#### NOVEMBER THEME: Holding History

Nov. 7 TIME CHANGE TODAY - Set Clocks Back! Holding History: Body, Mind, and Spirit Rev. Kevin Tarsa, Cheryl Morris, Worship Assoc.

What does it mean to "hold our history" when history tells us so much more about how we see ourselves now than about what happened in the past? Or are those two things closer and more integrated than we think? What history are you holding, and why, and how?

#### Nov. 14 Holding History: Rooted in the Rich Soil of our Theological Heritage Rev. Dr. Sheri Prud'homme, with Beth Karow and

Cheryl Morris, Worship Associates

UUCM welcomes the Rev. Dr. Sheri Prud'homme, who serves as Assistant Professor of Religion and Education at Starr King. She has served as a minister of religious education in the Unitarian Universalist churches of Oakland, Davis, and Berkeley as well as the Pacific Central District. She is the co-creator and co-director of Chalice Camp, a Unitarian Universalist summer day camp that has been running for over 17 years in the Bay Area and replicated in sites across the country.

Rev. Prud'homme holds a Ph.D. in interdisciplinary studies in history and theology from the Graduate Theological Union. Her dissertation focused on 19th century Unitarian minister Thomas Starr King's use of Yosemite and the Sierra Nevada as sacred texts, asking what his ecotheology might have to contribute to contemporary ecotheologies as well as offering needed correctives to his imperialist project. *Nov. 21 Holding History: Meaning 3.0* Rev. Kevin Tarsa, Chuck Champlin, Worship Assoc.

Jamie Wheal claims that the world has entered a third stage in the human effort to make meaning: beyond the first, religious stage which linked meaning to salvation and exclusion, beyond the second stage, modern liberalism, which anchored meaning in inclusion at the expense of salvation, to a third stage, which Wheal says needs to integrate the first two in order to navigate the current collapse of our traditional anchors. How can history, the human story so far, help us move hopefully and courageously into what comes next?

Nov. 28 Holding History: Of Thanks and Hope and Stuff Rev. Kevin Tarsa, with Jeff Stone and Cheryl Morris, Worship Associates

Ah, Thanksgiving, a holiday that has accrued layers and layers of meaning, feelings, rituals and expectations, even when one decries it entirely. On this first Sunday of Advent, we'll dig below the surface to unearth a bit more history, a bit more honesty, a bit more gratitude, a bit more hope.

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### **From the Minister**

Rev. Kevin Tarsa UUCM Minister

Recent research and teachings regarding how we hold memories and experiences in our bodies has me thinking in new ways about this month's theme of "holding history." We hold history not only in the conscious stories we tell and retell, but also in our postures, our tastes, our reactions, our stubborn behaviors, our lower back aches, our sight, our frustrations, and our passions and joys.

It also has me wondering how we have been shaped by and been internalizing our pandemic experiences. How are we holding our most recent history, I wonder, and are there ways that we can more consciously shape and hold that history-inthe-making?

This month we'll look at history-holding in general, at pieces of Unitarian Universalist history with the help of Rev. Dr. Sheri Prud'homme, at history as a resource for understanding and moving into the cultural transformations currently in motion, and at history, approached honestly and openly, as a source of hope and gratitude.

This month, as you consider what history is and what history does or does not mean, I invite you to keep the question, "What happened to you?" as a travel companion. Gail Johnson Vaughan referenced the book of that title by Bruce Perry and Oprah Winfrey in an earlier service. The book explores "trauma, resilience, and healing." What I find wonderfully hopeful in Perry's insight, is that while we are shaped profoundly by what has happened to us, that shaping isn't necessarily permanent. We are being reshaped continually, if often unconsciously. In his vocation, Perry draws on this knowledge to help people find their paths beyond some of the barriers that traumas erect.

It is important to realize this. That we are not merely helpless products of our pasts. Whether our personal histories, our long-time family legacies, this congregation's story, our UU tradition's journey, our nation's triumphs, tragedies, and vulnerabilities, or our experiences of the pandemic, we have chances to shape the history that we will hold here on out. So, take time to consider deeply what happened to you, what happened to us, not only as a source of explanation, but as a guide for writing the history to come.

What you feel in your body may offer some clues.

Kern, Gwen, George, Connie, Joel, Theresa and Phil were all working on the many yard projects, one of which was to re-attach the down spout of the garages where the fence was damaged by a car. Two roofing people driving by saw George and Joel trying to figure out how do the repair and they stopped and offered to fix it for them as they had the tools and the knowledge. It was such a kind-hearted gesture and it reminds me that there are really good people out there. I would also like to give a shout-out to Mel Berry for volunteering to replaster the nursery after our chronic roof leak as well as helping to get the nursery ready for opening of actual services. We were able to start working on the garages, cleaning out items that we no longer need which will hopefully go to Restore for reuse by someone else. Thank you to all the hardy volunteers who made it a great day.

