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Minister's Letter

Rev. David Usher UUCM Interim Minister

Dear Friends,

As most of you will know, I returned to my native Australia for two weeks in June, mainly visiting my middle daughter who has been in Melbourne since last November, but also spending time in Sydney with my brother and in my home town of Adelaide. I get back to Australia very seldom, although on this occasion it had been only two and a half years since my previous visit.

When I first left Australia in 1976, I thought it was to be for just a few months of exploring in neighbouring New Zealand, but somehow that got extended to take in North America and Europe, and while I was travelling the idea of ministry took root and I ended up studying for the ministry in England. My adult life ever since has been in the UK and US. I have returned to Australia several times in the intervening years, and each time I am struck by the sense of home-coming, even though I have not lived there for such a long time and do not actively miss it when I am not there.

A sense of "home" is complicated. Homelessness carries with it a deep psychological void, and is much more than just a lack of physical shelter. Is "home" where you are originally from, or is it what you have made for yourself? Is it "where, when you have to go there, they have to take you in" as Robert Frost observed in The Death of the Hired Man? Something you somehow haven't to deserve? I am very grateful for the life I have had, with opportunity to live in several different countries, but a price I have paid for that privilege is that I no longer know for sure where "home" is. For two years I will be living here in Grass Valley, but does that make it "home" or just a temporary residence? In contrast, two of my brothers have never lived anywhere but Adelaide. In fact, they each have never lived more than five miles from the house where we all grew up. They certainly know where they belong.

Where is "home" for you? Is it where you happen presently to live, or does your heart really belong somewhere else, to which you return and where you immediately reconnect with a deep sense of belonging? Is your "home" somewhere you enjoy in solitude, or is it made home because you share it with others you love?

And if UUCM is your spiritual home, what exactly does that mean for you?

- The finance committee reported on options for the future of the five rental garages. More study is required. Efforts will be made to find rental opportunities for the RE space during the week.

- The 2015-16 Ministerial Search Committee budget was approved in the amount of \$12,000 as presented at the recent annual meeting.

Board Appoints Search Committee

After a thorough consultation with the congregation which followed UUA guidelines, the Board has been delighted to announce the seven members of the Search Committee charged with finding the next settled minister. They are: Taylor Carey, Lindsay Dunckel, George Dunstan, Beth Freedman, Keith Johnson, Bev Lyon and Corrie Silva. They will be commencing their work this summer. Much of the Search Committee's work entails soliciting views from the congregation, but please note that it is essential that the Search Committee must maintain strict confidentiality until they are ready to make their announcement. In other words, the Search Committee may ask you questions, but please don't ask them questions.

Early Steps of Search Process

Your UUCM Search Committee has started the early steps in the search process and we are on track and looking forward to this yearlong effort that will lead to a new settled minister for our congregation. On June 10th we held our first official meeting and were joined by Bob Miess, the Pacific Western Region Ministerial Settlement Representative. Bob described his role as our coach, consultant, and cheerleader during the search process and we discussed the structure of the Search Committee, the upcoming committee retreat, the policies of and support offered by UUA, and the timetable for the entire search process.

The Search Committee will be surveying the congregation and holding small meetings to gather the information necessary to answer the questions: Who are we? How do we see ourselves? Who are we called to be as a congregation? How do we want to develop? What kind of ministerial partner do we need? The information gathered will be used to prepare our Congregational Record that will be shared with ministerial candidates to let them know who we are. The Search Committee will also use that information to evaluate ministers to determine if they are a match for us.

We will post a calendar of the tasks involved in the search and update where we are in the process as we proceed. We look forward to working with all of you during this exciting time.

Social Justice Activities

Final All Congregational Social Justice Workshop Sunday, July 12, 12:30 p.m.

The second of a series of three all congregation social justice workshops was held on June 14. The workshops are sponsored by the Social Justice Coordinating Council and are presented by the UU Justice Ministry of California. The purpose of the workshops is to revitalize and invigorate our social justice ministry so that it is fully integrated into congregational life.

A total of thirty seven people attended the June 14 workshop. The agenda included a recap of the first workshop, which focused on UUCM's history with social justice, how our religious values are expressed through justice work, and an introduction to models of engagement which allow us to become allies in right relationship. The balance of the June 14 workshop was conducted in small groups. Based on a phone survey of the congregation, six critical social justice issues were identified. Each group explored how these issues can be confronted using the five pillars of social justice work: service, education, organizing, witness, and advocacy. This exercise was informative, thought provoking, and lots of fun. By all reports, a good time was had by all.

The third and final workshop will be held on Sunday, July 12 after the service. Refreshments will be served. Prior to July 12, the congregation will be invited to complete a written survey about their preferences for social justice work. UUJM staff, the Minister, and the social justice leadership team will review the results of the written survey, as well as the phone survey completed previously and the data compiled from the second workshop. Then the leadership team will make recommendations and set up the process for selection of a congregationally based social justice ministry. The third workshop will set the stage for completion of the new model program.

