February 6 Weaving Waters: A Regional Sunday Service

February 13 Widening the Circle, Remembering the Center Rev. Kevin, with Grace Kendrick and Jeff Stone, Worship Associates

As Grace, Jeff, and Rev. Kevin explored the theme of "widening the circle," they kept being drawn back to the awareness that expanding the edges of our circle outward is most possible, perhaps only possible, when we stay rooted in or connected to the center.

Or is it that expanding the edges of our circle ultimately leads us into our center?

February 20 What Circle? - Toxic polarization, cloudy conflicts, and the need to change our ideas about change.

Impossible. Frightening. Dangerous. That's how it feels. In The Way Out, Peter T. Coleman takes head on the pressing question, "What can we do to escape the grip of partisan contempt in our divided society and get back to solving our most pressing problems?" His experience researching, teaching, and facilitating conflict resolution leads him to suggest answers, but likely not the answers you expect. Let's open up our sense of hope by first opening up our sense of the problem.

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From the Minister

Rev. Kevin Tarsa UUCM Minister

Widening the circle of our care and concern is a perennial goal in Unitarian Universalism, at least in spirit or in stated intent. It is a thread that runs through all seven of our UU Principles, from our affirmation of the inherent worth and dignity of every person, to our awareness that we are part of a thoroughly interdependent web of existence.

Living that intention has given us some of the best parts of our tradition's history – courageous theological openness, support of abolition, women's rights, workers' rights, reforms of mental health care institutions, animal rights, Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Queer + rights, for example.

And not quite living that intention has been our tradition's perennial shortcoming – opposition by some to each of the above, a tendency to disparage or denigrate Christianity and those who are politically conservative, and the strikingly less progress made toward facing and dismantling racism in our ourselves, our ways of being, and our institutions.

Still, we hold the aspiration before us, and appropriately so, to widen the circle of our care, compassion, and concern outward, to edges ever farther from our tradition's Boston Brahman historical center. Thus the invitation in our congregation and in our denomination to adopt and commit to an 8th Principle, a principle that shouldn't be necessary, technically, since in theory the existing principles ought to lead us to it and through it.

But, because it moves against powerfully infused patterns and because it will require deep transformation to become a tradition that not only welcomes and incorporates people of color, but an institution and a people willing and able to be thoroughly influenced and changed – transformed – by people of color, we need to commit to and hold before us a principle that will call us forward, a principle that requires our commitment to dismantle racism and other oppressions in ourselves and in our institutions.

The recently affirmed and newly named *Voting Rights and Dismantling Racism Task Force* will, among other things, advocate for and invite the congregation to adopt the proposed 8th Principle. Watch for the task force members' invitations to engage.

Meanwhile, we have many ways to widen the circle of our care and concern. When worship associates Grace Kendrick, Jeff Stone and I met to explore this month's theme and to surface an image for it, rippling rings of water came immediately to our minds' eyes. And just as quickly we realized that this month is not about a single set of concentric rings rippling outward, but about many circles of rings rippling outward, meeting and influencing and overlapping – as you see when rain drops fall upon still water. Where are the outer edges of your care and concern, these days?

On February 6, we'll join UUs from New Mexico to Washington State, Montana to California to Alaska and Hawaii for a shared Sunday service, listening and feeling for its call to the edges of our collective care. On February 13, Grace, Jeff and I will share reflections on the need to stay connected to the center in order to reach out at our margins. On February 20, I will try to bring you words of encouragement and hope, if not ease, and to face head on the spiritual, emotional, social, and political dilemma of our toxically polarized nation. And on February 27, we'll embody our month's theme in story and song, affirming that for us, at our best, it's "Everybody in!"

May each of us find something in the month that helps us to widen our circle at least just a little.

That would be no small thing.

Getting to Know our Endowment Fund

A few years ago, I attended my first annual UUCM Business Meeting. I was looking forward to learning about our financial situation, and what I learned that day made me wonder how a community church like ours ever achieves a really strong balance sheet, much less ensures that we will always have enough contributions to cover expenses. Since then, I've been genuinely impressed by the many hearts and hands that come together in giving and in working and living for each other. Member giving has been strong, with everyone doing their part, but to achieve the strength needed to do great things, something else is needed, too. That something is encouraging the very large gifts that are possible for us only through legacy giving, and that is why our Endowment Fund was started several years earlier.

I mentioned the Endowment Fund briefly at the recent January Business Meeting and told you how much money we have there, but time was short, and there was a lot on the agenda. So, I couldn't fully explain how it is set up and how it works. Since we are currently without a Chair for the Endowment Committee, I thought a series of short articles in the Mountain Chalice each month might be of help: discussing the importance of our Endowment, how it works, and how you can participate in building something of lasting value here at UUCM. It could offer peace of mind for you in a way that will not impact your personal budget. Be on the lookout.

UUCM Renewal Leave/Sabbatical Planning Committee

By now you have likely heard about Rev. Kevin's upcoming renewal leave starting next fall. With the Board's approval, he has chosen to divide that important time into two segments, six weeks in the fall, October 3 through November 14, 2022, and 4.5 months the following spring, between January 16 through May 31, 2023. Such leave is used by ministers for spiritual renewal, study, writing, meditation, and other forms of professional and religious growth.

To provide seamless coverage for ministerial services the Board has gathered the Renewal Leave/Sabbatical Planning Committee. Our committee is charged with identifying the needs of the community relative to the Minister's Renewal Leave, planning for how those needs will be met, and offering a plan for how oversight will be provided.

Rev. Kevin and Board president Pam Kisor wrote a letter announcing Rev. Kevin's upcoming leave that you can find here (https://www.uugrassvalley.org/2022-renewal-leave-announcement/) It contains more details about the renewal leave and includes the Sabbatical Leave section of the Letter of Agreement between UUCM and Rev. Kevin.

