#### Dear Friends,

It seems to have started earlier this year than usual – people indignantly claiming there is a "war on Christmas" because some businesses and institutions (Starbucks is the target of choice this time) prefer to be non-specific in their holiday salutations or observances. Starbucks is a corporation I do not normally find myself defending, but obviously not all their customers are Christian. Having generic coffee cups seems a logical gesture of inclusivity.

I do not consider myself to be Christian in any traditional way, but personally, I like to celebrate Christmas. I do so with my own theological understanding of what Christmas means, and that includes the recognition that it is an appropriation from older Pagan festivals. For me, Christmas is directly meaningful in ways which Solstice and Kwanzaa and Hannukah and Diwali and other festivals which occur at this time of year are not. So I am in the habit of wishing people Merry Christmas.

Because of my respect for the diversity among us, I take absolutely no offence if someone chooses to wish me a more generic Happy Holidays, just as I take no offence if a Muslim wishes me Happy Eid, because I understand and appreciate that person's intent is to offer me the blessing of the tradition which is important to them. Please know that if I wish you Merry Christmas, I do so because that is the salutation which is meaningful to me. If you need to translate it into language meaningful to you, please do so, and return your good greeting to me in your language.

This is also the season of platitudes about peace on earth and goodwill to all. I've recently been thinking about the words that Lao Tse wrote more than 2,500 years ago:

If there is to be peace in the world, There must be peace in the nations.

*If there is to be peace in the nations, There must be peace in the cities.* 

If there is to be peace in the cities, There must be peace between neighbors.

*If there is to be peace between neighbors, There must be peace in the home.* 

*If there is to be peace in the home, There must be peace in the heart.*  UUCM is a laboratory in which we each try to learn peace in the heart, in whatever language or imagery is personally meaningful to us, so that we can be at peace with and offering goodwill to each other and beyond, rippling ever outwards from that peaceful core. Part of that goodwill is the assumption that the other person has good intention. That requires good listening as well as good speaking. In our case at UUCM, it requires embracing the Covenant of Right Relations. (Our UUCM Covenant can be found on page 5.) This community is meant to be the place where we call ourselves to our highest aspirations. Let's offer ourselves this gift, not only at this season, but all of the time. This is how peace on earth will actually come into being.

Whatever the language you use, whichever seasonal festival speaks to your heart and mind, I trust this will be a happy and joy-filled time, and that you are anticipating 2016 with confidence and hope.

The Board wants to sincerely thank our Search Team for the Beyond Categorical Thinking workshop that they organized in November. Jo Victoria was engaging, and the workshop was a heart opening and enlightening experience (the soups were yummy too). We share Jo Victoria's respect for our Search Team and the joyful way they are working together; it is inspiring. Whenever you have the opportunity, be sure to thank the Search Team members; they are putting in many long hours with grace.

The dull but important work of policy development continues. The policies that UUCM develops over the years provide essential guidelines for consistent and reasoned approaches to the various aspects of congregational life. After almost two years in development, and in coordination with the stake holders, the Building Use Policy was approved this month. # Search Committee

# BCT and Beyond

Approximately 35 UUCM members braved the welcome rain to participate in the Beyond Categorical Thinking workshop. By the time we were finished, we knew more about ourselves, our community and opportunities that exist for us as we search for a new settled minister.

The facilitator from UUA, Jo Victoria, presented some sobering statistics about the search process. Prior to 2014 (the years designate the start year for the minister, so we are part of the 2016 search) it was typical to have 40 congregations in search among 120-130 ministerial candidates. Starting in 2014 there has been a large shift.

# In 2014 110 ministers searched for 60 positions. In 2015 110

ministers searched among 45 positions, but in 2016 there are 63 openings, and UUCM is one of them. We don't know yet how many ministers will be in search, but there is no reason to believe it will jump commensurately with the increase in the number of vacancies. In an average year, 6 congregations do not find a minister. With more congregations in search this year, that number is likely to be higher.

The UUA began the BCT program several years ago when they noticed that ministers of color (including Latina/o/ Hispanic), ministers with disabilities, and LBGT ministers were disproportionately overlooked or came in second. A vast resource was being underutilized. Jo reminded us that all fellowshipped ministers have at least a Masters of Divinity. They are all well-educated and have undergone training and vetting by the UUA. All are well-qualified, and one of them may be our perfect match.

