What does it mean to be a people of curiosity?

Being curious is pretty much a pre-requisite for exploring and joining a Unitarian Universalist community. Curiosity is built into the nature of our religious tradition, leading people again and again to new questions, new paths, new understandings. Our UU "inquisition" is ongoing, directed not at others and conformity, but toward the goal of personal and communal integrity and wholeness.

I've named often that our Unitarian Universalist religious tradition does not hand us the ready answers or a pre-approved set of final beliefs that we can or must claim. This is both a blessing and burden, asking of us a curiosity, creativity and a commitment that require an investment of time and effort. UUCM's mission statement names members' aspiration to hold a sense of wonder. I read that wonder as both a feeling of surprise and awe as well as a ready curiosity.

We do have commonly shared anchor points in Unitarian Universalism, the Seven Principles of the Unitarian Universalist Association, for example, but even these widely vetted and voted upon anchors ask of us our own testing and seal of approval. As with everything in our tradition, they too may be changed as our experience and insight requires.

It can be exhausting and exhilarating work, my friends, and though there are occasional and welcome plateaus, it is work that never ends. Curiosity will ever remain at the heart of the UU spiritual journey. Happily, it is not solo work.

Board of Trustees

Dear Members and Friends of UUCM,

This is my penultimate President's column. My second term in office is over on June 30, 2019. I might even miss being involved in the nuts and bolts of church operations and decision-making. Church governance is unlike government governance. I worked in high-level government service for nearly 30 years for the state of California. In some ways it was easier to get things done there than here.

But I don't mean that in only the negative sense. Getting things done at the state level often means doing the wrong thing very expensively, or even doing the right thing the wrong way. Or just doing nothing for its own sake.

Here every move is cradled in many long, earnest conversations exploring not only the pros and cons of the thing itself, but also the implications of the manner of doing it and whether it reflects our commitment to our mission. I was warned. Several voices of experience cautioned me not to get too caught up in achieving my goals. That way, they cautioned, leads to madness.

They were right. But, and this gets overlooked much too often, one also learns that focussing too narrowly on achieving a single unwavering objective can blind the crusader to the rewards lying along the way. Despite occasional frustrations and annoyances the opportunity to work closely with other Board members on matters and issues that mean so much to each of us is the greatest reward of all. One learns that the journey matters as much as the destination.

So, against this backdrop, let me bring you up to date on where we are and where we are going. First, some mildly unhappy news. Chuck Champlin has decided to resign from the Board for personal reasons. We knew from the outset that it would be a challenge for him to wear so many hats. Managing his roles as Worship Associate, choir member, and Board member while living so far away was never going to be easy. Although we will miss his thoughtful counsel, we are grateful for the time he gave us and heartened that his commitment to UUCM is as firm as ever. Although the Board is empowered to appoint a new member to fill the last of Chuck's term for the Board year, we have decided to leave it open and let you fill the vacancy when elections are held at our Annual Meeting. That brings me directly to that happy occasion. This year we have chosen to delay the Annual Meeting until Sunday, June 9, 2019. As it happens, none of the dates in late May permitted all of the people critical to a successful meeting to attend. We have decided to put substance over form. Although the bylaws specify a May meeting, and that was our intention, there is precedent for holding our meeting in June.

Some things that you have to look forward to at the meeting include the election of new Board members and officers and a new slate for the Nominating Committee, adopting a budget, and approving a proposed amendment to our bylaws.

You will learn more about Board and Nominating Committee members in the coming weeks. I am happy to report that we have already agreed on a budget to be presented for your consideration and adoption. Unfortunately, though the current year's budget is actually going to close in the black, the proposed budget will require dipping into reserves. We don't do this lightly, but pledge income ebbs and flows while expenses remain fairly constant. The choice to spend a bit more to maintain our commitment to our mission requires this step. That is what our reserves are for. Bear in mind, however, that sometime within the next 12 months we will finally lay our mortgage to rest freeing up \$27,000 dollars annually to replenish our reserves and more. Do not be afraid. This is not Congress. The prospect of a large influx of available money does not set Board members aquiver with spending palsy.

Pledge Campaign a Resounding Success!

The Stewardship Team is happy to report the results of the 2019/20 pledge drive. With a few pledges outstanding, we have received pledges totaling \$200,014. Our campaign goal was \$200,000. Mission accomplished! A sincere thank you to all members and friends who gave so generously to help UUCM fulfill its mission. The journey does indeed call us on.

There are many reasons for the success of the campaign. We received 110 pledges, which is slightly down from 2018/19. Forty-four pledgers, or 40%, increased their pledge from last year. We have seven new pledges from friends and members who have joined UUCM since July, 2018.

