From the Minister

The new year arrives with the theme of integrity. Always a meaningful theme.

These post-holiday weeks invite reflection each year. Birth family and chosen family gatherings or lack thereof, the gift giving and the receiving that evidence our connections or lack thereof, the memories of childhood and of a lifetime that surface with annual holiday touchstones, our reactions this year to the holidays and holy days...it all invites us to consider who we are, how we live our lives, and how we intend to be in the future.

This year that reflection comes within our worries about the future of the earth and its human inhabitants, frustration with the harmful and maddening behavior and rhetoric of political figures, and uncertainty about how to reach life-saving common ground amid numbing polarization.

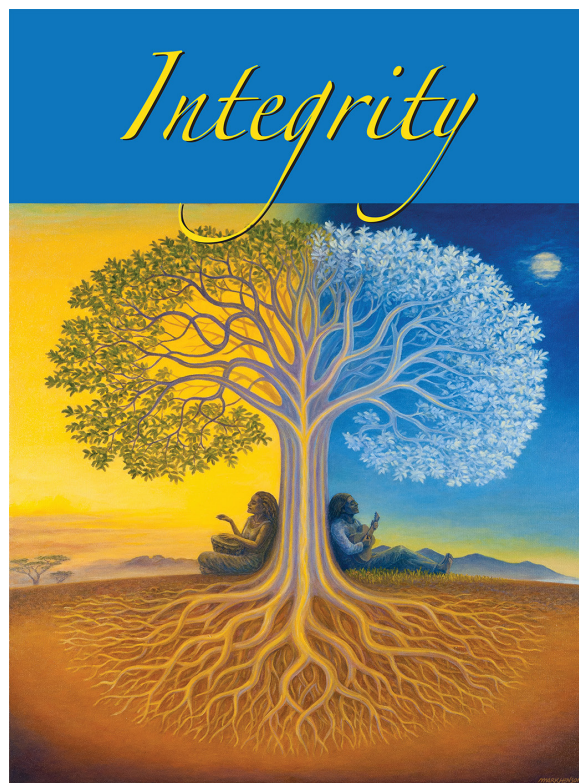
This is why we gather as a religious community, my friends, to locate, cultivate and live from our integrity in the midst of such uncertain, troubled and troubling times.

We are in new territory. The familiar landmarks that previously guided us appear not to serve, and the tools we've counted on to navigate life and community do not function as they once did. The rules and realities we knew have changed in many ways. It is challenging our perennial Unitarian and Universalist optimism regarding humanity, and our middle-class expectations of ease and upward progress.

I noticed that a colleague was reading a book titled *How to Lead When You Don't Know Where You're Going: Leading in a Liminal Season*. I purchased it immediately, of course, and will make it my new year's reading. I encountered the concept of "liminality" in a world religions class almost 40 years ago. We were learning about rites of passage the world over, rites from many traditions that nonetheless shared common stages: 1) removal of and from all that is familiar, 2) a liminal, disorienting, re-orienting, in-between time, literally a

"threshold" time, when the old is no longer and the new is not yet known or manifest, and 3) a return - in new, transformed form - to the community that holds one before and after the transformation.

We are in an unavoidable, disorienting/re-orienting, liminal time, during which our sense of our intact selves - our integrity - each and together, is being called into question, or at least into examination. So let's together dive into the liminality of it all, recognize that we are between answers and sureties, and thus free ourselves to birth new ways of seeing and being. Let's enter the uncertainty fully enough to make room for future clarity.



The congregation's work to reach out, to claim and live its mission, to figure out what to do regarding the building and property it will own outright in a few months, and to discern who it can best serve in the wider community, is all on the table as we enter 2020. Join us for the Love Reaches Out workshop on January 11 to participate in one piece of that conversation. Find the sustainable and happy ways to get involved in serving and leading this congregation and engaging the arising conversations. Choose a word for the year as a touchstone, a word you can wrestle with or dance with toward your own deepest integrity in these threshold times.

Come, my friends, "heaven knows where we are going," but going together is going to be our salvation.

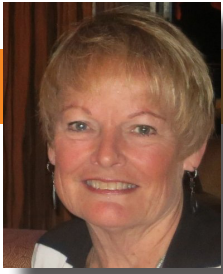

I write to you in the midst of the holiday cheer to report on your Board of Trustees' December meeting. Many boards have the month of December dark, but not *your* board. They are committed to their work and see the few months until the end of the fiscal year as a carrot that leads us to the positive completion of our goals. Onward!

