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Minister's Letter

Rev. David Usher UUCM Interim Minister

Dear Friends,

Many UUCM members and friends stayed after the second service on October 11 to hear the presentations by the Board, the Transition Team, and the Ministerial Search Committee. All three presentations included some exciting highlights about what can be expected during this current year.

On behalf of the Board, President Rob Ferroggiaro outlined the main issues which he and his fellow Board members plan to focus on – empowering the Search process, adopting and implementing policies such as Building Usage and Child Safety, and strengthening the committee structure.

As Chair of the Ministerial Search Committee, Taylor Carey thanked the congregation for its excellent response to the recent survey (83%!) and the various focus groups which have been held. He outlined the well-established process recommended by the UUA which the committee is following which, it is hoped, will lead to the successful appointment of the settled minister to start next summer.

All four members of the Transition Team participated in their presentation, referring to the intentional design of an Interim Ministry as a time for change and experimentation, and listing some of the very positive accomplishments of the past five years.

Then Susan Sanford, as herself, gave an additional little presentation about how we each might embrace changes which might initially be uncomfortable. She also mentioned that one reason for the new UUCM Forum was to guard against the possibility of ad hominem postings on the former General list.

The whole meeting lasted less than an hour, and was conducted in a most congenial and positive spirit. All the feedback from members and friends that I heard immediately afterwards was appreciative both of the opportunity to be kept informed, and of those in leadership who are doing such good work.

This will be a very important year in the life of UUCM. I am glad to be a part of it. I hope you are too.

Adult Safety

There are members of UUCM who have taken on the responsibilities as well as the privileges of leadership, serving on the Board, chairing committees, doing all manner of things so that everyone can enjoy what UUCM has to offer. Sometimes those responsibilities include making decisions which will not please everyone, but they make those decisions with good will and intention. But prior and more important than the leadership role which they have undertaken is the fact that all of them first came to UUCM to satisfy their own needs – perhaps for a spiritual home, for a meaningful community, for comfort in a time of pain or distress.

Becoming a leader does not abolish those needs. UUCM's leaders have the right to come to Sunday services or any other program to have their own legitimate needs met and not be ambushed by someone who has a bone to pick.

If you wish to speak to a member of the Board, a committee chair or even the Minister, please refrain from cornering them at a UUCM occasion when they are there for other reasons. Please have the courtesy to make an appointment to speak with them at another mutually convenient time. It is part of our Covenant of Right Relations.

Black Lives Matter Banner

Rev. David's sermon on September 6 addressed the current state of the Black Lives Matter movement, one year on from the unrest in Ferguson, Missouri following the killing of Michael Brown by a police officer. He concluded the sermon by wondering whether UUCM might erect a Black Lives Matter banner as many other UU churches have done. The response to his question was overwhelmingly positive, and at its meeting the following Thursday the Board approved the idea.

A banner has now been commissioned. It will be dedicated on November 1 between the two services, and erected above the main entrance where the Standing on the Side of Love banner is now situated. Before it is put in place, all members and friends of UUCM who wish to do so are invited to sign the back of the banner as a way of registering your personal support and identification with this national movement.

The experience of many UU churches who have erected BLM banners or signs has been to have them vandalized, removed or destroyed. That might be our experience in Grass Valley also. We hope to be motivated by faith and not fear, and as the Rainbow flag was controversial when it was first raised, indeed was stolen, but is now accepted, so we will persevere until Black Lives are as honored and respected by the people of Nevada County as LGBTQ lives now are.



President's Perspective

Rob Ferroggiaro UUCM President

Dear UUCM:

In mid-September the Board of Trustees held their annual retreat which was a great opportunity for team building, reflection, and development of plans for the year ahead. Here are some of the priorities that were identified.

Ministerial Search: The Board and congregation will be supporting the Search Committee financially and otherwise. Also, there is a unique opportunity to distill down all the member input that has been gathered and apply it to guide leadership in the months ahead.

