# **Panning for Gold**

After exploring the nature of covenant in September, in our tradition and in this congregation, we turn in October to the theme of healing: What does it mean to be a community of healing?

It is a very natural progression, from the mutual promises we make in community, to both the hurt that comes with broken promises and the healing we can find within beloved community.

We'll look in-house first, to how we can care for one another, then turn to how we might offer a healing presence in the wider world, then explore stories of communal healing, call ourselves to both enjoy and employ forgiveness, and end the month remembering those who have died whom we have loved and who have loved us.

In my own life experience healing has never been something I could rush. I've learned to give healing time, as awful as I may feel in the interim. Sometimes people around us, in their own discomfort with our suffering, urge us to move on and get over it. They set their own timeline for our journey, meaning to be helpful, but their expectations, if we take them on, often only add to the burden. We must heal in our own time, and in the

ways that are available to us. I have learned also, however, that I can helpfully invest energy in environments, activities, ways of being, and among people that facilitate my healing.

You may have a very personal and perhaps private wound that comes to mind as you read this, a pain, an illness, a dis-ease, or a healing that is occupying much of your thought and energy. Watch for a special healing service in October – a

gentle music- and ritual-filled service of healing and care on an afternoon or evening. Any time, please let me or the Caring Committee know how we can support you, and know that the weekly Drop-in Support Circle is a chance to share and to know that you are not alone.

You may be a person who has felt wounded by people's behaviors in the congregation, the emotional blows landed, knowingly or unknowingly, by anxious people in anxious times. Several members have suggested the need for healing in this community, and the need, with a sense of urgency, to DO something about it. My sense is that such healing will not unfold quickly, though we'll need to discover that together. What I see now is the need to nurture an environment in



which healing can take place. I see the need to invest energy in activities and behaviors and ways of being that facilitate health and healing and wholeness. I ask for your ongoing help in that.

October, with its theme of healing, is not meant to be a month of "getting over it" and "moving on," but rather a month of getting into it and moving in, of preparing our hearts, our minds, and our ways of being for a much deeper and more meaningful healing. I believe it will be an investment well spent.

# **Board Perspective**

## Town Talk Plans

The Board of Trustees recently gave thought to our practice of holding Town Talks. These periodic gatherings in the sanctuary have been used for open discussion of various topics. We quickly came up with a series of questions that needed clear answers: What is the goal of the Town Talk meetings? How are topics determined and by whom? Will decisions be made at the Town Talk? How will Town Talks be conducted? At what frequency will Town Talks be held?

After study and discussion we share with you the BOT's plan for future Town Talks.

- The goal of Town Talks is to provide an opportunity for UUCM members to come together to discuss topics that connect to the work and operation of UUCM, topics of interest and usefulness to the congregation and the BOT. Town Talk discussion will complement, and not replace, the appropriate work of the BOT, committees, task forces and other teams of UUCM members. Town Talks are just one of the ways to share and stay connected. Town Talks will serve some and not others. For those who choose to attend, the meetings are an opportunity to share ideas and suggestions on chosen topics related to practices, programs, and operations of UUCM.
- Discussion will generally be limited to one or two topics announced in advance. Topics will be selected by the BOT based on input and suggestions from members.
- Town Talks will not include decisions on questions raised at the meetings. Discussions that require further action or decision will be referred to the appropriate place, for example, to the BOT, a committee, a task force, or congregational meeting.
- Town Talks will convene after the second Sunday service and will be held quarterly at a minimum, up to monthly as indicated by topics and interest.
- Without going into details here, we have ideas for room arrangement, good facilitation, note taking, length of Town Talks (one hour), balanced participation, and other considerations that will help us all have successful Town Talks.

 Town Talks and their topics will be announced in multiple ways well in advance along with what will come next, when, and by whom, on the topics.

With this plan we are feeling very positive about how future Town Talks will serve the congregation by providing opportunities for:

- 1. Communicating on important and specific topics
- 2. Gaining member feedback
- 3. Building relationships through social interaction
- 4. Allowing UUCM leaders to assess the "pulse" of those participating in Town Talks
- 5. Helping people feel heard and acknowledged in a face-to-face environment
- 6. Members sharing information outward and upward (as opposed to BOT to Congregation)

We expect the next Town Talk to be held in October. Please watch for the announcement and come and join in.

Since greeters and ushers have many overlapping duties, we have decided to team up. This will mean that we need just three volunteers per service rather than four. There will be a lead greeter, a lead usher and a greeter/usher combo who will assist in both areas.

