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Rev. David Usher UUCM Interim Minister

Dear Friends,

It has been gratifying to see that attendance at Sunday services during the summer has been so exceptionally high, even though traditionally things quiet down during July and August and we have had only one service for those months. There have been Sundays when the sanctuary has been full, a fitting response to the excellent services offered by those leading them, guest speakers and our own home-grown talent alike.

And now in September we revert to two services, starting with the Ingathering Water Communion on September 13th which will herald a new year in which much promises to happen. The early service will be Intergenerational, as will the early service each second Sunday of the month this year, when the children will stay in the sanctuary for the whole hour.

While the excellent Search Committee does its work in clarifying the congregation's priorities for the next called minister and then seeks that suitable match, there is much for everyone else to do to make UUCM as attractive as possible for that prospective candidate. The success of the search is ultimately everyone's responsibility.

What will make UUCM attractive to a potential candidate? There are several things.

One is UUCM openness to innovation - new people, new ideas, new programs, new challenges. Does UUCM have an adventurous spirit, willing to adapt to the challenges and opportunities of the moment, or does it cling to what is familiar, comfortable, safe?

Another is how well UUCM manages dissent and discontent. Does it pander to it, or rise above it? None of us actively enjoys discomfort, but discomfort is a vital sign of life. The only time we can be sure we will feel no discomfort is when we are dead. Ideally, there should at all times be something happening at UUCM which you do not personally like. When you identify that thing, ask yourself: Is there someone else in the congregation who does like it? Am I the only person here whose comfort and satisfaction are important? Might it be that when there is something I disapprove, that might actually be an opportunity for my personal growth rather than for me to vent about? As Josh Searle-White, former District staff

Minister's Letter

person, said to a gathering of the leadership in the Spring, "When you disapprove of something, take a deep breath and wait six months."

And a third factor which a potential candidate will likely consider is how engaged members and friends are in the life of the congregation. There is the 80/20 rule, which says that 80% of the work will be done by 20% of the people, and that rule applies to most organisations, but the question is, do most members actively contribute or are they passive consumers? Which are you? Are you more likely to ask "How can I give?" or "What can I get?"

This promises to be an exciting, challenging and very rewarding year, and I am very much looking forward to it. I hope you are too!

Board of Trustees July Meeting Highlights

- The July 1, 2015 membership list was certified at 123 members, one more than last year. This list is used at the basis for UUA/PCD dues payments and for determining eligibility for voting at congregational meetings.
- The Treasurer's Report was reviewed and accepted as presented. Our 2014-15 financial year is projected to close with a \$5,152 loss

versus the budgeted loss of \$18,383.

- The Board appointed Claire Miller as volunteer RE Coordinator for this coming year.
- A paid leave policy was approved as required under new state law.
 For UUCM this currently applies only to the office administrator position.
 The Board voted to credit Conrad Sisk for the hours he worked in 2014-15.
- There was a planning discussion for the Board of Trustees retreat which is scheduled for Sept 16-17.

As part of the retreat, the Board will do a review of the 2014-15 year and develop action plans for the 2015-16 year.

Board of Trustees August Meeting Highlights

- The Board approved a new Child and Youth Safety Policy to be implemented with the start of this new RE year. This policy will soon be available in the Member's section of the UUCM web site.
- The Board made two additions to the UUCM Personnel Manual; the first is the recently approved paid leave policy and the other is the requirement of criminal background checks for employees.
- The Board approved the Social Justice Mission and Action Plan which was developed through a collaborative process over recent weeks.
- Joel Houtman and Carol Wong were appointed to the Negotiating Team for the ministerial search process. Keith Johnson was previously selected by the Search Committee as their representative on the team. This three person

team will be responsible for working out compensation details for our new settled minister.

The Board recently did a site inspection of the five garage units facing School Street. The garages are in serious disrepair and alternative solutions have been developed by the Finance Committee. The Board decided that the course of action should be determined in light of a long term facilities plan.

Search Committee Retreat a Success!

The seven members of your Search Committee and our Ministerial Search Representative, Bob Miess, spent two full days in retreat together on the weekend of August 1-2.

