Collect Call

You only use your mobile phone recharger for a few hours a week but leaving it plugged into the power point means it could be drawing electricity all the time. The same goes for rechargers of other electronic devices, like laptop computers, PDAs, MP3 players and digital cameras. Unplug them when you're not using them.

Phones contain toxic metals - including arsenic, anti,ony, beryllium, cadmium, copper, lead, nickel and zinc - that do not degrade in the environment, so it is important to recycle them. Old phones that still work can be exported to developing countries where they can help bridge the digital divide, or be dismantled for parts and their materials recovered to make other products.

Do you think there is too much conflict in our congregation? Have you been sad to hear about people disagreeing, and leaving our community? Do you wish that there was some way that we as a group could work out problems in better ways? Well, the time has come! We are about to renegotiate our Covenant of Right Relations, and the first meeting will be on Sunday, Feb 8, after the service.

Some history: In October of 2005, small groups met to discuss shared values around disagreement and conflict, and a writing team came up with a first draft of a covenant, which was shared in the December 2005 Chalice. After more input and revision, the covenant was presented at the May 2006 Congregational Meeting. Due to some procedural difficulties, the covenant was not passed, and it was not carried forward in the following years. Last

spring the idea came back around, and Anita, our Board President, has made a new covenant one of her main goals.

Anita and Annie Haymaker are co-chairing a Right Relations Task Force that will seek creative input during meetings in February and March, present drafts for comment in the Chalice and by e-mail, and then bring the resulting document to a vote at our annual Congregational Meeting this May. Our premise is that conflict is normal in healthy relationships, and disagreement can communicate caring and concern. Let's provide ourselves with a tool that will help us disagree vigorously while treating each other respectfully, staying connected, and learning together.

VOLUNTEER OF THE MONTH

Sometimes called "the quiet one," Keith Johnson is not silent about volunteerism. "The church just doesn't work unless all get involved and committed to activities they like," he says. .

Keith has been a member of UUCM for several years and has attended services regularly, but with work and taking care of his daughter Elisabeth he didn't have much time to volunteer in the past. Since his retirement from the Department of Child Support Services in 20006 he's been able to devote more time to church activities, he says modestly.

He plunged head-on into service as a member of the Ministerial Search Committee (which hired Rev. Meghan!), and this has been his "most memorable experience" at UUCM. The year-long process involved lots of meetings, phoning, and face-to-face contacts with prospective ministers, requiring the committee to work closely as a team, he relates. "We were delighted and overjoyed with the end result," he adds.

For the past two years Keith has been an at-large member of the UUCM Board of Trustees, and this year he is chair of the Social Action Coordinating Committee.

Plus, he was co-chair of the UUCM Pledge Drive this

year and last and served as the phone bank coordinator for the "No on Proposition 8" campaign. He reports that he's a "proud member" of the church lawn mowing committee and an "enthusiastic sandwich maker" for Habitat for Humanity.

Asked about the greatest value UUCM provides, Keith points to the close contacts and work with like-minded individuals. "With our daughter's disabilities, it is difficult for our family to interact with people. "The church is non-judgmental and provides this opportunity." His wife Alice, a strong supporter of the church's work, provides needed back-up at home while Keith attends to his many tasks. His daughter Rachel, 18, is a freshman at UCLA.

Looking to UUCM's future, the biggest task will be preparing for two services, he says. "It will come sooner than later, but the community is prepared and will meet this challenge," he asserts. He fully supports the creation of a new long-range plan for the community.

Perhaps others will be inspired to step up and, as Keith says, "make the church work." Meanwhile, don't forget to give Keith a big hand for his many contributions to UUCM.

Despite such overload, however, those of us who have lost children feel our grief rekindled when seeing agonized parents clutching the bodies of their dead children.

An Israeli army officer stated that the Gaza Palestinians voted for Hamas, dedicated to the elimination of Israel, and so deserved the results of their invasion. That reasoning not only makes us all vulnerable for our governments' excesses, but also rationalizes indifference to the suffering and death of the innocent. Let us remember the words of President John F. Kennedy, "Those who make peaceful evolution impossible make a violent revolution inevitable." May we Unitarian Universalists continue to enlarge our CQ by our actions, prayers, and donations.

Join us for our inaugural event of 2009, but please note the change in evening and starting time above. Our 2008 Film Series format has morphed into our 2009 Sustainability Series. We'll continue our role as Nevada County's sustainability transition team with monthly presentations by local speakers on a variety of vital topics — alternative transportation, green jobs and energy, green investment opportunities, local food production, and much more. At the end of each presentation, we open the discussion to all participants, which makes for a lively exchange of ideas and viewpoints.

And now for the February program: There's new hope for safely walking and biking in Grass Valley and Nevada City, and tonight we'll inspire you with the details. You may have heard about Live Healthy Nevada County's Walkability Project by now. Recently, Nevada County Public Health was awarded an obesity prevention grant to

launch a diverse, health-related project, with a partial focus on walkability in the Brunswick Basin. Project managers Galen El-Askari and Shannon Glaz will report on the creation of safe pedestrian paths in the Basin.

Bill Haire, of Nevada County Land Trust, will introduce us to maps of existing trails in Grass Valley and Nevada City, as well as trails that will be funded and created in the future.

Tom Grundy, APPLE's president, will share his personal experiences as a bicycle commuter on the streets of G.V. and N.C. Find out how to get around quickly and safely on two wheels.

Last but not least, Susan Healy-Harmon, Nevada County's Transit manager, will advise us about the upcoming state budget cuts soon to impact both Gold Country Stage routes and Gold Country Telecare services for the elderly and disabled. (IMPORTANT NOTE: On Wed., January 28, at 10:30 am, in the Board of Supervisors Chambers at the Rood Center, residents are invited to weigh in on which routes and services should be saved.)
