns are rooted in faithfulness to UU values and grounded in the UUA's mission. They affect everything from the ways the UUA Board conducts its meetings and the way leadership is being shared, to an overall spirit that asks us not to let a focus on procedures keep us from the important work at hand and the depth and courage of our relationships. The turns are unfolding with the new younger and multi-cultured leadership across the UUA and the leadership of our new President, the Rev. Susan Frederick-Gray. All the turns are connected and I am encouraged.

If you don't already tap into the UUA website on a regular basis (uua.org) or receive the Pacific Western Region's Newsletter (uua.org/pacific-western/blog), I invite you to do so and to pay attention.

At UUCM we are about to focus our energies on naming what it will look like to live our congregation's mission fully and faithfully in the coming years, and to name the ends to which we therefore want and need to commit next. The dismantling of so many protections, services and rights by the current administration in Washington, D.C. adds to the importance and urgency of such discernment.

Know that UUCM members will not do this discernment alone, but rather will do so held within the larger UU energy and spirit emerging in this moment. May we live into the promise of our tradition and the call of courageous love.

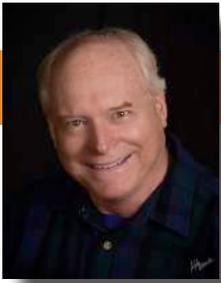


As I write, from General Session IV of this year's General Assembly in Kansas City, the two Congregational Study/Action issues being proposed and from which delegates must choose are "Undoing Intersectional White Supremacy" and "Dismantling Intersectional Oppression." The issue chosen will become a focus of study and action by UU congregations for three years.

In our recent UUCM "All Creatures" service I named the second proposal, a call to understand intersected oppressions as rooted in human exceptionalism. It seeks to help us include non-human beings within our circle of care and compassion and to understand intersectionality more broadly.

The proponents of the first proposal point out, however, that white persons' and white culture's wont is ever to shy away from an explicit focus on white supremacy and the treatment of black persons. They note that we routinely find ways to back away from the demanding edge of facing systemic racism directly, and that we instead dodge the challenge by proffering an alternative move which we frame as the noble pursuit of larger, more inclusive goods. This is how racism works, they remind us. It is like saying "all lives matter" instead of "black lives matter." What sounds like such a good thing works, in fact, to let us off the hook and to ensure the status quo.

It is inspiring and encouraging to me that this Study/Action vote at General Assembly is between two proposals that are so similar and related, each calling us to courageous examination and action regarding the roots of intersecting injustices. At the same time, it is inspiring and encouraging to me that we, as a people, are willing and able to name and talk about the differences between the two, differences that appear subtle at the surface but that are powerfully significant underneath.

I am happy to report that the state of our growing community is good. We are on solid ground financially, we are moving ahead with our governance overhaul, and our spirits are high. But there are dark clouds overhead that will challenge us as a spiritual community. Our nation reverberates with terrible spasms of guilt and self doubt as our leaders tear at the very fabric created by the Founders to protect the concepts of liberal democracy.

I fully understand that our nation's history is dark and bloody, but through it all, as the pendulum of justice swung back and forth, we inched forward on the faith and promise of ever evolving standards of liberty and decency. However, recent events have broken faith with our sense of who we are and our expectations of decency have been dishonored. While we recoil in horror, our national leadership rides a wrecking ball of destruction across our land tearing at our institutional foundations and our alliances around the globe.

Although the most glaring failures are well evident and garishly displayed by our current administration, the true responsibility for our present circumstances rests entirely on our own trembling shoulders. We, the People of the United States of America, have failed our responsibility to be the stewards of our own fate. We long ago retreated to the sidelines, failing and refusing to maintain the vigilance necessary for informed governance, and defaulted on our obligations to control those we anoint to manage our affairs.

Nationalism is not a faith, but it has become the catechism of a large cadre of otherwise rational beings. As UUs we know that the vast majority of our brothers and sisters of other faiths share our dismay. We recognize that, as in other times, we are being called back into the public square to join and lead a new resurgence of "spiritual, emotional, and intellectual strength" as we have so many times in the past to "create a world more compassionate, sustainable, and just."

This is who we are. This is what our Mission requires.

Stewardship Committee Needs YOU!

The Stewardship committee has begun preparations for next year's Stewardship program. More on that later. We are now seeking new members to join our committee. No particular expertise is required. We are looking for people who are committed to our community and show that commitment through their investment of time, talent, and treasure. Not a big pledger? No problem – we seek generous people regardless of your pledge level. If you are interested in serving, please let us know. We think you will find the work interesting, challenging, and gratifying.

What is the Stewardship program for next year? No firm decisions have been made, but the committee recognizes that last year's campaign was intense. It included a formal kick-off, several donor events, one-on-one visits with visiting stewards, testimonials, and a wonderful congregational dinner. More than \$198,000 was pledged, with over one-third of the congregation increasing their pledge by 15% or more. Amazing!

Stewardship experts suggest that a comprehensive campaign should be followed by a more relaxed campaign the subsequent year. This may prevent stewardship burn-out and foster more discernment and focus. With that advice in mind, one idea for next year is to ask everyone to increase their pledge by an identical dollar amount. For example, if each member increased their pledge by \$10 per month our total pledge income would increase by over \$16,000. This approach would affirm that we are one community and that everyone's pledge is important. Stewardship events would be small and informal and emphasize the themes of togetherness, solidarity, and a shared mission.

Your thoughts on stewardship in general and next steps will be greatly appreciated. Have a fun 4th of July!