Our pledges in the aggregate show impressive breadth. Experts in church finance have long lamented the skewered nature of church giving. In many churches it is not uncommon for 20% of church members to give 80% of church income – the so-called 20/80 rule. This is not the case at UUCM. The top 20% of pledges at UUCM represents only 55% of total pledge income. We are truly a community in which everyone gives to the best of their ability.

The attainment of our pledge goal was achieved despite some adversity. Ten members and friends chose not to pledge and let their membership lapse. Some could not sustain their prior giving level due to new jobs, job loss, retirement, age-related issues, and other unspecified reasons. Twenty-six pledgers decreased their pledge from last year.

It is noteworthy that 30% of our members and friends pledged the same amount as last year. This is something of a twoedged sword. On the one hand, we commend those who were able to maintain their prior giving level. On the other hand, expenses such as cost of living increases for staff and building maintenance go up each year. A focus for the Stewardship Team next year will be to encourage our community to increase our pledges each year to fund our escalating expenses.

Enough about next year. For now we celebrate this year. Thanks again for choosing UUCM as the recipient of your amazing generosity.

Long Live Your Values

Long Live Your Values has been proposed by our new committee member Lesley Champlin as our committee slogan. In a few words, it encapsulates the goal of an Endowment Fund. Historically Endowment Funds have been a source of income and financial stability for a congregation. It is a method that the older generation can use to help next generations maintain our community and advance it's mission.

Some congregations have been in existence for a couple of hundred years and have developed Endowment Funds so large that the profit from these funds is their main source of income. UUCM, however, has not been around so long. So we need to start now. The immediate goal of our Fund is \$50,000. At that point our policy would allow us to start taking profit if we chose.

In the last year we have grown our cash on hand from about \$10,000 to \$30,000. We have also signed up 13 individuals and couples to pledge legacy gifts totaling about \$250,000. We have just started!

You can become a donor by adding UUCM as one of your beneficiaries to your will, trust, or retirement fund. We also accept Stocks or Mutual Funds.

Climate Change is one of the UUCM Social Justice Proposed Task Forces. Members of the task force have been working closely with the CA Nevada County Chapter of the Citizens' Climate Lobby in support of H.R. 763 – "The Energy Innovation and Carbon Dividend Act."

The Citizens' Climate Lobby seeks to lobby Members of Congress in support of the bill. Each chapter focuses on recruiting members within a congressional district. They also encourage members to write constituent letters to their members of congress.

Politicians respond to numbers. Around 300,000 people voted in the last election for the representative for the California 1st District. Most of us live in that district. Ten enthusiastic climate change advocates in Grass Valley are irrelevant. We need 1,000,000 or more committed climate advocates in our district.

We have been "tabling" to find those advocates. We were at the Banner Grange Seed Exchange, the Climate Action Forum and the Home and Garden Show in the Nevada County Fairgrounds. Our tablers included Bob Branstrom, Ginny Hoyt, Keith Johnson, Carol Kuczora, Bob Miller, Shannon and Andy Dooley-Miller and Anita Wald-Tuttle.

What Does It Mean to be a People of Curiosity?

UU minister, Victoria Safford, speaks of curiosity using the metaphor of perception and sight. She writes,

"To see, simply to look and to see, is an ethical act and intentional choice; to see, with open eyes, is a spiritual practice and thus a risk, for it can open you to ways of knowing

the world and loving it that will lead to inevitable consequences. The awakened eye is a conscious eye, a willful eye, and brave, because to see things as they are, each in its own truth, will make you very vulnerable."

Consequences. I'm not sure I've ever thought of curiosity in terms of consequences but I think Safford's got it right. There is a type of curiosity that is about enjoyment and adventure. It invites us to experience life as a playground. However, there is another type of curiosity that leads to consequences, that changes us. This kind of curiosity is about more than enjoyment. Indeed, it's the kind that drives us past enjoyment and comfort. It's not about enriching oneself; it's about altering oneself.

This is the type of curiosity we Unitarians Universalists have fallen in love with—one might even say, put our "faith" in.

Just think of how we talk about our dances with curiosity. We don't just tell stories about barraging our poor Sunday School teachers with "Why?!" and "Who says?!"; we tell stories of doing it until we were kicked out of the class. We don't just talk about being open-minded; we talk about how our open-mindedness led us to leave home and family and walk a lonelier path than we wanted. And lately, many of us have leaned into the hard work of being curious about our role in upholding institutional racism and structures of white supremacy, none of which is just about "learning interesting new things." The point of all these stories is that, as hard as these curious paths are, we are grateful for them. We don't want curiosity to just be fun or interesting. We want it to make us anew.

In other words, the message of our faith is not simply "Be curious!" It's "Be curious until there are consequences!"

It's fine to be inquisitive for the fun of it but at another level, we're called to remember that curiosity is not game. Well, maybe it's the greatest game: the one that drives us to constantly become more, for our sakes and for the sake of others.
