Director of Religious Education Search Update

I am very happy to inform you that UUCM's Acting Director of Religious Education, Kristin Famula, is able to continue in the current role through December 31, during the formal search for a permanent Director of Religious Education (DRE). Kristin will be eligible to apply for the position.

As UUCM's minister, I am charged by the congregation with

the hiring, supervising and discharging of staff, in consultation with the Board. In the absence of a amilies Small formal Religious Education Committee, I have asked the current Religious Education Visioning Team to serve as an advisory team and to assist **JUSTICE** me in the search. Current members are: Liberty 🎼 Frederick, Jo Waters, Rene Wiley, Marilyn 👹 Winters, Adult RE Chair Keith Johnson, and Board liaison Lindsay Dunckel.

In its ministerial search survey last year the congregation named Religious Education (RE) as a top priority. The survey itself garnered significant

feedback from the congregation members, and as UUCM's summer RE consultant, Kristin gathered additional feedback from members and friends. These sources will inform the search process. If you have additional insight you want to share, please contact me. I'll be glad to hear from you.

The Board and Finance Committee are discerning how best to seek funding for the DRE position for the remainder of the fiscal year. (The original budget anticipated the hiring of a DRE in 2017, however given Kristin's availability, talent and expertise, the Board chose to spend that money in the first part of the year in order to invest well in Religious Education at UUCM. A wise decision, I say.)

Stay tuned! I will keep you updated as the search process progresses.

Our theme this month: What does it mean to be a community of story?

Native writer and scholar Thomas King claims, "The truth about stories is, that's all we are." If that's true, we have no choice about whether or not to be a community of story. Our choice is only about which

stories to tell and how, and, underneath it all, why?

More and more often in my life I see how the story we tell about ourselves, about what has happened, and about who others are shapes the way we see and imagine and act.

The presidential election offers potent examples. Is the election inescapably "rigged," and so calling into question the foundational trust that holds the nation together? Is one's political opponent (of any party) inevitably inherently corrupt? Are half the Trump supporters indeed "deplorable" and therefore dismissible, unworthy of respect and understanding? Of course these stories, these framings, arise out of other stories that shape the way we hear them and that influence Programs Before Community Risk Groups Exam our receptivity.

What is the story we tell about people in the other political party(s)? What is the story we tell about the original Thanksgiving? What are the stories we tell about black lives, or white lives Action Group or people who disagree with us or who act differently in the world than we do?

Religious traditions and their adherents are shaped by their central story and shaped as well, over time, by the particular ways that central story is told - the covenantal relationship established between JHWH (G-d) and Abraham, the life, teachings, death and resurrection of Jesus, the multi-life spiritual journey of Gautama Buddha, the divine message channeled by Muhammad - each of them told in ways that lead to widely varying outcomes and behaviors. How the story is told matters.

Black Black Lives Matter Matter

Update on Black Lives Matter

Deep gratitude to all who participated in the October 23 World Café conversation regarding what this congregation will do in response to the theft of its Black Lives Matter banners. Here's a brief initial report out from that gathering and an invitation to invest energy in the steps to which you are drawn.

What We Did

Gail Johnson Vaughan and I invited the 40+ participants into a series of small group conversations. After spending 20 minutes with one question, people changed groups between questions, and so ideas, perspectives, new awarenesses and new questions gradually percolated through the room and informed conversations.

The questions were designed to focus people's discernment first on the deeper "why's," then the internal work or behavior changes that moving toward those "why's" might ask of people, and finally to specific steps to be taken. How would you answer them?

- 1. What change do we want to see as a result of our response to the banner theft?
- 2. What would seeking that change require of us?
- 3. What next steps would lead to the change we want to see?

After the round of questions, we asked each table to choose two key insights to share and one next step to recommend to the large group. Finally, we asked people to sign up for the next step(s) to which they were willing to give energy to help it happen, and to identify those steps about which they felt strongly, whether or not they were willing or able to bring personal energy to them at this time.

The Categories of Next Steps Named

You'll notice that many involve learning. As you read them, consider: To which steps are you willing to give energy so that they might happen? Which steps matter most to you, or feel most important?

- Decide on a proposal for an action plan through a consensus process by the congregation.

Out of this, I can imagine a couple teams of people who are working to bring these steps to life. If you are drawn to and have energy to devote to any of these actions, sign up at UUCM Saturday or Sunday morning, or contact Rev. Kevin (minister@uugrassvalley.org)

Thank you to those of you who have "let's just get it done" energy, for your patience with this process of conversation and reflection. My hope is that the thefts of the banner will invite you into deeper understanding and awareness, as well as and as a grounding for courageous collective action. It's both/and. As the slogan invites, let's "Keep talking" and " Start doing."

Since greeters and ushers have many overlapping duties, we have decided to team up. This will mean that we need just three volunteers per service rather than four. There will be a lead greeter, a lead usher and a greeter/usher combo who will assist in both areas.

The Lead Usher is responsible for putting out handicap parking signs, putting up the flag, assisting people as they come in, collecting the offering and making sure the sanctuary is in good order, and more.

The Lead Greeter helps visitors with badges and visitor cards, info about UUCM and UU in general, helps direct families to RE, and is available after the service to answer questions. The Greeter/Usher greets people as they come in, answers questions, helps collect the offering and assists with other tasks as needed.

