I was quick to note that these trees are beautiful not in spite of the challenges of growing on the summit, but because of those very challenges. Ah, I realized, an image for an April Sunday service. However, a second thought followed quickly behind the first: that I do not wish to glorify pain and suffering.

I see the trees as incredibly aesthetically beautiful, but it cannot be a great life for these trees. Clearly they suffer the stress of the environment and would likely be "happier" in more kind conditions. My external eye aesthetic vs the trees' wellbeing. Hmmm... But they are so beautiful! At least to my eye. Of course my mind and heart turn to the human equivalents. How often do I, through my particular lenses,

see beauty born of suffering without seeing the full reality of the suffering underneath?

This spring season is filled with symbols and metaphors of transformation, our April theme. Easter arrives in the Christian tradition. For many it is a story of redemptive suffering. Passover crosses that same weekend, a story of a people freed from bondage through a fair amount of pain and bloodshed. Even the earth-centered perspective holds the notion of a newly planted seed dying, in a sense, and being buried in order to become a new life that will generate yet more life.

This month we will celebrate waking, celebrate our journeys in progress, testify to resurrection (in UU style), celebrate the earth that is our home, and honor the beauty born of suffering, without glorifying suffering.

May our shared exploration of transformation invite your own reflection, and maybe even a transformation somewhere in your life.

Results of the UUCM Board of Trustees 2016-17 Midterm Survey

In early February the Board of Trustees released a ten question survey to the congregation asking for your thoughts about how the Board was doing in various areas. We received 28 responses, roughly 20% of our total number of members and friends.

We asked about whether the Board was addressing the important issues at UUCM, if our efforts had helped make Rev. Kevin's transition into settled ministry go smoothly, if our communication with the Congregation is clear, if we are researching ways to better organize decision making, and whether you understand how to become more involved in meaningful volunteer work. For all of those questions approximately 80-90% of respondents replied either Strongly Agree or Agree.

We asked if the Board has an effective strategy for developing a new mission statement and just under 50% replied either Strongly Agree or Agree while 25% replied Undecided/Neutral and 25% replied Don't Know. We attribute this response to a matter of timing. Just shortly before the survey was released Beth Freedman announced the Renewal of UUCM's Mission Statement process that was identified as a key priority at our Congregational Start Up Workshop in October.

We asked if UUCM has an active Religious Education program that meets members' needs and just under 70% of

respondents replied either Strongly Agree or Agree but almost 30% responded Undecided/Neutral. Respondents commented that an Adult RE component was missing. Please see the March issue of The Mountain Chalice for NEW Adult RE classes offered.

Just over 40% of respondents Strongly Agreed or Agreed that the Board has a good plan for UUCM's future and just under 40% were Undecided/Neutral. We recognize that the term

"future" was not clearly defined in our survey.
Strategic planning rooted in a renewed mission is on the horizon and meanwhile the Board is considering both a Building and Grounds Evaluation Task Force and a New Facility Exploration Task Force.