Social Justice: The Social Justice Committee has completed a series of workshops and surveys, and an action plan was endorsed by the Board of Trustees. So far 65 UUCM community members have signed up to work with one of our partner organizations.

Religious Education: It is our intention to rebuild our RE program so we can attract and hire a Director of RE for the 2016-17 year. New ideas are being implemented that have worked elsewhere.

Organization Building:

- Find new ways to help visitors and members build stronger connections to our UU community. Includes expansion of the Chalice Circle program.
- Find new ways to match the skills and interests of our community members to opportunities to serve in rewarding roles as volunteers and lay leaders.
- Continue to develop appropriate policies to guide us; i.e. Child and Youth Safety Policy, and a policy for facilities use and rental.

Long Term Facilities Options: Preliminary assessment of the maintenance and improvements that would be required if we were to commit to staying at our current site long term. Also we'll begin an initial, generalized exploration of alternative approaches to possible relocation. This will be just the start of a long term study which will require extensive research and congregational input. It won't be completed this church year.

Beyond Categorical Thinking

Congratulations are in order for the entire congregation. As some of you may have heard, we had an 83% response rate on the Congregational Survey. What a stellar performance! One of the conclusions from the survey is that we are looking for more diversity at UUCM. A good place to find that is in the selection of our new settled minister. On Sunday, November 15 we'll have the opportunity to broaden our outlook to include the entire universe of UU ministers.

Under the leadership of the UUA, UUCM will participate in the Beyond Categorical Thinking workshop. The Search Committee invites everyone, members and friends alike, to participate in this engaging, interactive program.

We all want to believe we are free from bias, but many of us recall the exercise in which Rev. Usher led us in January where we wrote down a six-word statement about a personal experience of racism. It was startling to see how many events, unbidden thoughts and memories from childhood were tinged with racism. The exercise could just as well have been about many other biases from disability to age to gender to orientation and more.

Ministers in our faith include people of color, bisexual, gay, lesbian, transgender, differently-abled, young, old, ethnically different or of a different class – all of these credentialed ministers still face discrimination as part of the ministerial search process.

The Beyond Categorical Thinking program is designed to promote inclusive thinking and help prevent unfair and unconscious discrimination in the search. It includes a Sunday morning service with a BCT facilitator from the UUA followed by a light lunch and a three-hour conversation guided by the facilitator. In this conversation we will discuss real-life UU case studies and explore how thinking categorically sometimes interferes with choosing the best candidate.

Generosity in All Things UUA Pacific Western Region's 2015 Theme

Rev. Usher's sermon on Sunday, October 11th pointing to and exploring the more personal relevancy of living our seven key UU principles, along with a request for a summary from our Ministerial Search Committee - both turned me in a reflective direction over the last year about what our UUCM Stewardship Program has accomplished and should by all means make us feel proud as a congregation, because together:

- we shifted to a culture where we can talk about money as a congregation - we don't shy away from the conversations or the "ask"
- we emphasized the importance of supporting our ministries with our pledge revenue as a community, not just paying the mortgage, light bill and minister's salary
- we created and completed a new design and format for our annual pledge campaign based on a theme of the spiritual benefits that can come from generosity; focusing on not everyone being in a position to give at the same level but rather that everyone can be generous within their means
- we aimed for a 15% overall pledge revenue increase in creating our 2015-16FY budget and successfully landed on that target
- we successfully executed numerous fundraising events to meet our 2014-15FY budget
- we are continuing to lay the groundwork for generosity in all things as it relates to actions for daily congregational life - how we can infuse this concept in our congregations by looking at praise and gratitude, the assumption of good faith around process, attentive listening, mentorship and perhaps most importantly, embracing change through the lens of generosity
- we are building the stepping stones towards better stewarding of beloved community both within and beyond UUCM's congregational walls
- we are looking to restructure our Stewardship committee to better serve our community internally and externally

In 2002, when I became the minister of our congregation in Ventura, California, there was no minister's discretionary fund. When I left in June of this year we were giving away every offering, totaling over \$45,000 a year. A few of those offerings went to our Inreach/Outreach

Fund, but the majority went to recipients chosen by our congregation's members.

