The Survey initiated last autumn by the Ministerial Search Committee provided some fascinating information about the state of the congregation, and this information will be available to prospective ministers as they consider their possible interest in coming to UUCM.

It is an integral part of the role of the Interim Minister to help prepare the congregation for the arrival of that next Settled Minister. As part of that preparation, at 12:45 P.M. on Sunday, January 10 he will offer his perspectives about the Survey, highlighting not only what he sees as UUCM's strengths but also those areas in which he thinks there is still some work to be done.

This State of the Union meeting, hosted by the Transition Team, will not be the same as a Town Talk, but there will be a chance for some questions and conversation. The meeting will last approximately one hour, with the Transition Team providing some simple snacks.

All members are encouraged to attend.

Board's Perspective

Dear Members & Friends:

Each December the Finance Committee reviews our General Funds budget and projects our financial status through the end of the fiscal year (June 30). Based on this analysis, we anticipate a shortfall in income with only a small offsetting decrease in expenses. UUCM has a good financial base, so this year's shortfall is something we can manage. The Finance Committee and the Board believe the congregation should be aware of the likelihood that we will not receive our projected income for this year.

TOTAL INCOME SHORTFALL of \$16,200 is possible in the following areas:

Pledges (\$10,000 less than projected):

- New member/friend growth was projected to increase to 141, but remains around 130.
- Unpaid pledges from last fiscal year that were written off (\$5,800)
- Some members are experiencing hardships and will be unable to meet their original pledge
- A few members have left UUCM

Plate (\$1,600 less than projected)

Misc Income (+ \$300)

Fundraising (\$2,000 less than projected):

- Forecasts which were made in April will be adjusted downward.

Rental Income (\$2,900 less than projected):

- Garages are no longer being rented as storage units and are in need of repairs
- Projected rent from upstairs unit did not materialize

Expenses: Offsetting part of the shortfall in income is an estimated reduction in expenses of \$3,819, primarily in RE and Stewardship.

The revised forecast for FY 15-16 is a shortfall of \$12,791 compared to the original budgeted shortfall of \$352. Monthly financial statements are posted on the UUCM bulletin board along with the Board Meeting Minutes. UUCM has sufficient

cash to cover this loss should it occur. In the last four years we have had a net gain of \$27,310. With this carryover, we will not need to dip into our reserves of \$45K.

Money received to date for the Ministerial Search Fund is \$17,668 and is not included in our General Funds Profit and Loss. It is managed separately and is not part of the General Funds Operating Budget addressed in this email. This money will not be used to cover any shortfall.

The Board and Finance Committee are confident that we are in a good financial position to manage this possible deficit. Your generous pledges and continued participation in UUCM fundraisers sustain our member and outreach programs. For this, we are grateful.

Finishing the Year with a Flurry

(written in mid-December)

Sometimes projects have a lot of “hurry up and wait” time. The Ministerial Search has entered a “hurry up and hurry some more” phase. Exciting things are happening on several fronts.

As you know, we completed the Congregational Record (the CR) and the Survey and were then able to share them with each of you. In addition, we shared them with the Transitions Office of the UUA, and our CR is available for review by ministers. Our Packet, which is an extensive online report about our congregation and Nevada County, is out in draft form to our Ministerial Settlement Representative (MSR). By the time you read this it will be ready for the next step in the process.

At the end of December the search committee will have a three-hour meeting with Bob Miess, our MSR, who will consult with us on the next steps we need to take.

Shortly after that meeting we will be notified about ministers who have expressed interest in knowing more about us. The Search Committee will have the opportunity to review the Ministerial Record, much like our own CR, of those ministers. We will then exchange Packets with those in whom we have an interest.

As you can well imagine, this is an exciting time and everyone will want to know everything. Unfortunately, the Committee will not be able to divulge any information about the candidates, not their names, current locations or any attributes about them. Not even to our BFFs, spouses or therapists.

There are several good reasons for this rule of confidentiality:

- Ministers who are currently in a parish may not have yet told their present congregation that they are contemplating a move. Their parishioners are entitled to hear the news from their own minister at the appropriate time. Any leak of information could damage their relationship with their present congregation and could jeopardize our chances of attracting that candidate.

- When the identities of candidates are known, it heightens the competitive aspect of the search process, possibly hurting collegial feelings among ministers and between congregations.
- It is harder to resolve differences within the Search Committee if the names are public, especially if congregation members are tempted to lobby for one candidate or another. We are human, after all, and it is better to resolve any differences we may have in private, without well-meaning outside input.

We will continue to be willing and able to discuss the process and where we are in the search process, just not the particulars.

As a reminder, Candidating Week will run from May 1, when the candidate will preach a sermon, through May 8 when the candidate will preach a second time. In the period between May 1 and May 8, congregation members will have ample opportunity to get to know the candidate better.

On May 8, immediately following the second service, we will have a Congregational Meeting, and all members present will have the opportunity to discuss and vote on calling our candidate to be our new settled minister. We recognize that this date is Mother’s Day, but our choices were somewhat limited. To go one or two weeks earlier would have conflicted with our District Assembly which our candidate, and several of you, may want to attend. To go one week later would not solve the problem of having such an important sermon on Mother’s Day, and two weeks later is getting very late for future planning both for the congregation and for the candidate.

In the spirit of our Fifth Principle we hope everyone will be able to attend on May 8 to exercise their right to engage in our democratic process. We think your mother would approve.

Dr. Basim Elkarra, Executive Director of the Council on American-Islamic Relations in the Sacramento Valley, will be our guest speaker at both services on January 24. After the second service, he will lead an hour long Q&A session for everyone who wants to stay behind.

At a time when political demagoguery is fueling anti-Islamic hysteria, when ignorance about Islam allows this shameless discrimination and victimization, when fellow citizens are being targeted for personal abuse and violence in a country which vaunts freedom of religion as a fundamental constitutional right, it is imperative that we inform ourselves as much as we can about Islam so that we can counter this poisoning of society.

Basim Elkarra is the Executive Director of the Sacramento office of the Council on American-Islamic Relations (CAIR-SV). For over a decade, Elkarra has founded and run CAIR-CA's youth leadership program at the State Capitol. Elkarra is a member of the California Democratic Party's (CDP) Executive Board and Chairs the Affirmative Action Committee. Elkarra was recently appointed to the Sacramento Community Police Commission. He also regularly appears in the media as a commentator on civil liberties issues. 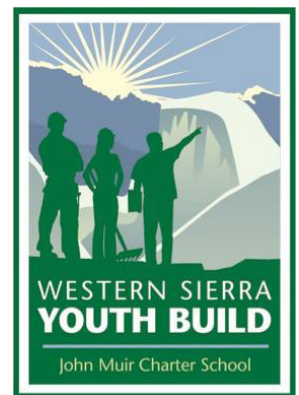
