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From the Minister

When it comes to creativity, I think often of my mom's pragmatic farm family simply doing what needed to be done with the materials available. My grandfather's creations – a homemade wheel chair lift run by a small electric drill, a reaching, grasping handle for my then wheelchair-bound grandmother, a spinning grass seed spreader made with a large coffee can, a sheltering winter cab for his tractor, a small steam engine – all were wonderfully elegant in design. No more and no less than exactly what was needed, usually from parts and pieces neatly stored out in his garage workspace.

I pride myself in my pragmatic resourcefulness and my creativity. I find great satisfaction in working with the ingredients at hand, though sometimes I need to remember that it's okay to go out and get some of the new parts I need. And some of my creations are overbuilt. One of my brothers – another creator of elegant designs, taking after my grandfather - looked at the tabletop garden I had created for my mom and said, "Great. We can also use it as a tornado shelter!"

Music? Ah, with music creation I can usually be much more elegant. To be maximally creative it helps to have parameters. Ask me to compose some beautiful piece of music and I will struggle. Tell me that you need a three-minute song to celebrate a couple's 75 wedding anniversary, that they are Italian and funny, and that the song needs to be accompanied by tuba, accordion and tin-whistle, and I'm all over it, my creativity surprisingly liberated.

I am thoughtful lately about how I bring these same propensities to ministry, working with the ingredients at hand, sometimes overbuilding, needing to be reminded that we might need to go outside to get some new parts and pieces sometimes, ...and about how much I delight in other people's creativity.

UUCM has a newly articulated mission, and that is not the end of the process. The work and the joy now is to discern the creative and available ways UUCM members and friends can live it out and be inspired to fulfill it. As our Soul Matters materials remind us this month, such creativity is best a shared undertaking.

I invite you to tap into UUCM's new mission:

- If you want to be part of a team that creatively imagines the possibilities for inspiring action around the mission and "building our mission muscle," as Beth Freedman puts it, please contact me.
- If you are a leader or member of a committee or team at UUCM, ask out loud how the work of your committee or team lives out UUCM's mission. Put it in writing.
- Consider how you can best give of your time and talents joyfully and creatively in service of UUCM's mission.

Let the structure of the mission statement and the institution of UUCM liberate your creativity. I look forward to seeing what emerges.

Board of Trustees

Taylor Carey, President, UUCM Board of Trustees

This month's President's Column focuses primarily on our upcoming Congregational meeting scheduled for May 20, at 12:45, or as soon thereafter as tables, chairs, and wandering attentions may be brought to bear on the subject. Your attendance is vital to the success of this meeting. This is the time at which we will consider a number of Bylaws amendments and, most importantly, the Budget.

As to that, while we cannot report all black ink as we had hoped, the Board of Trustees is proud to announce that

our projected deficit based on reported pledges and conservative estimates of anticipated additional income over the course of the coming fiscal year is dramatically less than that in the current year's budget. We project a deficit of less than \$5,000, as opposed to the roughly \$31,000 in red ink from our current budget. What's more, we have pared the deficit while keeping faith with our obligations to our Minister and our staff, and remaining a full Fair Share Congregation. The Board feels a deep debt of gratitude to our Treasurer Charley Zimmerman who carefully steered us back to a more solid

financial footing, Bob Packard, Chair, and all the members of the Finance Committee, whose careful gleaning of all the data made the Board's work on the budget so much easier, and to Keith Johnson and the Stewardship Committee for a successful Pledge Drive.

This is all good work and we all should take pride in our enormous progress, but we can only rest on our shovels for a moment. There is much to be done. Our building is old and shrinking (or maybe we're growing). We would like RE to be more robustly funded. And there are people in our community who still do not know who we are or what we are about.

Typical of Unitarian Universalism, our congregation tends to be of the age of comfort, success, even retirement, yet young people benefit from our faith more than anyone. Kathryn and I know from happy experience that raising children as UUs confers a life of blessings on both parents and children. Don't just take my word for it. Greta Gerwig, whose movie "Lady Bird" enthralled the nation, was raised in the UU Society of Sacramento and went through the OWL program just a few years ahead of our kids and it shows in every frame of that lovely film.

Oh, did I mention the OWL program? Yeah, well, we're still a few hundred dollars short of being able to afford it but we'll get there. We have to get there. One of my son's best friends is hispanic, a fluent speaker of Spanish. Nevertheless he got a "D" in high School Spanish, to which my son queried "Cardo, what the hell is wrong with you?" I don't want our young people asking us that question down the line because we failed them for a few cents a month.



TAYLOR CAREY PRESIDENT, Board of Trustees

Taylor Carey and his wife Kathryn Young have been Unitarian Universalists since 1995. They raised their five children in the faith while members of the Unitarian Universalist Society of Sacramento. Their two youngest (twins), Rachel and Rebekah, are CPAs in Sacramento; Netty is a PhD candidate

in political anthropology at the University of Florida; John is an environmental engineer; and Jacob is a programmer for the State Department of Social Services. Taylor and Kathryn became members of the UUCM in 2012, shortly after their move to Nevada City.

