Panning for Gold

Rev. Kevin Tarsa UUCM Minister

What does it mean to be a community of presence?

The Soul Matters resource for this month begins thusly:

Spiritually, presence can mean two radically different things. One the one hand, contemplatives talk of "being present." Presence from this perspective is all about awareness and remembering to "live in the moment." On the other hand, theologians tend to come at presence from the perspective of "otherness." Their concern is not just that we pay attention to the present moment, but that we notice a transcendent Presence that is woven through all moments.

This month, we refuse to takes sides. Attentiveness or otherness? Who says we have to choose? Isn't it true that, more often than not, they dance together more than they compete? Isn't it true that when we are most present, a powerful presence emerges?

I, a non-theist, a humanistic religious naturalist, find also that being fully present invites an experience of transcendence that many people perceive as a presence. I know exactly to what Christians refer when they speak of the presence of the Holy Spirit entering a room. I have felt it many, many times in my life, most often when a room of people is singing meaningfully and powerfully together, fully present to that moment. I have however explained and interpreted that experience differently at various points in my journey.

I say that UUCM at its best as a religious community calls us all to both being powerfully present to each moment, to one another and to the world, AND to honoring the felt sense of presence and transcendent connection that we will interpret and explain in a variety of ways – as Spirit, as God's love, as neurological, affective attunement, as cosmic consciousness, as the inherent oneness of all things...

In the past few months I have invited you to practice direct communication (to avoid pass-through communication), to practice deep listening with one another, and to find your

holy curiosity when faced with differing political views. These are practices that foster and strengthen healthy and deep relationships.

They are also practices of presence, each strengthening the other. They invite us to step out of our unconscious default behaviors and to attend with full and thoughtful awareness to a particular moment, a particular conversation, a particular person and relationship.

In this high-energy holiday season, at the edge of an extraordinary threshold in our nation's journey, may UUCM become - through you - an ever more meaningful community of presence, in all the ways that will be possible.

The Spiritual Roots of Stewardship

Dearest UUCM - a deep heartfelt thank you to the many who have extended love and support since my major revision back surgery on October 3rd. I know many have been confused about my status, so here is a direct update! The surgery ended up being more extensive than anticipated, and recovery is not a quick process, but I am

doing very well and am optimistic for the future. The healing process is slow. Please know the encouragement and concern from you has been deeply appreciated. I have sorely missed the weekly pieces of life at church in the last 8 weeks.

With Rev. Kevin as our new settled minister, UUCM has indeed arrived at an open gate to consider its opportunities to refocus on what Stewardship means for our beloved community, and how we will decide to be adaptive, authentic and visionary to continue together as the connected and generous congregation we know we can be.

A group of 8 of us met on Friday, November 18th to have a conversation around our Stewardship program and team status. For clarity, this was not a new Stewardship Committee meeting, but rather a working focus group for the afternoon-Rev. Kevin, Joel Houtman, Bob Miller, Helen Williamson, Laura Zimmerman, Melissa Ridgway, Phil Hart, and myself. Please take time to thank them for taking their time & talent to help with ideas as UUCM begins to rebuild its Stewardship group post-ministerial search and settlement.

A sincere, open, caring and curious leadership focus for a Stewardship program of excellence has remained a priority for me since I wrote to the congregation in early March; however, I have made the decision to resign as Stewardship Chair effective December 31, 2016. This decision is not due to a lack of desire or passion for the rewards and work of lay leadership in the Stewardship arena, but rather what has surfaced post-surgery as a very strong pragmatic awareness that I must take care of me first, and then hopefully can return to helping others in my usual more high-energy fashion. It is clear to me that in order to focus appropriately on my own recovery and personal health and well-being, I need to let go of leadership and committee obligations at the church at this time. I very much look forward to a future of new possibilities as a long recovery process progresses and sees itself through.

I ask for your understanding, support and consideration for what is an extremely difficult decision, and will work for a smooth transition process to a new Stewardship leader. I know that this is the right decision at the right time for me, and have faith all will be well for us as a new Stewardship Team is built.

Rev. Kevin, Dave MacLeod and myself look forward to sharing a more detailed communication that will provide clarification to the congregation with a proposal for a transition plan and creation of a newly-minted Stewardship Team!

PASS THE PLATE A BIG SUCCESS