How do we grow this kind of generosity? Well, it's a process. In the Pacific Western Region, we are focusing on an understanding of "Generosity in All Things." This is both a goal and the path. In Ventura, we found the process included things like assuming good intentions and examining the ways "scarcity thinking" was impacting our individual and shared lives. It involved looking at our role in the larger community. In my new role as Congregational Life Staff, I am excited about two upcoming webinars that will help move us toward a better shared understanding of how we might live out "Generosity in All Things." UUCM 2014-15 Fiscal Year Open Pledge Balances

A short administrative and financial housekeeping note to our beloved community regarding remaining open balances on last year's pledges. We have now entered the second quarter of our current 2015-2016 fiscal year (July 1, 2015 through June 30, 2016). Any remaining open balances for the prior 2014-15 fiscal year (July 1, 2014 through June 30, 2015) will be written off so we may close our financial books for last year. This amounts to approximately 3.8% of the total amount pledged for 2014-15, but not received. All congregants have been contacted about remaining open balances on their account.

UUCM Stewardship does not view its job to be a collection agency, nor to badger our congregants about monies pledged and owed. After appropriate reminders from our bookkeeper and the Stewardship Committee, we will move onward and upward in our current fiscal year. We will no longer carry over a prior year balance and apply a current year payment to that old balance. This is too confusing and complicated for our bookkeeper, the Stewardship Committee and our congregants. You may see a prior year balance as a line item notation for the prior fiscal year, but that's where it will stop. We are growing large enough that one-on-one follow-up become less and less viable, and we trust our congregants to make their commitments as pledged.

Meeting our annual pledge revenue target is extremely important, but the Friends and Members of our community and their specific financial challenges are equally, if not more, important. We care about you and are here to assist in all ways possible, but we do very much appreciate communication of specific situations rather than no response at all.

Building & Grounds Report

WATER CONSERVATION:

Congratulations! In the last month UUCM has used 24% less water than all of our neighbors. Our water usage has been below 900 gallons per day. This has been accomplished by all of you thinking of your water use at UUCM. For those who remember from last month, our percentage use difference is less than the previous month, but this is because we had a long way to go in decreasing our water consumption. We are still 23% higher than our neighbors for the year, but it is much better than the 50% higher we were last spring. As this year moves forward, we will continue to work at making UUCM a pillar of what can be accomplished by people who care.

B&G MEETING:

One of the topics this month was a discussion about setting up a list of routine projects that can be accomplished by an individual person. This came up after one of our members suggested such a list for people who might not be able to make it on weekends. A list would allow a person to sign up to do a specific project on a different day. There would be reoccurring projects on a monthly basis or one time tasks that need to be accomplished during a month's time. If a task was reoccurring, an individual would not have to sign up for every month. I would like your input. I will post this item on our UUCM Forum in November for discussion.

SPECIAL THANKS:

I would specifically like to thank Mike Stolla for his behindthe-scenes help in keeping our heating and air conditioning system functioning. The implementation of the Social Justice Work Plan is well under way. 65 members and friends, which comprises a majority of the congregation, have signed up to work with our justice partners. Since many people volunteered to work with more than one partner, a grand total of 126 volunteer assignments were filled. When I conveyed this information to Evan Junker, Executive Director of the UU Justice Ministry, his comment was "that is epic." We may not be on the cover of *Rolling Stone* anytime soon, but the cover of *UU World* is a distinct possibility.

But now the real work begins. Social Justice Committee members have recently met face-to-face with staff from Sierra Streams Institute, Habitat for Humanity, and YouthBuild, and other meetings are scheduled. The short term goal is to match the specific needs of each partner with the passion and commitment of our members. If you want to help with this work just let me know.

At its October meeting the Social Justice Committee discussed the Friday Film Forums which currently take place at UUCM in collaboration with the Peace and Justice Center.