We got to know ourselves better individually and as a group. We shared personal information and examined our prejudices. We learned what motivates each of us and how we can work with

Part of our work was to develop procedural and voting rules and to work on the time-line for our search. There are at least ten functions on the committee, so each of us has at least one lead position and two back-up positions. Taylor Carey is our chair, with George Dunstan as back-up.

Over the next few weeks the Committee will be sending out a survey that each congregation member is urged to complete about your views of UUCM and what we want for our future. The surveys will be followed by small focus groups where the ideas can be further discussed. Please participate in these opportunities, so that the search committee can accurately describe to prospective candidates what UUCM is seeking in a new settled minister. We thank you in advance for your help.

As you all know, UUCM is searching for a new settled minister. What may be less apparent is the critical importance your active participation plays in the search process. By now you have probably been contacted regarding the congregational survey, which is designed help the Search Committee identify the qualities the Congregation would like to see in its new minister. The survey also seeks to explore and, to the extent possible, reveal the heart and soul of the Congregation so we can make these known to prospective candidates. In addition to the survey, the Search Committee will facilitate a series of four Focus Group discussions offering you the opportunity to share your wishes in even greater detail.

The first two Focus Group discussions will take place on September 13, from 9:45 to 10:45 a.m., and again from 11:15 a.m. to 12:15 p.m. The second pair of Focus Group discussions will take place a week later, September 20, at the same times. We simply cannot over stress the importance of your contribution to our search process. We are honored by the faith you have shown in our team. We are happy to do the heavy lifting of finding candidates to serve our wonderful community. But we can't do it without you. Please complete the congregational survey as soon as you can and join us in at least one of the upcoming Focus Groups.

Building & Grounds Review of Summer Projects and Goals for the Coming Year

The UUCM monthly work party took a well-deserved vacation in August. We accomplished a lot this past year! One of our major goals was reduction of the outside watering which was achieved with a lot of hard work and some creative planning. All the outside water lines have been converted to a drip system, and we have new benches in the front and Walsh Street sides, and they look great! Work will continue on the patio area in the next year to continute making it a pleasant area for socializing. We'll also get started on our back yard.

The upstairs Emerson room was painted with help from Amy and Mike, and it looks terrific. We put in new windows in the teen room (aka Potter room) upstairs. The kitchen has been reorganized so it is not so crowded, and we hope to install a new stove this year. All this and more while keeping up on maintenance of our building and grounds both inside and out. Thanks to all those who helped with these projects during this last year. So much can be accomplished when we all work together.

WATER CONSERVATION:

Our effort toward conserving water will be greatly improved if everyone in our community consciously thinks about their water use while at UUCM. Our goal is to be one of the most water efficient buildings in our area, and live up to our commitment to being a green congregation. Shutting off the faucets in our bathrooms seems to be a continuing challenge. Please be sure that they are fully shut off after use – they need to be in the dead center position to be effective. Be conscious of water use especially in the kitchen. One of the problems noticed is continually running the sink faucet when rinsing dishes, etc. This is a waste of water. Using a dish tub for rinsing is a good alternative to running the faucet. Our water records show that our water usage is decreasing, but I believe we can do better. As we continue to become more water conscious, our usage will continue to decrease.

I am looking forward to getting started on the projects we've planned for the coming year. If you want to help us inside or out, we will find a job for you. You will have a good time, make friends, get a great feeling of accomplishment, and contribute to UUCM's welfare! Chalice Circles: A Way To Seek; To Savor; and To Serve

Chalice Circles will be an integral part of congregational life at UUCM this year. Chalice Circles are groups of between six and ten people who gather around a shared interest or availability of time. Chalice Circles enable their members to form deep connection with the others in the group, while at the same time exploring an issue of shared interest and finding ways to serve UUCM and the wider community.

There is a recognised facilitator and preferably a co-facilitator for each group.