Dennis Weiher brought our opening words. They set the tone for our evening. He quoted Joseph Campbell who used the metaphor of a snake shedding his skin. His point: there is a constant "need" for change, but inherent in the changes are both challenge and possibility. We try to keep that in mind as we address our work in support of this congregation. Each of us are problem-solvers for UUCM. We try to be cautious, creative, and hopeful.

June of 2018, the Committee on Shared Ministry (Janet Dunstan, Kevin Tarsa, Gwen Eymann and Kate Canan), at the request of the BOT, completed their evaluation of communications at UUCM. Their extensive report was presented to the board January of this year. It has required a great deal of absorption and prioritization before tasks could be tackled and evaluated with our current mission and goals. Sandi Lauher, Maryann Currington, and Jim Perkins took on this daunting task and have been giving us monthly updates. I am pleased to bring you some of our early successes. Of course, there is more work to do. We tackled the things that took man/woman power, but not big overages on the budget.

- The committee chairs now receive timely and accurate financial information to manage their budgets. *Achieved*
- A comprehensive list of team/committee chairs, and BOT members is in the final stage of being compiled and checked for accuracy. There will be an email address for each committee/team chair for easy access, even when personnel changes.
- We are hard at work on a UUCM comprehensive calendar. To date, Governance and Ministry are providing their information. Finance presented theirs at the last BOT meeting.
- Excellence in BOT minutes: comprehensive, transparent, accurate, informative and timely. *Achieved*
- Regular and timely financial reports. *Achieved*
- Signage (i.e. doorbell, restrooms etc.) *In process*

- Make our website accessible, accurate, and attractive. The team is discussing this with experts and the UUA, and coming back to us with a "scope of service" that includes costs.

As you all see, we are constantly in the process of shedding our outgrown "skins" and developing into the best we can prepare ourselves to be. Happy New Year to all of you. In Hawaii we would say *hau'oli makahiki hou!*

ANIMAL PLACE, SAMMIE'S FRIENDS SHELTER, GRASS VALLEY SHELTER

Animal Place cares for rescued farm animals. Sammie's Friends and the Grass Valley Animal Control Shelter care for rescued pets. Sammie's Friends has a great foster program, and adoptions are up. They help with medical needs and food for pets whose caretakers can't afford it. All three of these organizations need help feeding, cleaning, walking, and socializing with animals. What's Up with our Justice Ministry?

YOU ARE NEEDED!! Read on to see how you can make a difference!

The Justice Team held a series of brainstorming sessions, ably facilitated by Gail Johnson Vaughn. It became clear that a new justice model was necessary and it had to be 1) focused on specific activities that were measurable and accountable and 2) inclusive enough to offer justice opportunities for everyone.

Focus is the hallmark of the justice model developed by Rev. Richard Gilbert in *The Prophetic Imperative*. Gilbert, a UU minister for over 50 years, argues that congregations should rely on task forces to promote justice. Relying on the Gilbert model, UUCM now has three task forces: Challenging White Privilege, The Nisenan, and Carbon and Dividend. Each of these task forces has at least five UUCM member activists and at least five additional supporters. Further, each task force has prepared a petition and strategic plan which has been approved by the Justice Team. Copies of these documents will be available on our UUCM website. Formal approval of the task forces by the congregation will be scheduled soon. For more information on each task force see Carmen Riley for the Nisenan, Bob Miller for Carbon Dividend, and Jim Perkins for Challenging White Privilege.

Creation of the task forces addresses the need for overall focus in our Justice Ministry. As to inclusiveness, we can only achieve this goal by entering into partnerships with local, state, and national justice organizations. Some UUCM members prefer to offer direct service to local nonprofits such as Hospitality House, Interfaith Food Ministry, Sierra Roots, or to be affiliated with state or national organizations such as the UU Justice Ministry of California or the UU Service Committee. Rest assured there will be justice opportunities for all, whether it is with task forces, partnerships, or administrative support necessary to maintain a comprehensive Justice Ministry at UUCM.

"What does all this have to do with me?" you wonder. The answer is *everything*. The Justice Team envisions a Justice Ministry that operates from the bottom up. The congregation decides when task forces will be created and disbanded and what their objectives will be. The congregation will also decide when and how partnerships will be recognized.