### New Building and Grounds Proposed Changes

Building and Grounds is looking at developing a new work strategy that hopefully will allow more people to volunteer who cannot necessarily work on the weekends. It will also allow people to focus where they would like to volunteer on a regular basis. We'll be dividing the team between working in the building or working on the outdoor grounds.

### PROPOSED BUILDING MAINTENANCE PLAN

Building and Grounds is looking for a person or persons who would be willing to volunteer as a leader for the care and maintenance of the inside of UUCM's building. This ideally

would involve a monthly commitment for a specific period of time. This person would be responsible for organizing and directing a small group of volunteers (approximately 3-5) who will be responsible for keeping the inner building clean and orderly, and organizing the cleaning supplies that are used at UUCM. The work would be directed toward doing the care



and maintenance beyond the duties of our custodial cleaners. The custodial cleaning service is currently coming in on a semiweekly basis until services and gatherings can begin inside again.

Building and Grounds inside volunteers would be needed on a monthly basis, either scheduling a single monthly work day which could coincide with the Grounds Maintenance team's work day or another day of their choice.

#### PROPOSED GROUNDS MAINTENANCE PLAN

Building and Grounds is looking for a person or persons who would be willing to volunteer to take over leadership and management of UUCM's yard and garden. This would ideally be a monthly commitment for a specific period of time. Theresa Houtman is retiring from this position and we are looking for a person who has some basic gardening knowledge and can help guide us in the care and maintenance of our plants and grounds. Theresa would initially still be involved to help in the transition. This person will be in charge of a group of volunteers who will meet on a monthly basis either on a given reoccurring work day or a day that their group decides will work best for them. In order for this to work we would need a minimum of five people.

The Building and Grounds Team will continue to have special workdays as needed in order to work on specific major or unexpected projects. However, they may not fall only on



Saturdays and would hopefully reach out to everyone in the congregation. Also, and importantly, this would be a slow transition so nobody would be left out on their own in the beginning. So, if you feel like stepping out to a new adventure, take the leap.

A/V Team members Andy and Siobhan are shown below during a Sunday service. Andy is managing the sound derived directly from microphones and from a feed from Jordan's own sound mixer. He manages two "mixes." One mix he passes to Siobhan and Zoom while the other feeds the inhouse speakers for the benefit of the limited live audience. Meanwhile Siobhan selects one of three camera views or switches to input from a PowerPoint slide show. The slide show may include videos when the sound is passed to Andy's board. Siobhan inputs both the sound and the video into Zoom where you receive it at home. If you find this confusing, then your perception is accurate.



Both Andy and Siobhan are listening on headphones. Andy's are connected to a PC which acts as a Zoom client in the same way as those of you at home. Siobhan is listening to the input that she directs to Zoom.

Gary Lauer and Steve Temple have both taken turns working the sound. We hope to recruit and train more folks, so we have enough team members. We want to have a rotation and avoid burn out. On the other hand, it's best to do the job on a regular basis so you become and remain adept. Let me know if you are interested. Familiarity with computer and related technology is helpful.

At 10:00 AM after the rehearsal, Beth Karow offers the entire team a blessing, including a plea to any gremlins to stay well away. This probably helps but they still interfere now and again.

### Looking Outside for Inspiration

The Art & Aesthetics team met in person with Rev. Kevin in the UUCM backyard and we did some more visioning on ideas to make this space a visually pleasing and spiritual outdoor spot. Re-landscaping the backyard will be A&A's primary focus for the year. Rev. Kevin had some thoughts on how we might use the space for Soul Matters Circles and small outdoor services, as well as Team and Committee meetings.

We realized that the labyrinth idea that was suggested last month would be difficult to implement due to the slope and that a meandering path with switchbacks would be a better fit. Because it is more level, the upper area will be designated for meeting space instead of the garden bed it is now, and tables, chairs and umbrellas will be added. The meandering path will be on the lower part of the slope, and include potted plants, sculpture and a water feature at the bottom.

Phil Horning took measurements of the area and will be drawing up plans for the renewed space.

This year we will again try to engage the congregation in projects that are spiritually creative. Hopefully we can have some in-person small groups to work on these. We are excited about the possibilities.

# *Justice Warrior of the Month: Keith Johnson*

"I was so glad when UUCM revised the mission statement to clearly state that we exist to create a world more compassionate, sustainable, and just. For me, this has always been the sacred work of this congregation."