We need more people to help out! If you can commit to greeting and/or ushering once a month or every other month, please let someone at the Membership table know. It's a job that happens while you are at UUCM already, with no lengthy meetings or commitments. We can train you on the spot. It's fun and easy and a great way to meet people and help out.



Planning Ahead for the Hospitality Hour!

SET-UP: This is done during the early service from 9:45 to ~10:30. You set the tables, make the coffee, and arrange the food on plates and platters. After the Hospitality Hour, you can attend the second service.

CLEAN-UP: Attend the first service, then come back for the Hospitality Hour and when the second service starts, you clear the tables, put away the food, and clean the kitchen. This should take 30-45 minutes.

FOOD DONATIONS: Each week we need donations of two or three sweet treats and two or three healthy treats – preferably dropped off in the kitchen before the first service.

Social Justice Committee is Hard at Work

With the church year in full swing, the Social Justice Committee is hard at work on a variety of fronts, including the following:

- The entire congregation is deciding on the proper response to the theft of the Black Lives Matter banner. The Committee stands ready to assist in the implementation of that collective decision. Stay tuned.
- 2) Together with the Acting DRE and the RE Visioning Team, the Committee is co-sponsoring a five day UU College of Social Justice youth BorderLinks trip this summer. There is space for up to five RE youth to make this trip to the Arizona/Mexico border. For more information about the trip, contact Kristin Famula or me.
- 3) We continue to build relationships with our social justice partners in order to mutually pursue social justice in our community. Examples include partnering with The Sierra Fund to alleviate the toxic legacy of mining in Nevada County, advocating with SYRCL in opposition to the proposed Centennial Dam, and promoting tiny homes for the homeless with Western Sierra YouthBuild and Sierra Roots.
- 4) The Committee coordinates on-going service projects such as Habitat for Humanity lunches, Hospitality House meals, food distribution for Inter-Faith Food Ministry, and several more. December Pass the Plate Beneficiary HALO STANDS FOR HIV / AIDS LOCAL OUTREACH By Greg Fancher, Member, Social Justice Committee

HALO is an organization within our Public Health Services that funds expenses for those living with HIV / AIDS in Nevada County. Many people living with this lifelong illness are poor or under the poverty level. Many are physically and / or mentally challenged and do not work full time, and have some difficulty with everyday living tasks. This fund helps those in need with unexpected expenses that most of us can handle (transportation, heating, food, clothing, additional medical supplies, therapy, etc...).

HALO is minimally funded by our government and needs community support through donations to keep it going. Your donations are held within a designated HALO account for 100% usage by those in most need. As with any chronic, lifelong disease, it takes the entire community to provide additional, non-government funded support so that those affected can maintain and not suffer further because of unexpected expenses. Soul Matters Circles

Are you looking for deeper connection with others and a space within which you can explore your deepest values and your deepest self? A space within which you can grow in profound ways and become the person you most want to be?

Small group ministries go by many names

and take different forms in different congregations. At root they offer people an important chance to find a small circle of intimacy and depth within the circle of the larger community. Here at UUCM they have had a number of names over the years. The most recent circles blended the nature of an affinity group – a group gathered around a shared outside interest – with a covenant group, a group whose shared interest is the deep connection, personal exploration and powerful interaction possible when a group and its gatherings are designed to create just the space for these.

Rather than discussion groups, these are groups of deep reflection, sharing and connection. They are anchored in relationship.

UUCM's current circle facilitators met with me several times in order to envision the richest possibilities for small group ministry at UUCM. Together, with Phil Hart as chair of the team, we are preparing for the first round of Soul Matters Circles to begin in late January for all those who are interested. Sign up will take place this fall so we can discern what leadership will be needed.

The name Soul Matters Circles is drawn from the Soul Matters organization that offers resources for our monthly themes. In fact, Soul Matters is first and foremost a resource for small groups who explore and experience the monthly themes in depth. "The core purpose . . . is to create formative space for individuals. This is a space of acceptance and safety in which group members can explore their deepest values and inner voice without judgement or coercion. We help each other become the people we most want to be." Soul Matters Circles of approximately 8 people each (10 maximum) will meet at least monthly, with an expected commitment of one year - or for these circles beginning in January, perhaps a year and a half. Facilitators will be trained in January and mentored throughout the year by the minister and skilled facilitators. In fact, facilitators will form their own separate covenant group as part of their learning.

I'll speak a bit more about Soul Matters Circles in the service on November 20 when we welcome new members to



UUCM. Watch for more information, testimonials, online sign up notices and sign-up sheets at services.

How to Access the New Online Directory from UUCM's Website

In early September, all members and friends with email were emailed a link to create a username and password for the new online member and friend directory. Many of you have taken a look, and have sent me some great suggestions on how to improve this resource going forward.

If you have chosen a username and password, you can now access the member and friend directory anytime from UUCM's homepage (http://www.uugrassvalley.org/). You will see a box in the middle of the homepage with the words "Member

Directory" beside the UUCM logo over a purple background. In the following picture, the box I have described is circled in red: ►



If you are a member, friend, or a spouse or child of a member or friend, AND you have selected a username and password, you can click on this box to get to the login page for the new directory (For any bookmarks/favorites users out there: You can bookmark/favorite this login page in your browser for even faster access to the UUCM member & friend directory in the future).
