See you in church! (For a little while longer.)

Rev David

I offer my sincere appreciation for the many kindnesses you have shown me, and my heart-felt good wishes for your future

Dear Friends,

This will be my final minister's column in *The Mountain Chalice*. Whatever the outcome of the Candidating Week with the Rev. Kevin Tarsa (and of course I share your optimism about that), the rules about Interim Ministry require that I must leave you by the end of June. Many of you have kindly asked about my plans. I will be marrying Rev. Vail Weller on August 6 and living with her in her home in San Mateo. I had planned to take early retirement to give myself time to pursue other interests, but now I am also exploring some possible part-time ministerial opportunities. Whatever happens, I am excited by the next chapter which awaits me.

And I sense your excitement about the next chapter which awaits you. You are impatient to meet your candidate, to experience how he conducts worship, to get a sense of his character, his style and what he has to offer, and then to decide whether or not he is the minister you want, while hoping he decides you are the congregation he wants. There are few decisions more important in a congregation's life than the choice of its minister. Candidating week will be a full and fascinating week for all of you, and I encourage you to participate as often and in as many different ways as you can, and certainly to attend services on both Sundays.

But, as excited as you rightly are, I offer also a word of friendly caution. Rev. Kevin Tarsa might be your chosen one, but he is NOT the Messiah! No minister is. He will undoubtedly bring many talents that will fully vindicate the Search Committee's enthusiasm about him, but he will not please everyone all of the time and it is unfair and unrealistic to expect him to do so. Indeed, pleasing everyone all of the time is not the work of authentic ministry anyway. And you, as a congregation, will continue to have whatever weaknesses, foibles and internal tensions are uniquely yours. Who you are as individuals and as a congregation will not change overnight simply because there is someone else in the pulpit.

It has been my honor to have served as your Interim Minister since September 2014. The work of ministry is never complete, but I think we have journeyed well together in spite of, and sometimes because of, the tensions inherent in transitional change. There are so many people in this congregation it has been my true pleasure to know and work with; people of deep integrity, rigorous minds, generous and loving hearts, and willing hands.

Auto-Deductions and Online Pledge Payment Options

Beloved Community,

Wasn't Generosity Sunday fun and inspirational? Conrad and the Banner Mountain Boys were fabulous and the treats were...well, a real treat. It took many hands to make Sunday so enjoyable. Thank you to all who helped make this possible!

It made me proud to be a UU, when Rev. Vail told us how our Fair Share Dues to UUA and PCD have changed lives of others around the country. Your generous pledges to UUCM also allow us to bring transformation to lives in our corner of the world.

Since many of you increased your pledges, I have been receiving inquiries on how to increase automatic electronic deductions effective July 1. Here is some information on how to do this, how to avoid paying fees, and how to set up new checking account/credit card deductions:

IF YOU ALREADY HAVE AUTO-DEDUCTIONS SET UP:

I will make any needed adjustments for you effective July 1 based on your FY16-17 pledge form. No action is needed on your part. The same checking account or credit card will be used as it is now. If you would like to change the method of payment or card expiration date, just let me know.

More Board News

IF YOU WOULD LIKE TO SET UP A NEW AUTO-DEDUCTION:


You can have your pledge payment deducted directly from your checking account or charged to your credit card. Just go to the UUCM website Home page http://www.uugrassvalley.org/ and click on "On-line Giving". Then, follow the prompts. Or just call me and I will get this set up for you.

What are the fees for these transactions?

Auto-deductions from your checking account have no fees for UUCM.

Auto-deduction for credit cards costs UUCM approximately \$3 in fees per \$100 donation. You are given the option of

paying for part of these fees, but my recommendation is that you do not do this. If you choose to pay part of the fees, it actually results in both you and UUCM paying fees to our service provider, who gets more money this way. What a gimmick. If you would like to pay for some of these fees, just increase your pledge payment by about \$3 per \$100 monthly donation. The entire \$103 will show as your annual pledge paid and will count toward your tax deductible donation to UUCM for the year. A win for everyone except the banks!



CONVERT YOUR AUTO-PAY TO AN AUTO-DEDUCT:

If you have an auto-pay set up through your bank, did you know that UUCM actually gets a check in the mail for these? Save paper, postage, and UUCM volunteer time by setting up an auto-deduction from your checking account. Just go to the UUCM website Home page http://www.uugrassvalley.org/ and click on "On-line Giving" and follow the prompts. Or just call me and I will get this set up for you. Then, remember to cancel your auto-pay.

Your generosity is a blessing to the Community, Nevada County, and our country. Thank you for your financial commitment and for sharing yourselves in making this a better world.

We Hear Music in the Air!