So says Keith Johnson, our justice warrior for November. He first joined the UU church in Auburn in 1993 and has been an active member of UUCM since 1997. Justice has always been a focus. Keith was the Justice chair in Auburn and has held that position here for several years. Currently he and Bob Miller serve as co-chairs of the UUCM Justice Team.

In addition to his responsibilities as co-chair, Keith is a member of the Challenging White Privilege Task Force as well as the Carbon Dividend Task Force. He also coordinates the Habitat for Humanity lunch program, the Hospitality House dinner crew, and the UUCM Work Day at IFM.

Keith recognizes that justice work is not always fun. He recalls the Juneteenth gala last summer when the temperature was near 100 and his back pain was awful. But it was all worthwhile because the cause was just and it was a joy to be celebrating with members from UUCM and Color Me Human.

Keith is optimistic about the future of justice at UUCM. "The model of justice work through task forces and partnerships is a great way to build a congregationally based program with a wide variety of justice opportunities for all members." Keith's immediate goal is to help promote existing task forces as well as develop new ones with actively engaged UUCM members. He reminds us that the Justice Team can facilitate and organize justice activities, but only the congregation can actually do justice work.

### Task Force Updates

#### New Task Force – "Stop the Mine"

An energetic group, under the leadership of Justice Team member Jim Bair, continues to work towards becoming the fourth task force recognized by UUCM.

To become a task force the group must be approved at a Community Business Meeting called by the Board. The board wanted to discover the level of support within the congregation before calling such a meeting. The Justice Team prepared an online survey. A total of 98.4% of the respondents are familiar with the proposed Rise Gold Mine project. A clear majority of 90.5% of the respondents support the establishment of the Stop the Mine Task Force.

With this demonstration of support the board has called a Community Business Meeting for Sunday, November 7th at 1:00 PM by Zoom. Anticipate a short meeting with the focus on a vote to establish the task force or not. If you have opinions about UUCM's participation in the community-wide discussion about the proposed mine reopening, then attend the meeting so your vote will be counted.

Meanwhile activists throughout the community are researching the proposal by Rise Gold and identifying impacts.

### NISENAN TASK FORCE



The Nisenan Task Force supported the appearance of Shelly Covert, Spokesperson for the Nevada City Rancheria Nisenan Tribe, at the service on October 10th. Shelly and Frank Lawrence dialogued about the campaign to achieve federal recognition. We continue to learn more about the tribe and their legal status as the land

were offered the opportunity to send a post card to a legislator of their choice advocating placing a price on carbon with an associated payment to every household. Carbon pricing is a hot topic in both houses of congress.

## **Full Community Education**

### Soul Matters: Welcome to the Practice of Holding History

Let's start with the words of Parker Palmer,

"Jewish teaching includes frequent reminders of the importance of a broken-open heart, as in this Hasidic tale: A disciple asks the rebbe: "Why does Torah tell us to 'place these words upon your hearts? Why does it not tell us to place these holy words in our hearts?" The rebbe answers: "It is because as we are, our hearts are

closed, and we cannot place the holy words in our hearts. So we place them on top of our hearts. And there they stay until, one day, the heart breaks and the words fall in."

So, a closed heart. It's admittedly a strange place to begin a month of exploring Holding History. And yet, when we are honest, we know that defensiveness, protectiveness and closed doors rule our relationship with history more than we'd like.

For instance, very few of us have pasts without pain woven through. And it's just easier to shut out those traumatic times than confront them head on. We are all well taught in the game of sweeping old wounds under the rug.

And of course, there's the unprocessed horrors woven throughout our cultural history. They are the rule not the exception, but we work hard to close ourselves off from them with standard lines like, "At our best, this isn't who we are!" or "As Americans, we're better than this!" The truth is we've never consistently been "better than this." Amnesia rather than a courageous and honest reckoning describes the current character of America's heart.

All of which is to say that there is a deeper relationship between history and vulnerability than we often recognize. Without a heart willing to feel pain and endure grief, the fullness of our histories just can't enter in. Talking about past mistakes requires the ability to vulnerably say I'm sorry. An honest telling of racism requires the painful acceptance that some of us still benefit from the prejudices and oppression of our ancestors. Healing historical racism requires someone suffering the costs of reparations. And telling your full story requires navigating grief over choices you wish you would have made differently. It certainly seems the rabbis were right. Like those holy words, history in its fullness just sits there until our hearts break open and allow it in.

So, let's not just "remember" this month. Let's not just talk of telling truthful tales. Let's prepare to grieve, to confess, to feel, to forgive. The world needs broken-open hearts, not just good historians. That is, indeed, the only way the past gets in.
