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From the Minister

Rev. Kevin Tarsa UUCM Minister

Earlier in the year I spoke several times of the nature of liminal times, in-between times when a previous reality or identity no longer exists or serves, and a new reality or identity has not yet arisen. And that was before COVID-19 altered our lives and ushered in a newfound awareness of systemic racism in the nation and the active call to dismantle it.

My friends, the congregation and religious institutions were already in a liminal era, and now, so is the rest of the human world. Plus, all this time at home and out of our ordinary routines invites deep personal introspection, with a revaluation of our priorities and paths. In other words, we are entering what some people refer to as "pure liminality," wherein personal, group, and societal forces all move into a liminal state at the same time.

That means we are entering a time of tremendous ambiguity and possibility en route to clarity and to what we will become, as individuals, as a congregation, as a society. As Susan Beaumont points out, the liminality of this time will be at once dangerous, alluring and powerfully sacred. In the midst of the ambiguity and risk, it will be an exciting and fecund time.

It may help you to know that anxiety, changes in motivation, re-evaluations of commitment, personal overload, the reemergence of old issues and patterns, and polarization are common attributes of such liminal times. They come with the undefined territory. And while each of those things will push our worry buttons at various times, living our way through them with integrity and heart – remembering to stay anchored in our values, our mission and the quality of our relating – will also lead us to greater depth and to the openness and flexibility that will allow the best possibilities to emerge.

I will be taking time in July to center myself so that I may be of best service to you moving forward. I'll bracket two weeks of vacation with a week of study leave on either side, beginning July 6 and concluding August 3.

As we turn the corner of the fiscal year July 1, I must offer a profound thanks to outgoing UUCM President, Karyn Packard; Secretary, Sandi Lauher; Treasurer, Joel Houtman; and Members at-large Maryann Currington and Dennis Weiher. They have been marvelous board members, working with heart and commitment to strengthen UUCM. And Karyn's leadership has been inspiring and motivating all year. Thank you, each of you!

Their leadership continues, as Karyn moves to the Nominating Committee, Maryann to chair Stewardship, and Dennis to focus on his co-leadership of the Ministry Council, made up of the various ministry leaders. Thank you.

And thank you to Jim Perkins, who moves into the President role, and Janet Dunstan, who continues her amazing policy work from her at-large position on the Board. Welcome and thank you in advance to Pam Kisor (incoming Vice-President), Bob Packard (incoming Treasurer), and Gene Gilligan and Reine Thibeault (incoming Members at-large). Great additions, all.

This summer, the building use will likely remain limited to staff and the few Board members and building use leaders who truly need access to the building. As infection rates rise at the moment, we don't expect to be able to sanction official UUCM small group gatherings for a time yet. Watch, however, for word of encouragement to make safe one-on-one connections this summer.

Our Sunday Zoom services will continue all summer with the wonderful talent and artistry of the Worship Team members and a pair of special joint ventures with our sister congregation in Reno, NV.

Justice needs and issues will certainly remain alive and evolving all summer. Watch for learning and witnessing opportunities of various kinds, including Vote Forward letter writing every Thursday afternoon. Most groups and circles will continue to help people connect, and leaders will be looking to you to know how best to help you stay connected at UUCM.

It's a liminal time, my friends. Treat each other and yourself with an extra measure of kindness and patience. Treat little as permanent, and everything as open to possibility. Grieve the losses you are feeling; they are real. Notice the gifts of this time; they are real, too. Anchor yourself in the love that roots our Universalist heritage. And hold on to hope for a heart and world in more life-giving alignment out of finding our way through.

Your Board of Trustees

Rev. Karyn Packard President, UUCM Board of Trustees

June 18th was bittersweet. It was our "transition" meeting with this year's out-going and next year's incoming members of the Board of Trustees. Kevin took a very special screen shot as we all came together on zoom. This is a new process, in that these folks were invited to actually participate in our last monthly meeting (short of voting). We, as a BOT, intentionally presented not only where we are, but also where we have come from and how we hope our undertakings will continue to develop in the future. There was even time for questions from our newest members.

Preparation for this meeting included some real evaluation of our own work. First, we looked at our initial goals. Perhaps you will remember them at the beginning of the term: well-functioning finances, long-range facilities planning, and effective implementation of the new governance model. There were also goals for our new Ministry Council: Packard. Not enough can be said in appreciation for Joel's work. Some of his many accomplishments include accurate and timely monthly reports and reimbursements. Janet Dunstan straightened out the deposit spreadsheet for Carol, and Scottie Hart reconstructed the physical files as filing had not been taking place. The reimbursement/expense system was improved. A method to help track credit card expenses to budget lines was established, and reports and expenses were reorganized in keeping with the new Governance structure. On-line giving was improved and Steve Wiley created tutorials for people to use to update their pledges. Two new methods of online giving were created (Text and Paypal), and we are restructuring our bookkeeping data and methods. Our growing Finance Committee has new members, all highly skilled. The BOT worked well with this Finance Committee to have a budget that accurately reflected the goals and vision of UUCM. It is amazing to reflect on these improvements. However, as Bob Packard becomes our new Treasurer, the new BOT is tasked with taking a serious look at just how demanding the Treasurer's job has been, as our congregation has grown in numbers and activities. What needs to be done

developing a well-functioning Ministry Council, increasing participation and integration of people in the congregation, and the increase of UUCM's visibility in the wider community.

I think it was not only helpful for the new Board to hear this evaluation, but also for each of you in our congregation to read it. Nothing happens in a

The next goal was long-range facilities planning. Earlier in the year, an initial Board committee the was formed and individuals were interviewed who had unique skills and gifts to support our congregation in this exciting

vacuum. It is more difficult to make sure everyone is included when we are online. However, that doesn't make the work any less important. Remember our commitment: accuracy, timeliness and transparency.

