What can we do about this issue that's in our hearts and on our minds? What is our responsibility to the children of our world and how does that connect with our UUA Seventh Principle?

July 28 Really? Who is Welcome Here? Scottie Hart, Speaker, Gail Johnson Vaughan, Worship Associate

UUCM Member Scottie Hart shines light on someone most of us already know - "ThatOne". Scottie's sermon was given birth in this Spring's Shared Pulpit Class. Come learn who "ThatOne" is, and the wisdom "ThatOne" can bring into our lives – when and if we are ready. This service is inspired by our UU 2nd Principle – Justice, Equity and Compassion in Human Relations.

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Rev. Kevin Tarsa UUCM Minister held at the margins of society, including people of color, lesbian/gay/bisexual/transgender/queer/non-binary persons, and indigenous people. It is a powerful and challenging turn that will ask us to interrogate the assumptions, expectations and very nature of this whole liberal religious enterprise.

From the Minister

Several teams of people making separate plans for services at both General Assembly (the big annual gathering of Unitarian Universalists) and Ministry Days (the pre-GA gathering of UU ministers) chose to include the very same song: MaMuse's *We Shall Be Known*, written by Karisha Longaker.

We shall be known by the company we keep, by the ones who circle round to tend these fires.

The choice was no coincidence as the song matched not only the spirit of General Assembly and this year's theme (The Power of We), but also an important and significant shift underway in our religious tradition. Or, to be more accurate, a potential shift underway.

> We shall be known by the ones who sow and reap the seeds of change alive from deep within the earth.

Unitarianism as it took shape in the United States forged a reactive path away from a constricting 17th century Christian orthodoxy and toward a liberating modern individualism. It is an individualism that once served a helpful developmental purpose, but that now limits our ability to recognize and draw upon our interconnectedness.

Unitarianism in the United States also arose and came of age within the white, well-to-do, Euro-centric, racist, patriarchal and white supremacist culture imported by early European colonists and that reigns to this day.

While we UUs like to think of ourselves and our tradition as unique, as a whole and in many ways we mirror the rest of the dominant culture in the U.S., rife with the individualism and the white supremacy that has led us to this extraordinary and frightening moment in U.S. history, human history, and Earth history.

It is time now. It is time now that we thrive. It is time we lead ourselves into the well.

As for the potential turn underway in UUism, our leaders have made a deep, corrective commitment to center, for a change, the voices and the perspectives of those who are otherwise

Unitarian Universalist Community of the Mountains Grass Valley, California In this year's General Assembly, we heard numerous courageous and powerful expressions of pain, challenge, and hope from people who have traditionally been not only held outside the circle of leadership and influence in our faith, but also wounded, sometimes by a thousand small cuts, within it. We were led, in worship, workshops, and business meetings by people from those same traditionally marginalized groups.

Those of us who are white were asked to enter this new territory with inquisitiveness, humility, openness, and love, asked, implicitly, to take a back seat for once, asked to brave the anxious stew of our own vulnerability, and asked to risk remaining in the room when the heat rose and the distress of our white fragility made us want to run away or hide.

The implications of living into this way of being go far beyond mere changes or transpositions in who's up front and who's in charge, because for members of the dominant culture to hear and follow the voices of the marginalized leads to unprecedented, and so unfamiliar and therefore frightening possibilities.

We UUs are being given a potent opportunity to be broken open and and to realize a much deeper manifestation of our faith tradition.

It is time now, and what a time to be alive In this great turning we shall learn to lead in love.

I find this great turn-in-progress exhilarating and hope-filled; I find it true, even as it challenges so much of what is familiar and comfortable to me. I name it here to you, because it will influence my own ministry and ministering in the years ahead.

It is time now. In this great turning may we learn to lead, and to be led, in love.




Our young people will discover which of the four houses at Hogwarts they belong to. According to J.K. Rowling in *Harry Potter and the Philosopher's Stone*:

Our teen group will be on hiatus during the summer months and brunch bunch will not be taking place.



Summer Soul Matters Reflections

What Does It Mean to be a People of Principles?

Our official Soul Matters themes run September through June. This summer we are taking a close look at our seven (currently) Unitarian Universalist Association Principles. These are the seven principles we UU congregations covenant (promise to each other) to affirm and promote:

1ST PRINCIPLE: The inherent worth and dignity of every person;

2ND PRINCIPLE: Justice, equity and compassion in human relations;

3RD **P**RINCIPLE:

Acceptance of one another and encouragement to spiritual growth in our congregations;

4TH PRINCIPLE: A free and responsible search for truth and meaning;

5TH PRINCIPLE:

The right of conscience and the use of the democratic process within our congregations and in society at large;

6TH PRINCIPLE:

The goal of world community with peace, liberty, and justice for all;

7TH PRINCIPLE:

Respect for the interdependent web of all existence of which we are a part.

As Rev. Barbara Wells ten Hove explains, "The Principles are not dogma or doctrine, but rather a guide for those of us who choose to join and participate in Unitarian Universalist religious communities."

In Newcomer sessions, I invite people to name the principle that speaks most strongly to them. Of course, almost every person explains that they are drawn to several or all of the principles. And yet, there is usually one that resonates most readily, that grabs the heart with extra energy and meaning, one principle that guides most helpfully toward living life in alignment with one's values.

Aware that all these principles matter, which principle speaks most strongly to you? And why? What in your life experience leads you to be drawn to this particular value? How are you acting or wanting to act upon it?

Consider spending time this summer with those questions and with our UUA principles. Whether you reflect most deeply while alone, at the river, in morning or late-night hours when the house is quiet, while journaling, drawing, sculpting, walking, running or dancing, or in deep and lively conversation with another, which principle matters most to you?