Taylor retired from the California Department of Justice as a Deputy Attorney General in 2013, having also held the positions of Special Assistant AG and Acting Chief of the Department's Civil Division before joining the Department's Opinion Unit under then Attorney General Jerry Brown. Prior to his service with DOJ he served for 11 years as Assistant Chief Counsel/Chief Administrative Law Judge with the California Department of Health Services (now the Department of Public Health), and four years as staff counsel with the State Department of Education.

Taylor is currently Treasurer of the Nevada-Sierra Regional IHSS Public Authority Governing Board; Past Chair of the Northern Sierra Chapter of the ACLU; and guitarist/singer with the Banner Mountain Boys bluegrass band. AND, President of the Board of Trustees at UUCM... running for a second term.

Mission: Possible Update

On behalf of the Stewardship committee, I would like to report the results of the 2018/19 pledge campaign to date. First, I want to express our deep appreciation to everyone who has already pledged in support of this congregation and its mission. Thank you.

While we await pledge cards from several members, in order to prepare a timely report for you, we have estimated next year's total pledge income using prior pledge history data for those members. With that understanding, we project total pledge income for next year to be \$198,828.

Where does this amount put us, budget-wise? Some background:

Last May, we adopted a budget that estimated pledge income for this year at \$179,000. During the course of the year, actual pledge income rose to \$198,761, an 11% increase! Amazing.

In addition to that good news, we celebrate that in this current Stewardship campaign:

- 28% of congregants have increased their pledges by at least 15%. Wow!
- An additional 6% have increased their pledges between 1% and 14%. Again, wow!
- 25% of our members are able to maintain their pledges at this year's level. Not something we can ever take for granted.

This is solid and inspiring stewardship!

It so happens that those welcome pledge increases equal almost exactly the loss of pledges from those who left UUCM, moved away, died, or had to decrease their pledges. Given that our anticipated pledge income for next year matches the pledge income from this current year, we have both great reason to celebrate and reasons to steward our financial resources very thoughtfully this coming year.

This year we drew heavily on our reserves. Our increased pledge total will put us now within reach of a balanced or nearly-balanced budget, though this will require that we hold most expenses to current levels and that we reduce spending in some areas.

Your Board of Trustees will soon recommend a budget for 2018/19 to be adopted by the congregation at the congregational meeting on May 20. Please mark your calendars and watch for more information.

Meanwhile, we will continue to analyze the data to identify patterns or trends that can inform us going forward. And if we again

have a significant increase in pledging income as the year unfolds, that will be wonderful and most welcome!

Introducing the Endowment Legacy Program for Planned Giving

Previously we reintroduced Simple Gifts for anytime giving. Now we are introducing the Endowment Legacy Program for Planned giving.

People make planned gifts as a means to financially support our community in a more significant way than is possible with donations from earned income. In return for a planned gift, donors or their families may receive important estate and income tax benefits.

There are a number of creative ways to give to the Endowment Fund. One can simply add UUCM as a beneficiary to IRAs and other retirement funds. Altering a will or trust is possible. Life income gift arrangements such as charitable remainder trusts, gift annuities and gifts of real estate are additional options It is wise to consult with a qualified attorney or estate planning advisor to assist with planned giving.

Over time, the UUCM Endowment Fund can serve as a crucial source of funding for programs and facilities that will sustain our UU community in the future. Once the Endowment Fund reaches \$50,000, earnings from the fund will become available to pay for UUCM programs and to develop building facilities. Adult Religious Education



Creativity is our ability to dream things up and make them happen. - Peggy Taylor

We're all familiar with that part in the quote about dreaming. Conjuring up new ideas and images is what creativity is all about. Using the building blocks of "what is," we -almost magically- make the "not yet" appear in our minds.

But what about that other part? The part about "making them happen." When we talk about creativity, that half of the equation often gets short shrift. We celebrate the fun piece about dreaming and leave off the hard piece of making our imaginings real. And it's not just the hard part; it's the scary part too. You have to be brave to try new things and fail. Being creative and unique can cause the crowd to cheer and swoon; it can also lead to being laughed at and excluded from the group. Yes, there is joy, beauty and play in creativity, but there is also insecurity, loneliness and self-doubt. Which means that this month is not just about imagination, artistry and self-expression, but also courage.

Once that's in view, it's clear that we also need to talk about "co-creativity" this month as well. Something as daring as creativity is dangerous if we try to do it alone. Indeed, where did we get the silly idea that artists and inventors are isolated, independent geniuses? When it comes to myths about creativity, that one tops the list. We need to remind each other that there is no such thing as a "person of creativity," only "people of creativity."

The Bible talks of the Holy Spirit appearing when "two or more are gathered." The same rule applies to the creative spirit! For instance, new ideas come from the clash of debate. New art emerges only after inspiration from those who've gone before. Better forms of community are built on the back of those who have toiled and sacrificed long before we put ourselves on the line. Simply put, there are no creators without companions.

It's all a way of reminding us that the secret to creative self-expression is staying connected to each other. Those sacred sources of inspiration inside us – our imagination, unique voice and inner muses – are like wild animals; they are hungry

to run free but are also shy and easily scared away. They want to come out and play but will only do so when coaxed and cared for by the inspiration and support of others. So, in the end, maybe the most important question this month is not just "What do you want to create?" but also "Who are your partners?"

With gratitude for all our sources of creativity – those within us and those all around us – let us begin.
