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Minister's Letter

Rev. David Usher UUCM Interim Minister

Dear UUCM Members and Friends,

As part of the service on January 18, Martin Luther King, Jr. Sunday, I asked the congregation to write on a card their personal experience of racism – not their thoughts about what racism is, but how it had impacted their lives. The restriction was that the statements had to be strictly six words. Those cards were then placed into a basket, but there was not enough time to read them aloud. Some of those statements were very powerful. Here is a selection.

I am hesitant and remorseful too. Bar with Obadiah. Why no service?! Surprise and shame: I am racist Ashamed of how America treated people. Making barely-conscious judgments of others Previous life I was a "black" Black boys intimidated / beat me up. Child (in Mississippi) loving a black nanny I don't like black culture I fight against my racist self Still learning to not feel otherness Haven't really been tested yet; prepare. Mom said, "Bluebirds marry bluebirds" As coming from fear – and misunderstanding Fearing a group of black men. Constant inner feeling of being different. My grandma who does not know Taught to be afraid of negroes Married an African-American but still racist My best friend is African American (we love each other) Racism – a cancer on the world. Thought: "No wonder you messed up." Black girls in college familiar strangers. *My uncle Jim - racism is abominable* Black Pastor. White cops. Planted heroin. Observations when living in Louisiana. Inadvertently I am indeed a racist Fear at Distance / Close – Fear Forgotten I know no black / How sad Overcome fear by walking in love. I am afraid of black men From "Chocolate Drops" to Sugar Plums *My* family – and my understanding – expanded. Preemptively afraid to ask and learn I've always seen Jews as selfish.

Many jokes lead to harmed souls I see it too often every day. Too long isolated. Must reach out. Imagine – I am the other person Preconceived Ideas that block real connection My father yelling obscenities at blacks. Minimal-reversed early in working career *Is a different color skin / is suspect* Ignorance of experience, hopeful upward caring I rejected my parents racist opinions! Born in all white farming community. Around young black males I'm cautious. My family fought for the Confederacy. Lock doors when passing young blacks. Niggers belong in their own space Childish misunderstanding to shame from isolation. Exposure works, closed circles don't Struggle to understand and relate *Is it only my "white quilt"?* Robbed at gunpoint; started crossing street Him: "Not white? Not beautiful." Wrong neighborhood roll up the windows

The congregation continues to work on what it can do as part of the national focus on the way African Americans and other ethnic minorities are unfairly targeted by law enforcement agencies and the judiciary. See the Social Action pages for more details. But in addition to what we might be doing to change things in the world, there is also work for all of us to be doing to change things in our own hearts. What better place to be doing that work, and in what better company, than here at UUCM?

President's Perspective

The January 24-25 weekend was a landmark weekend for UUCM. On Saturday, our Board of Trustees met with Bob Miess, the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) Ministerial Search Representative who will be advising us during our search for a settled minister. This was a great opportunity to review the UUA-recommended search process in detail and begin development of specific plans for UUCM. On Sunday, Bob presented a relevant sermon, "Significant Choices". This was followed by a meeting with congregation members in which he shared an outline of how the search process works, and offered advice based on his experience working with over 20 churches. The congregation members present then voted to approve bylaw changes that aligned our bylaws with UUA best practices.

In the days ahead we will provide a summary of the overall process as a reminder, or an update for those who weren't present on Sunday. In the meantime, we will soon begin our first step, the selection of our seven-member Search Committee. During February, members of the Board of Trustees and other UUCM leaders will be contacting each congregation member to discuss attributes desirable in a potential Search Committee member, and to solicit each member's suggestions of people who might best represent UUCM on the Search Committee. We will be sending out more information about this upcoming survey and how the selection will be done.

We are at the exciting beginning of the process that will give UUCM the best possible chance of calling a minister in Spring of 2016, and welcoming the new minister late that summer

New Road Map for Social Justice

There is a new road map for social justice at UUCM. The Social Justice Coordinating Council has voted to use the workbook from UUA Witness Ministries entitled Inspired Faith Effective Action as the guide for future justice programs. In order to be successful, a congregation must intentionally set a path for justice work. First, one on one conversations are conducted to discover the passions of our members. When one or two issues have been identified, we analyze whether there is a match between the congregation's resources and our ability to make a difference on those issues. If so, short, intermediate, and long-term goals are developed. Action must be concrete, specific, and manageable. Action must incorporate all the components of social justice work, including service, education, organizing, advocacy, lobbying, and witness. Once our goals are met, new issues are selected and the process repeats itself.

Black Lives Matter: An Update

Much has happened since David Usher's sermon on December 7 sparked a significant response. Two meetings have been held, on December 15 and January 5, with about twenty people in attendance at each, and those meetings have given rise to several initiatives.

Contact has been made with Bethel AME Church Choir, and many UUCM members sang in or attended the choir's concert in Nevada City on January 19.

On January 16, UUCM co-hosted showing the film, "Fruitvale Station", a documentary about a young black man killed by a BART police officer.

Many UUCM members attended a presentation by Bill Drake about his upbringing in a southern segregationist family. Bill Drake has been invited to take a service at UUCM, at a date to be confirmed.

Contact has been made with John Foster, Chief of Grass Valley Police, who is pleased to attend a public meeting at UUCM designed to share ideas about how we can ensure that African Americans and other minorities are treated equally and fairly by the police and the judiciary. The most likely date for that meeting is Monday, March 9. To be confirmed.

There remains much to be done to ensure we do not lose momentum on this critical issue facing the nation.

More than Forty People Met to Discuss Mental Health

After the services on January 18, Scottie Hart convened a meeting facilitated by Gail Johnson –Vaughan to discuss Mental Health.

The most important part of the gathering was the incredible energy in the room. About forty people packed the Channing Room. We were people with mental health histories, family members, and a couple folks just interested in being helpful. We represented many age brackets, diagnoses and backgrounds. The room was filled with our deep, urgent yearning that UUCM provide more connection and support to its members around mental health issues.

After we shared briefly (and often poignantly) why we had come, Gail Johnson-Vaughan catapulted us a year into the future. From the perspective of January 18, 2016 we looked at what we had accomplished in a year's time. Lots and lots of exciting developments had occurred. We documented our accomplishments so that when Gail returned us to 2015 we had tons of ideas of about specific directions in which we'd like to grow. And then we were out of time! We agreed to meet again after the services on February 1. You are welcome to join us. Fouth Friday Film Series presents "Unmanned: America's Drone Wars"

Friday, February 27, 2015 at 7:00 pm at UUCM

In "Unmanned: America's Drone Wars" director Robert Greenwald investigates the impact of U.S. drone strikes at home and abroad through more than 70 separate interviews, including a former American



drone operator who shares what he has witnessed in his own words, Pakistani families mourning loved ones and seeking legal redress, investigative journalists pursuing the truth, and top military officials warning against blowback from the loss of innocent life. About the US drone warfare program, Rosa Brooks, former State Department Senior Advisor states, "Without more transparency, how can we decide if the U.S. use of drones is lawful or unlawful? More pragmatically, without more transparency, how can we evaluate whether the U.S. drone war is doing us more good than harm? How can we tell if it's actually weakening terrorist networks? How can we evaluate its second-order effects -- is it inspiring more anti-U.S. violence than it's preventing, or setting a dangerous precedent for other states? How can we tell if drone strikes are a sound strategy, or, as a military acquaintance puts it, merely a tactic in search of a strategy? We can't."