By now we hope you have heard our joyful news: We have a candidate, and we think he is wonderful. Rev. Kevin Tarsa comes to us with an extensive background in music, having served for 23 years as Music Director and then Minister of Music in another UU church. Most recently he served two years as Interim Minister at the Beaufort, South Carolina UU church. That congregation was enthusiastic in its endorsement of Rev. Kevin, writing that they were so sorry he couldn't stay to be their settled minister. He has a terrific empathetic manner, is committed to collaborative leadership and represents the kind of minister you all told us you were looking for. He is the Search Committee's unanimous, first-ballot choice, and we are his first choice – a wonderful result!

So now what? Now, dear congregation, IT'S YOUR TURN. We will have CANDIDATE WEEK from May 1 through May 8.

What is Candidate Week?

This is the time Rev. Kevin gets to engage with many of you, and you will each have many opportunities to interact with him. There will be events every day from which you can choose. Several of these will be formatted like Town Talks, each one centered on a particular theme. Want to know our

candidate's views on worship? There will be a forum on that. Especially interested in social justice? There will be a forum on that. Caring and Membership? There is a forum for that. Also, Stewardship, Finance and Endowment.

There will be a special event for the youth, their parents and others with an interest in RE. Friday night will bring an all-congregational potluck dinner, and there will even be a jam session for musicians on Saturday afternoon. Details of all the opportunities will be published soon in e-Chalice alerts.

HIGHLIGHTS OF THE WEEK

will be the two services that Rev. Kevin will prepare: May 1 (with our usual two services) and May 8 which will be a single service at 11:00, followed by the congregational vote to call Rev. Kevin Tarsa to be our settled minister.

What does it mean to "call" a minister?

For a minister to become our settled minister we must "call" him, and he has to know we really want him. So, we call really loudly. Our by-laws require we have a congregational vote to call a minister. There must be a quorum, and 90% or more

of the congregants present at the meeting (no proxy voting permitted) must vote in favor of the call. However, even that may not be enough. Many ministers won't accept the call unless 95% or more of those present vote for the new minister. We are so happy with Rev. Kevin that we are hoping for a 100% affirmative vote.

As a minister who heard him at GA told us: "He is the real deal." We hope for your full support for Rev. Kevin.

On April 9 Janet Dunstan, Yvonne Mills, and I attended the UU Justice Ministry's Regional Training in Stockton. We received a lot of practical tips about how to implement a social justice program at the congregational level. But perhaps the most interesting discussion was more theoretical; what is Beloved Community and how can we incorporate it into our social justice ministry? (For a more comprehensive review of this topic, see www.bethelove.net.)



The author of the term Beloved Community was Grass Valley's own Josiah Royce. Later, Beloved Community became the foundation of Dr. Martin Luther King's theology of justice. Contrary to popular belief, King did not see racial justice as an end in itself. Instead, he envisioned a radical transformation of our relationships which would create the Beloved Community. According to Dr. King, justice in the Beloved Community is "love correcting everything that stands against love." What does the Beloved Community look like and how can we help build it at UUCM? The chart on this page can give us some answers.

Compare the differences between the dominant paradigm and the Beloved Community. The dominant paradigm is

political, while the Beloved Community is spiritual and religious. Fighting for our rights is the objective in the dominant paradigm: building right relationships is the cornerstone of the Beloved Community. Justice in the dominant paradigm is a system of rewards and punishments; justice in the Beloved Community is love.

- Issues reflect a way of life to be transformed
- Identity shapes us, but does not limit who we are
- Proactive: motivated by hope
- Engages for one's own sake, too
- Focuses on being the change we want to see



Women's Spirituality Group Plans Service Project

The Women's Spirituality Group (WSG) is a lively experiment with the model suggested in "The Complete Guide to Small Group Ministry: Saving the World Ten at a Time." There is much research to support the use of carefully focused small groups to enrich a congregation's feeling of intimacy, an important task for us as UUCM grows.

The WSG was set up to consistently follow this model. This type of group may focus on any topic or activity, meets at least once a month, and uses a format that opens with a centering reading and a personal check-in ritual. The facilitators are specifically trained in the small group ministry model, and themselves participate in an on-going facilitator's group for support and additional training.

One of the key concepts is doing service projects as a group. After a discussion of many options, the WSG recently decided to offer a "complete package" Sunday service as a gift to UUCM. On July 24 we will plan and execute the service itself and cover the greeting, usher, and hospitality needs as well. (There will be more specifics about this project in the next issue of the *Mountain Chalice*.)

Another important concept is the expectation that at least one new group will be born when this group ends (late July). There will likely be another women's group, and possibly a group with a different focus. If you would like to explore the special sharing that can happen in this type of small group (either as a member or facilitator), WSG co-facilitators Scottie Hart (272-5022) and Dawn Bateman (273-6471) would be glad to keep you in the loop as new groups form.