The Lead Usher is responsible for putting out handicap parking signs, putting up the flag, assisting people as they come in, collecting the offering and making sure the sanctuary is in good order, and more.

The Lead Greeter helps visitors with badges and visitor cards, info about UUCM and UU in general, helps direct families to RE, and is available after the service to answer questions.

The Greeter/Usher greets people as they come in, answers questions, helps collect the offering and assists with other tasks as needed.

We need a few more people to help out. If you would be interested in greeting and/or ushering once a month, please let someone at the Membership table know. It's a job that happens while you are at UUCM already, with no lengthy meetings or commitments. We plan to offer a training session soon. Come find out what you can do to help!



# *Planning Ahead for the Hospitality Hour!*

I'm trying to set up a good system for running the Hospitality Hour between the services and I need your help. Each Sunday we need four to six people to setup or cleanup, and donations of goodies to serve. The actual tasks are as follows:

**SET-UP:** This is done during the early service from 9:45 to ~10:30. You set the tables, make the coffee, and arrange the food on plates and platters. After the Hospitality Hour, you can attend the second service.

**CLEAN-UP:** Attend the first service, then come back for the Hospitality Hour and when the second service starts, you clear the tables, put away the food, and clean the kitchen. This should take 30-45 minutes.

FOOD DONATIONS: Each week we need donations of two or three sweet treats and two or three healthy treats – preferably

dropped off in the kitchen before the first service.

During the Hospitality Hour, the crew is responsible for keeping the coffee pots full, and tables stocked and tidy.

I'd like to plan out several months if possible instead of scrambling each week for volunteers. You can help by contacting me and letting me know if you can commit to:

- 1. Set-up or clean-up once a month or every other month
- 2. Bring goodies once a month or every other month
- 3. Both work a shift and bring food.
- 4. Be on a list to be called when needed.

## Forum Working Group

# Forum Working Group Report and Recommendations

The original Forum was restricted due to concerns about its appropriate use. The Forum Working Group (FWG) was created to address the Congregation's concerns about the Forum. The FWG was composed of four members of the Transition Team, four representatives of the signers of the Letter of Concern, and four members of the congregation at large; eight of whom are still active.

The FWG was guided by our perception that we held a sacred trust to create a Forum that meets the needs and wishes of our community. We worked together well and found that we had far more in common than we had in disagreements. We were able to put together this report and these recommendations using the process of consensus. This had a healing effect and points the way for the future.

The FWG met one to three times a month since March, 2016. We conducted a congregational survey about the Forum. Community response was significant, with 74 respondents providing an overwhelming number of thoughtful responses and comments. After evaluating and quantifying the survey results, we constructed Forum Guidelines that we believe best meet the community's needs.

Our Guideline recommendations include: Forum Purpose, User Agreement, Appropriate Content, Moderation, Technical Implementation, Rollout Plan, and Additional Recommendations (view at this link: http://www.uugrassvalley. org/wp-content/uploads/2016/09/FWG-Forum-Guidelines-Recommendations-Final-Draft-9-19-16.pdf); along with Survey Result Graphs (view at this link: http://www.uugrassvalley.org/ wp-content/uploads/2016/09/FWG-Pretty-graphs.pdf).

#### HIGHLIGHTS ARE AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. The Forum should continue, with several changes.
- 2. Users will agree to a "User's Agreement" before using the Forum.
- 3. The Forum will be moderated by a transparent combination of both users and a Designated Moderator Team.
- 4. Two ongoing teams will be created: a Moderator Team and a Tech Team.
- Technical changes will be made to make the Forum more user-friendly; Conrad's hours and budget for implementation to be determined by Board of Trustees (BOT).

- 6. BOT to set date for Congregational Forum Meeting. Initial and ongoing training will be scheduled and available through multiple methods and opportunities.
- 7. After six months, the Forum Working Group will reevaluate and make recommendations as needed.
- 8. Our work also impels us to highly recommend:
  - The creation of an ongoing Conflict Resolution Team;
  - The re-evaluation of UUCM's Covenant;

• The preservation of existing face-to-face church communications methods (e.g., routine Town Talks, "A Board Member Is In", etc.);

• The creation of new face-to-face communication methods (e.g., monthly family potlucks, small group discussions, etc.); and,

• The re-evaluation of UUCM's Mission and Vision Statements.