GREEN Power Points

RECHARGE IT, PLEASE!

Whenever you can, buy rechargeable rather than disposable batteries. Rechargeable batteries live longer, of course, but they also can be recycled, while disposable batteries can't. In general, never put batteries in the trash without checking with your local solid waste management district (listed under County Government in your phone book) for any outlets for household battery recycling. Also remember to inquire at local jewellers, pharmacies, or battery retailers to see if they'll accept button batteries for recycling.

STRIP TEASE

If you work away from home bring a power strip to work - or request one the next time someone's ordering office supplies – so you can plug all your electronics into one place and unplug them all with a single yank at the end of the day. Why? Electronics and appliances eat up energy - known as "standby" or "leaking" electricity - even when they're not being used! A study from the University of California, Berkeley showed that the average California household pays between \$50 and \$70 every year to keep things humming while they're just sitting there!




California CareForce Event Planning

Musical Notes

Jim Lowe, Music Man

Jim Lowe was born in the late 1930s, and grew up in the Midwest. His father was a pianist, and supported the family during the Depression as a working musician; he told a story about a job where he played 8 hours for \$3 and all the beer he could drink, but if he took a bathroom break he

only got \$2. Jim had piano lessons as a child, and his first gigs were recitals and USO shows in the 1940s.

He started playing professionally in 1955, when he moonlighted playing piano in a jazz club during his senior year in high school. He served as pianist with the 298th Army Band in Germany, also improvising on glockenspiel with the marching band. He attended seven institutions of higher learning for brief periods of time, with no degrees. He played in Chicago with the Ted Weems Band, a popular jazz-novelty band, and his musical idol was the great pianist Art Tatum, famous for his exuberant and sophisticated interpretations of jazz standards.

In the 60s Jim headed for the San Francisco Bay area, a very creative environment for musicians, artists, theater people, and poets, and a hotbed of anti-Vietnam war protest. He played solo piano and led his own jazz combos in North Beach, sharing billings with Lee Konitz, John Handy, Charlie Haden, Wes Montgomery, Vince Guaraldi, Mose Allison, Sonny King, Big Mamma Thornton, Jefferson Airplane, and the Grateful Dead.

In the early 70s, Jim founded the Cleveland Wrecking Co. Band, a unique jazz-flamenco-rock band. When drummer Steve Mitchell joined Cleveland Wrecking Co., Jim was giving all the money they made to the Diggers, who had set up soup kitchens and medical clinics to help the needy in San Francisco.



"He was like that his whole life; he never worked to publicize himself or get rich and famous," recalls Steve.

The band had a
Baldwin grand piano
and a Hammond
B3 organ, and Jim
and bassist Patrick


McCarthy would remove the legs from the piano, put it on a skid board, and use a dolly to get it and the organ onto their flatbed truck to get to their gigs. Then Jim would spend half an hour retuning the piano when they got there. Steve says "Jim would do anything it took to make music and make it happen." They were road musicians, at any moment ready to go to Seattle, New York, or Buenos Aires. The music scene included smoking, drinking, and drugs, and was a hard life and a lot of work, says Patrick, but "Those were the days..."

When their flamenco guitarist left the band, it evolved into the Jim Lowe Trio with Jim, Steve, and Patrick, playing mostly in North Beach. Jim moved to Grass Valley in the early 80s, doing Bay Area gigs with his trio and other gigs all around Northern California. He wrote Mountain Boys Are Free: Portrait of Ned Guthrie, the Musicians' Abraham Lincoln (1993), a profile of the musician who led the fight to repeal the unjust Lea Act.

In 2006 Jim began accompanying the UUCM choir, and that fall became the regular Sunday accompanist, replacing Florence Armour, a classically trained pianist. Win Rogers, former choir member, says "Jim did a wonderful job learning



to be a church musician while remaining true to his musical roots." Jim also accompanied music classes at a local elementary school, and served as President of Chapter 390 of the California School Employees Union, as well as lecturing on performers' rights and the law.



Bill Ham, creator of the psychedelic liquid light shows at the Avalon Ballroom in the 60s, collaborated with Jim in the 70s. When Ham resumed doing light shows in the 2000s, he asked Jim to play for them, and Jim expanded into electronic music, including multiple instruments and orchestra. Most recently, Jim's main focus was on improvisation within the creative processes of composing music and action painting. He had a show of his canvas and silk paintings at UUCM in 2011.

I met Jim in July of 2006, on the first day I showed up at UUCM to

join the choir. He was very responsive to Judy van der Veen's directing, providing dependable underpinning for the choir in many styles of music. As I became chair of the music committee and then music director, we worked more closely together, and he was always modest and straightforward, with a classic Midwestern sense of humor, understated and earthy. He taught me a lot by example about working with other musicians, and speaking up for the underdog. He last played for us in April, and departed this earth on June 12, 2015. June was also my last month as UUCM's music director, and I am honored to have shared these nine years at UUCM with this talented, decent man.