Justice Ministry at UUCM will proceed at full speed when members are involved in justice activities as they are willing and able. We have designed a justice model that emphasizes multiple avenues of involvement. Now we are looking forward to filling the following Justice slots:

- **Planners** – Consider joining the Justice Team and/or the justice team's Planning unit.
- **Doers** – Join the task force, the Rapid Response team, or become a justice Firebrand
- **Communicators** – Help with internal and external communications to publicize and recognize our efforts within and beyond the UUCM community.
- **Coordinators** – Coordinate our local, state, and national partnerships, our *Pass the Plate* program, and *Justice Nights*.

We will be conducting a rollout of the new Justice Ministry model in early 2020. The goal will be to fill all the vacant justice slots in this new model. Where is your niche in our Justice Ministry? We have a place for you!

The Big Shoe?!

The Shoe Story

Do you know how much carbon dioxide gas you produce (and deliver to the atmosphere) when you use (burn) a gallon of gasoline in your car.

The Carbon Dividend Task Force is working to demonstrate the answer. Hidden away at UUCM is a giant shoe – see Anita Wald-Tuttle and Ginny Hoyt peering into the shoe.

The volume of the shoe is the same as the volume of carbon dioxide you release into the atmosphere when you use a gallon of gas. Think of how many gallons of gasoline the citizens of planet earth have used and visualize how much gas has been released into the very thin atmosphere. It's no surprise we are changing the climate.

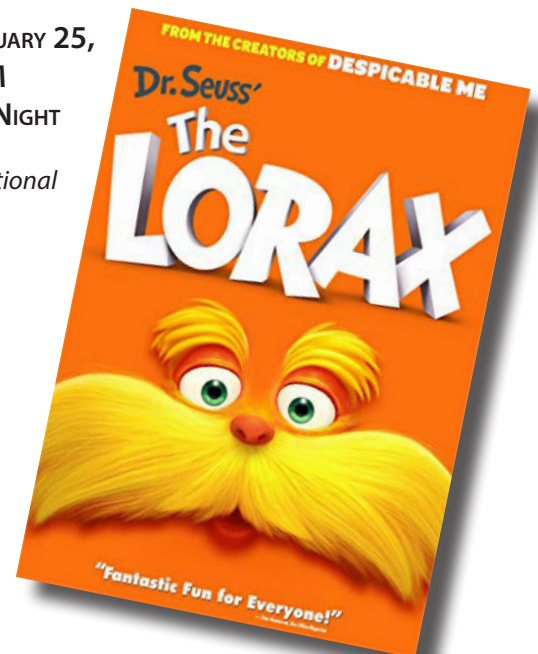

What Does It Mean to be a People of Integrity?

From the
Soul Matters Authors

Wholeness is never lost; it is only forgotten. Integrity rarely means that we need to add something to ourselves: it is more an undoing than a doing, a freeing ourselves from beliefs we have about who we are and ways we have been persuaded to "fix" ourselves...

Often in reclaiming the freedom to be who we are, we remember some basic human quality, what we find is almost always a surprise but it is also familiar; like something we have put in the back of a drawer long ago.

We know the usual "integrity advice": Build your character! Get better at being honest, with others and yourself!

It's about addition, we're told. Being better. Becoming more.

But our faith, like Rachel Naomi Remen, says it's more complicated than that. Some subtraction is also needed. Removal needs to occur. The path needs cleared.

And why? Well, because integrity isn't simply something we build; it's something already there. We UUs talk mostly about inherent worth, but we also believe in inherent integrity. All the building blocks are sitting there, waiting. They are, as Remen says, hidden like something we have put in the back of the drawer long ago.

It's all a reminder that our integrity is much more closely tied to memory than we acknowledge: those moments from our youth when we felt most truly ourselves, and those mentors and models that imparted wisdom about what really matters. It's all there. Just forgotten. As the poet, Charles Bukowski says, "Can you remember who you were, before the world told you who you should be?"

So friends, please don't make this month just about "being better." Make some time to also be quiet. Think of the hunt for integrity more like getting away from all the noise of the traffic so the song of the birds can be heard, or like when we

wandered off a bit too far into the woods as a kid. It could have been scary, but somehow we knew that all we had to do was stand still and listen. We knew the call of our parents would soon come, leading us back home. It's the same with our memories and our deepest selves: they are calling to us from the edge of the woods.

All we have to do is stop and listen.
