Rev. David Usher UUCM Interim Minister

Dear Friends,

Over the past six or so weeks, I have been very moved by what various people have said during services about what UUCM has come to mean to them. They have each brought their own rich perspective in talking about how they first came to this community, what they were looking for and what they found. They have spoken of forming deep friendships, of being challenged to deepen their personal faith, of engaging with stimulating ideas, of the satisfaction of contributing to the well-being of the congregation, of finding opportunities to be involved in the work of the wider world. Several others participated in the video which was shown during the services on March 8th, and which is now available on UUCM's website. Perhaps you have been similarly moved by hearing these testimonies of others, and have been prompted to consider what UUCM means to you.

Unlike most of you, who have come to Unitarian Universalism either from another religious tradition which you no longer found satisfying, or from no religious tradition which had made you feel you were lacking something, I was raised as a Unitarian. It has always been there for me, a part of who I have understood myself to be. I am very grateful for that, but it does mean that I have never had the experience of discovering this faith, of having to change my denominational loyalties, or learning that it was okay to question, to challenge and to doubt.

There are many reasons I am glad to be a Unitarian Universalist, and some of them have been articulated by those who have spoken on Sunday morning or on the video. But perhaps the most compelling for me is that it encourages and enables me to be my best authentic self. It provides me with a theological and existential framework within which I can wrestle with life's big questions. The history of Unitarian Universalism is littered with people who have led exemplary lives – lives of sacrifice and service, lives of intellectual rigour and artistic excellence, lives of deep human compassion and vivid imagination. I am inspired by their examples, and given markers about how my life might also be. It provides me with a contemporary community of people striving for justice for all, working to heal our troubled world, refusing to settle. It offers me gentle space in which I can reflect on life's meaning, and give thanks for it.

Unitarian Universalism is not a franchise. Each UU congregation, though belonging to a larger whole, is

independent in governance and the identity it forges for itself. UUCM is unique. It is we make it what it is; it is we who will make it what it might become.

As you listen to the testimony of others, I hope you will be reflecting on your own story of what UUCM means to you, and how you can contribute to the continuing prosperity of its many ministries.

Apartment to be Interim Minister's Residence

The Board has decided to convert the upstairs apartment back into a residential space, where the Interim Minister will live for the rest of his time with us. The apartment is not being considered as the residence for the future settled minister. This decision has been made in light of some pressing financial considerations, and also in recognition of the regrettable fact that the current numbers in the Religious Education and Youth program do not warrant the space being designated for RE's exclusive use. This decision can be reviewed in a year's time, and if RE numbers have recovered or financial needs have changed then the apartment can be adapted back for RE use. The target date for the minister to move in is 1 May.

President's Perspective

Hello, UUCM!

Here's some news about a subject I know is near and dear to all of our hearts, the UUCM Policy Manual. OK, so maybe you don't find policies all that exciting. Nevertheless, the policies that UUCM developed over the years provide essential guidelines for consistent and reasoned approaches to the various aspects of congregational life, particularly as our congregation has grown, and communications and governance become more complex.

At its March meeting, the Board of Trustees approved a new policy outlining how the monthly board meetings would be conducted. Up until now, the only guidelines in place were in the bylaws and they were very limited. As important as these monthly meetings are, we needed more complete guidelines covering all key aspects of meeting conduct. After consultation with leaders at other UU churches who had such policies in place, the Board of Trustees recently approved our new policy. For example, it defines how agendas are created and communicated, publication of minutes, and how guests will be accommodated should a member wish to attend a meeting. (The practice of posting minutes on the bulletin board came as a result of discussion about this policy.) For those interested in seeing the complete policy, it will be posted on the bulletin board.

Also at the March meeting, the Board held an in depth discussion regarding plans for a Child and Youth Safety Policy. As UUs, our commitment to the inherent dignity and worth of each person compels us to do our very best to ensure we protect children and youth from harm and create a nurturing spiritual environment. Based on UUA suggestions and input from other congregations, we have begun work to develop a policy which will include guidelines and necessary new procedures so we do everything possible to provide a safe environment for youth and children. Stay tuned for more on this as the policy takes shape.

Finally, we have plans to create a separate "Members Section" on our web site where documents like our policy manual can be more readily available for reference. In the meantime, our printed policy manual is always available for viewing in the office.

WHAT WILL YOUR PLEDGE EMPOWER?

UUCM's total budget is well in excess of \$200,000, and this is spent on four main programs, with salaries and the costs of buildings and institutional maintenance factored according to time.

Worship

This is the cornerstone of who we are as a religious community, and to ensure worship of consistently high standards we employ a trained minister to craft and coordinate services which speak to the heart and to the mind, we have musicians who enhance our worship with their artistry, we maintain a building which will be a comfortable and inspiring environment, we have an administrator who assists with the myriad of tasks involved in making worship happen week by week.

EDUCATING OURSELVES AND OUR CHILDREN

For us, faith development is a lifelong journey, engaging the mind in study and thought as well as engaging our whole beings in healthful and aware living. Our minister devotes much of his time to ensuring that there are stimulating classes and courses for the adults, and our Director of Lifespan Religious Education ensures that our children and youth have their own engaging programs in their own comfortable space.