Each Circle forms with explicit understandings and commitments

- 1. Maximum size is ten.
- 2. Meetings are at least once a month
- 3. Meetings follow an established format, with worshipful rituals and check-in at the start and end of each meeting
- 4. The facilitators are part of the Leaders' Circle
- 5. There is an empty chair, symbolising the group's openness to welcoming new people. If the group exceeds ten it will birth another group
- 6. Each Circle agrees to its own covenant, but commits to provide a service to UUCM at least once a year, and twice a year to the community

Chalice Circles (previously known as Covenant Groups) offer numerous benefits. As the congregation becomes larger and more diverse and therefore more difficult to know everyone else, they are ways in which individuals can find deeper and more intimate connections with others. This is true not only for newer members seeking their own place within the community, it is true also for those who have been here a while but who want deeper connection. Within that intimacy can come pastoral and emotional support in times of need, as well as getting to know each other at a more profound level. Chalice Circles can coalesce around a shared interest or merely a mutually convenient meeting time. Everyone in UUCM is warmly encouraged to join at least one Chalice Circle. See the Faith Development Prospectus for more details.

Phil Hart and David Usher will co-facilitate two introductory Circle Group evenings at UUCM in the near future. If you are interested in having a taster experience, or want to see which Chalice Circle you would like to join, and particularly if you are interested in forming your own Chalice Circle around a theme you think would interest others but you are not sure what is involved in facilitating such a group, come to one of our introductions. The dates will be announced soon.

Exciting Developments in Social Justice: Congregation Identifies Two Issues: How WILL <u>YOU</u> BE INVOLVED?

The three Social Justice Workshops led by Evan Junker of the UU Justice Ministry in May, June and July were exceptionally well attended and generated a lot of energy and enthusiasm. The process successfully and very clearly identified two main areas for the congregation to focus its efforts – Economic Justice and Environmental Justice, and the Social Justice Committee is now preparing the ground for that work.

Following the lead from the UU Justice Ministry, it is identifying local partners with which to work. For Economic Justice, those partners are Habitat for Humanity; Hospitality House; Interfaith Food Ministry; and Restaurant Opportunities Centers. For Environmental Justice, the partners are South Yuba River Citizens League; Sierra Streams Institute; Wolf Creek Community Alliance; Environmental Justice Coalition for Water/Safe Water Alliance; and Food and Water Watch. The UU Justice Ministry will continue to partner with us in all we do.

A Social Justice Planning Team is contacting all these partners so that at our Service on September 13 and throughout September there will opportunities for you to sign up for the action projects that most appeal to you. How wonderful it would be if every single member and friend of UUCM was involved in some way in this new energy for Social Justice! You might do hands-on work; you might lobby or advocate; you might help organize; you might donate or raise money. All of us can do something. Let's hope all of us will.

MISSION OF SOCIAL JUSTICE COMMITTEE

The mission of the Social Justice Committee is

- a. To provide focus and clarity to our social justice efforts as a congregation.
- b. To facilitate the framework through which the congregation selects its focus issues.
- c. To encourage, enlist, and support UUs in acting on our UU values through our congregationally selected justice issues.
- d. To maintain and develop relationships with our justice partners.
- e. To select the partner organizations that receive our Pass the Plate offerings.
- f. To coordinate our justice ministry with worship, lifespan religious education, and other components of UUCM ministries.

Introducing Tom Lewis, DDS, MDV GUEST SPEAKER AT UUCM ON OCTOBER 4TH

Tom discovered his "untapped" UU values at Humboldt UU fellowship in the early eighties. He became very active in his new religious community HUUF. In 1995 his activity reached a peak as he also discovered his call to the ministry following the death of his mother. In 1996 he moved to Berkeley to attend Pacific School of Religion. After rigorous and eye-opening experiences (chaplaincy training in Humboldt C. Jail, and a large hospital in Atlanta) he graduated in 2001. He returned to the practice of dentistry for a few years before completing a parish internship at Monterey UU Church. Tom then accepted a parish minister position at the Sierra Foothills Congregation in 2004. He served that congregation for two years. He again returned to dentistry and worked for different Native American Clinics. He is now retired and spends most of his time volunteering his services at homeless shelters and other free clinics.

Tom now lives in Chico and is active in the UU Fellowship of Chico. He is collaborating with a Homeless Shelter to create a new pro bono dental clinic. Tom has four wonderful children and seven grandchildren.