The workshop began with a mini survey where each person checked off concerns they might have personally or they thought the congregation might have relative to racial issues, disability issues and LBGT issues. The participants broke into groups to discuss how their life might have been different if they had been born a different race, sexuality or had a disability.

In another group exercise we discussed some true life scenarios of issues that had been reported by ministers,

Finally, we discussed the results of the day's mini survey. As to ministers of color, many people listed a concern that our community is very white. Jo assured us that any candidate will have researched the demographics before applying and knows we are a predominately white congregation in a white community.

For ministers with a disability the biggest concern was that they might not have the stamina to do the job, followed closely with concerns about the inaccessible parts of our building. Our facilitator said people tend to think in extremes. Not all people with a mobility issue use a

wheelchair, not all with hearing loss are deaf, nor does visionimpaired mean blind etc. As to the stamina question, we should not be expecting more than 40 hours per week from any minister!

For LGBT ministers the most mentioned concern is that we may not be as welcoming as we think we are, followed with concern that the person would have a single-issue agenda. The single-issue concern was also raised regarding ministers of color. UUA statistics show that if a minister mentions their difference only three times during a year (i.e. out of approximately 40 services) they are pegged as a single-issue minister!

People also saw benefits in calling one of these ministers. For all three groups, almost half the participants said such a minister would educate us. Jo cautioned that it is not the job of the minister to educate us about their difference. First of all, we should be seeking to be educated on our own whether or not we call such a minister. Secondly, and most importantly, the characteristic that makes us view them as different is only one of their many characteristics. It does not define them.

If some of the concerns expressed surprise you or if you feel a little guilty that you are not as open as you thought you were, do not judge yourself or others. We are all works in progress.

# Search Committee

In the words of Rev. Richard S. Gilbert:

Do not let the incompleteness weigh on your spirit; Do not despair that imperfection marks your every day; Do not fear that we are still in the making.

Let us instead be grateful that the world is still to be created; Let us give thanks that we can be more than we are; Let us celebrate the power of the incomplete; For life is always unfinished business.

We received a very enthusiastic response to our Congregational Record that we sent to Bob Miess, our guide and mentor in the search process. He did propose some minor edits which we are working on now. We will submit them to him by November 30 and once approved, our CR will be available to ministers in search.

The Search Committee will soon be posting a timeline so that you can more easily see what we have accomplished so far and what yet needs to be done.

#### WATER CONSERVATION UPDATE:

Congratulations! In the last month UUCM has used 89% less water per day than any of our neighbors. Our water usage has been below 89 gallons per day. Thank you to everyone for being conscientious with your water use at UUCM.

#### NOVEMBER B&G MEETING:

Last month, we discussed defining of a list of projects and goals for UUCM over the next 10 years. We will be working on a number of projections: for the short term (1-2 years), medium term (2-5 years) and long term (10 years). This information will help us estimate the cost of maintaining and improving the condition of our campus through the next 10 years. We may ask some of you to help with this evaluation, and I hope you will participate.

#### WORK DAY:

## UUCM's Leal Portis -Nominee Honored in the Inaugural "Senior Volunteer of the Year" Program

She has worked tirelessly for Lions Club, Hospitality House (where she coordinates bi-monthly meals and bingo games for the residents), Interfaith Food Ministry (where she serves on the board of directors as representative from UUCM), Grandmothers For Peace, The Grandmothers for Peace annual scholarship program (where Leal personally reviews hundreds of essay submissions from the applicants), The League of Women Voters, and TOPS. Leal also co-chaired a mental health study, and sponsors placing foreign high school exchange students from Europe and Asia with families every year.

Leal has worked with all these groups and causes with enthusiasm, but life threw her a curve ball a few years ago, when she was diagnosed with lung cancer and then suffered a stroke. At the same time she was also caregiver to her husband, who was dealing with major health problems too. He died three years ago, but Leal just keeps going.

Leal has remarked that doing for others is what has given her the strength to carry on and that she is "one tough cookie" who loves giving back to her community.

Congratulate Leal when you next see her. But be careful, she might rope you in to help with her next project! She is a UU who lives her principles, amd makes a huge difference to a great many people.

We have been discussing social and economic justice issues: What kinds of injustice and inequality exist around us? At a local level? In the larger community? What can we do about it?