MAKING THE WORLD A BETTER PLACE

Our faith is about deeds, not creeds. At UUCM we strive to continue Unitarian Universalism's proud record of involvement in the world. We have been leaders in the abolition of slavery and the continuing fight against racism, in women's emancipation, in reproductive rights, in prison reform, economic justice, LGBT equality and environmental activism. Whether engaged in advocacy or hands-on help, we at UUCM take our responsibilities to the world seriously.

Social Justice Workshops

May 3rd, June 7th, and July 12th, 12:30 р.м. at UUCM

Please mark your calendars for May 3rd, June 7th, and July 12th at 12:30 p.m. in the sanctuary. Sponsored by the Social Justice Coordinating Council, the congregation will partner with the UU Justice Ministry to put on these 90-120 minute workshops. They are designed to help us assess the quality of our social justice program, develop a vision for the future based on UU values, and design a plan to achieve this vision.

The workshops, formally referred to as the Social Justice Discernment and Engagement Program, are spaced about one month apart to allow for survey work and feedback between sessions. This is an interactive program- most of the work is done in small groups led by the Minister, Board members, and social justice leaders. The first session takes a look at the congregation's history around social justice. In the second session participants consider critical issues for the congregation which, if properly addressed, will lead to a more effective social justice program. The third session brings it all together by analyzing the material and feedback for the creation of a new social justice model.

On behalf of the Social Justice Coordinating Council, I hope you will attend these worthwhile workshops. The program has already been favorably received at the UU Church in San Mateo, and the SFUU church is signed up for the fall.

Black Lives Matter

Most of us know that African Americans are more likely than whites to be incarcerated, but do we know just how much more likely? A sampling of five states is a shocking reminder.

Incarceration rate per 100,000

WHITES	STATE	BLACKS
405	California	2,758
170	New Jersey	1,621
326	Pennsylvania	2,675
257	Vermont	2,030
398	Wisconsin	3,787

Do we really believe that African Americans are up to ten times more likely to commit a crime, or just ten times more likely to be arrested and incarcerated?

And just so we understand the full implications of these statistics, this means that in the States roughly one person in thirty is behind bars. Welcome to the land of the free!

April 26th Service at UUCM is about Unlearning Racism

We are pleased to welcome Bill Drake and Jamal Walker to lead our services as part of our continuing awareness-raising about issues of racism in our society.

Bill Drake comes from an ancestry of slave plantation owners and grew up in the segregated world of the South, believing in white supremacy and at times harassing black people. He is the author of "Almost Hereditary: A White Southerner's Journey Out of Racism, A Guide for Unlearning and Healing Prejudice."

Jamal Walker is a black African man who has been resident in Nevada County for the past 25 years. He is a co-founding member of Creating Communities Beyond Bias, and has worked with various non-profit groups committed to social justice in the areas of unlearning oppression, and crosscultural alliance building.

Women Hymn Writers

Since March is Women's History Month, I'd like to honor the music of our women hymn writers in Singing the Living Tradition. Though the great majority of lyrics and music are by men, women have composed some of our best-loved hymns. The music of these gifted and socially aware women composers speaks to the social issues that continue to plague communities around the world.

Sarah Flower Adams, an English Unitarian poet, wrote the lyrics for #87 Nearer, my God, to Thee. Mary Elizabeth Byrne, linguist and author, translated #20 Be Thou My Vision from the ancient Irish. Hildegard of Bingen, also known as Saint Hildegard, wrote the lyrics for #27 I Am That Great and Fiery Force. Mary Grigolia, a UU minister, wrote #386 I Know This Rose Will Open.

Malvina Reynolds, a political activist who sang with Pete Seeger, wrote songs such as "Little Boxes" and "What Have They Done to the Rain." She wrote the lyrics for #313 O What a Piece of Work Are We.

Alicia S Carpenter specialized in recasting lyrics to very old hymn tunes, for example #360 Here We Have Gathered, and has 10 songs in the grey hymnal.

Shelley Jackson Denham, part of North Carolina's Mountain Quartet, has 5 songs in the grey hymnal, including #55 Dark of Winter, #86 Blessed Spirit of my Life, and #354 We Laugh, We Cry.

Holly Near, a feminist songwriter, wrote #170 Singing for Our Lives in response to the 1978 murder of gay San Francisco City Council member Harvey Milk.

Joyce Poley, a Canadian singer-songwriter and song leader, composed #168 One More Step and #1008 When Our Heart Is In a Holy Place.

Carolyn McDade, UU feminist activist and songwriter, wrote #123 Spirit of Life as a prayer. It is widely regarded as the standard UU anthem.

Sally Rogers, folk musician and songwriter, wrote the lyrics to #131 Love Will Guide Us, based on an old Southern Baptist hymn.

Twelve Steps to Spiritual Health THURSDAY, APRIL 16TH AT UUCM Facilitated by Rev. David Usher

The second of four sessions studying David Usher's book, "Twelve Steps to Spiritual Health", will be held on Thursday April 16th. A practical manual, designed for use by anyone seeking a fuller, more meaningful life - "life measured by quality and intensity, not quantity"- within the context of everyday demands and distractions. It does not assume any formal belief system or religious affiliation on the part of the reader, although it draws inspiration from a wide range of world faiths. The journey to spiritual health can start at any point, and the twelve steps of this book do not have to be followed in strict sequence, provided that readers are willing to be led out of their familiar comfort zones at some point. The journey can be undertaken alone, or by groups of like-minded people as a shared exercise. Each chapter ends with questions for individual reflection or group discussion.