First is our finances update. We are all reaping the benefits of the work done by our outgoing Treasurer, Joel Houtman. He was supported by the Finance Committee, chaired by Bob project. Charlie Brock (Realtor), Jeff Gold (Architect), Gail Schultz (capital campaign experience) and our own denominational experts shared their thoughts. Wally Holtan worked with the BOT to establish a timetable for making sure that we cared for our building as we understood it is our most enduring symbol and source of future capital. Repairs have already begun. However, in the middle of this exciting visioning, we were reminded that, much like the Treasurer's job, Wally's job expectations far exceed what one person can

do. The money for a "sexton" position was voted in the budget, and it will be the next Board that makes sure that support is found. When the virus hit, of course, these plans had to be shelved temporarily, but we hope this work will continue with new board members and renewed creativity from all involved. Our dreams must endure, even in the midst of a pandemic. Kevin will bring you up to date on the Ministry Council, but throughout this year, Board members Dennis Weiher and Jim Perkins did double duty, working with the Ministry Council. Dennis provided administrative leadership and Jim acted as a liaison with the BOT, a position essential for smooth coordination between the Governance and Ministry sides

Lastly, we come to the integration of the new Governance Model. Janet Dunstan headed up our Governance committee. She gathered many different stake-holders to help her reevaluate our policies, to make sure what is written is actually what we want to be doing. As you experienced, this also involved bylaw changes. Janet's memory and record of UUCM history really helped and she was determined to succeed. I thank each person who wrote, read, edited, researched, etc. to strengthen the documentation of our policies. We are so much farther along in this task than I had imagined for the

Passing the Torch to Gail Schultz

Those of you who attended the Congregational Business Meeting on May 31st heard an extremely positive report from the Treasurer, describing a lot of things that Joel and the Finance Committee have done this year to improve responsiveness of reimbursements and fidelity in our financial records. He also reported that generally consistent giving and lower than expected spending have left the church with a substantial surplus this fiscal year. I'm happy to report that that surplus has actually grown considerably since then. I'll have the final details next month, but I can report now that the church has been able to use some of these surplus funds (roughly \$7,000) to address a major building repair that was budgeted for FY21. Windows have been on our deferred maintenance list for a long time for the kitchen and upstairs, on the south and east sides of the Family Ministry room. Due to the Board's decisive reprogramming decision, these windows have now been replaced. Our kitchen workers, RE classes, and those of us using that room for meetings will appreciate the improvement.

This being the start of a new fiscal year, I'd like to remind you of two things that often result in confusion and require time consuming corrective actions:

- Pledges received in July or later will be assumed to be for payment of FY21 pledges unless there is information with the payment, telling us that it is a late payment for FY20. So, if you are making a payment on your FY20 pledges, please indicate whether the payment is for FY20 or for FY21 on the memo line of your check or on the outside of an envelope with cash.
- 2. Those of us who have changed our pledge amounts and use "automatic" check writing by your bank or recurring Vanco online processing for their pledge payments need to remember NOW to revise the amount field in your donation directive. Vanco setup for this purpose is sometimes confusing and tricky, so our Steve Wiley has just written brief tutorials for creating a Vanco online account and for changing credit card numbers and amounts in Vanco. Request a copy from our Admin Assistant, Carol (530) 274-1675. And ask Steve for help if you need it.

This being my last month as Finance Chair, I want to thank you all for the amazing cooperation and help everyone has extended to me in this position and for the genuine generosity and care that you have shown for our community. My replacement in this role is Gail Schulz, new to UUCM for about six months, but a long-time UU with helpful experience in several other UU communities. I am confident that she will find the same spirit of teamwork that I have seen.

ANIMAL PLACE, SAMMIE'S FRIENDS SHELTER, GRASS VALLEY SHELTER

Animal Place cares for rescued farm animals. Sammie's Friends and the Grass Valley Animal Control Shelter care for rescued pets. Sammie's Friends has a great foster program, and adoptions are up. They help with medical needs and food for pets whose caretakers can't afford it. All three of these organizations need help feeding, cleaning, walking, and socializing with animals.

Covenant of Right Relations Review/Revision Update

The email below was sent out on 6/16/20. Thanks to those who have already replied with their feedback on proposed changes to our Covenant of Right Relations. Please read about our process and timeline below. *We need your feedback!*

Dear Members and Friends,

UUCM is reviewing and revising our Covenant of Right Relations (CRR) and we would like your feedback. This is part of the Board of Trustees' Governance work to align our Covenant with our Mission Statement. There is general agreement that our Covenant has served us pretty well as it is since it was created 11 years ago, and that it's just time for

a few updates and tweaks. So below you will find our current CRR with proposed changes. We are asking you to send us your feedback on the proposed changes now and during the next few months as they are refined.

("Living the Covenant of Right Relations, Options for Addressing Challenges" will be reviewed at a later time.)

HUMANIST DISCUSSION GROUP

The July 1st meeting of the Humanist Discussion Group will look at the recently released bipartisan report from the American Academy of Arts & Sciences' Commission on the Practice of Democratic Citizenship titled Our Common Purpose, Reinventing American Democracy for the 21st Century.

The report's 31 recommendations are organized in six strategies. Strategy 1 is Achieve Equality of Voice and Representation and consists of eight recommendations including substantially enlarging the House of Representatives, introducing ranked-choice voting and establishing 18 year terms for Supreme Court justices.

The entire document is worth study and consideration and its release comes at a time when the current inequities of our society are apparent to more people than ever and there might be the opportunity to enact many of these recommendations.