We are evaluating the results of the recent input survey and will be sharing them with you soon. Thanks to all those who participated in helping us identify the needs we will be working to address. Look for further communications from our committee in the coming weeks and months.

A Wanderer and a Believer

A Profile of Carmen Riley by Jenny Dewey

Shy and forthcoming, smiling openly and hanging in the back of the room, easily identified by her vivid vintage wardrobe, yet often withdrawn from a crowd, Carmen Riley is well

described as a wanderer and

a believer.

Carmen has Native American ancestry on her mother's side. Her mother never acknowledged the connection. The word was: "Indian? Do you see any Indians around here?" When first knowing Carmen there is no indication. no external evidence, of her deep commitment to Native American history, culture, and artistry. Then it becomes clear: Carmen has a deep, personal bond with Indigenous people.

This is the Believer.

Carmen is a genius with beading, wire-wrapping stones and gems, making "spirit dolls," and turning gnarly tree branches into unique walking sticks. In a shy, subtle way, Carmen connects to her Native American heritage with her art.

Carmen's father was a career military man; he started the first Air Force training survival school and prior to retirement took part in three wars. Her mother yearned for a traditional little girl in pink dresses with ruffles. These dreams dissolved as her daughter grew into a tomboy wearing pants to school and collecting frogs.

Church was a form of torture. She was not a child who took to sitting still. The sermon was a river of meaningless words. Time crept with agonizing slowness. Her mother's conversion to the LDS church caused greater frustration, a desire to kick and scream as she was obliged to attend services.

And so, the Wanderer was hatched.

A passionate desire to own her own horse was a consistent

theme in Carmen's life. Carmen would one day have her own horse.

The little girl was as devoted to her first horse as one is devoted to a newborn. Zan was her beloved personal possession, the door to freedom from her mother's expectations. Inevitably time with Zan took precedence over attending church.


As an adult Carmen experienced a brief introduction to the UU community. This first visit did not "take." The death and a memorial service of a personal acquaintance led to a second visit, and to reconsidering what the UU church had to offer.

The Wanderer was looking for a spiritual home. The Believer was ready to take on the responsibility of believing.

Carmen began to attend UUCM. "I was painfully shy in the beginning," she says.

Several people recognized her shyness and stepped forward to welcome her. Kevin's sermons provided an "underlying spiritual aspect." She was attracted to how people of diverse spiritual pathways were encouraged to join together under one roof.

The UUCM community has created a safe place for Carmen to thrive. There is room for everyone, even a little girl who wanted to be a boy, who demanded to ride horses instead of playing the piano, and who refused to go to church.



Justice News and Activities

Justice Team News

Last month three task forces were renewed and one was terminated. Let's see where the task forces have been and where they are going.

The old *Challenging White Privilege Task Force* was renewed – but with a new name and a new focus. CWP's goal was to promote antiracism through an understanding of white supremacy and systemic racism. Armed with the knowledge gained from reading several antiracism books and listening to the podcast series "Seeing White" and "The 1619 Project", CWP members conducted a UUCM workshop, completed a UUCM survey of racial attitudes, and created a library of reference materials. The group also accepted Color Me Human's invitation to help with the Juneteenth celebration.

With this work successfully accomplished, the task force decided to alter course: the new perspective is reflected in the new name – the *Voting Rights and Dismantling Racism Task Force*. The group's objectives are threefold: Support BIPOC organizations, lobby the congregation to adopt the UUA's 8th Principle to dismantle racism, and advocate for voting rights. Stay tuned for more information about how you can help the task force reach its goals. If you are interested in joining the group, please contact Keith Johnson or Lindsay Dunckel.

The Nisenan Task Force was also renewed and task force members are excited about continuing their work to understand the Nisenan's historical truth and help the tribe restore federal recognition. Last year the group helped fund the California Heritage Indigenous Research Project (CHIRP) and the Ancestral Homelands Reciprocity Program (AHRP). With UUCM's weekly land acknowledgment and events such as the Indigenous Peoples Day service, awareness and knowledge of the Nisenan within the congregation and community has grown substantially.

A focus of the *Nisenan Task Force* this year will be education. A foothills Nisenan history presentation is planned, as well as a book group featuring Nisenan tribal leader Richard Johnson, author of *This is Us*. Watch for the show dates for the film From Wounded Knee to Standing Rock, as well as short films on YouTube produced by local Nisenan members. If you would like to join the Nisenan task force contact Carmen Riley or Holly Rice.

The Justice Team has approved a proposal to terminate the *Carbon Dividend Task Force*. During its two years of existence the task force accomplished much grass roots lobbying in support of the Energy Innovation and Carbon Dividend Act. UUCM has officially endorsed the act. We thank those who supported our tabling efforts at the Grass Valley Thursday Market, the Nevada City Farmers' Market and at many other events. We generated hundreds of constituent letters at these

tabling events. Thanks are also due to those who built the SHOE. It won a prize in the 4th of July Parade. Many of you are displaying Citizens Climate Lobby yard signs. We distributed around 50 signs in Grass Valley and Nevada City.



Although the task force has terminated, members can still be active in lobbying for a price on carbon by participating in the local chapter of the Citizens Climate Lobby. The SHOE is safely stored for the winter in Christy's barn. We expect to see it on the road again this spring. Yard signs are still available.

STOP THE MINE TASK FORCE HEATS UP! By Jim Bair, Leader, Stop the Mine Task Force

We are still vibrating from the excellent energy at the Sunday service letter table January 16, 2022. We provided four different "form" letters to County officials, an instructional information sheet, 500 envelopes with address labels, and even some stamps at the table. Special thanks to Martha, Steve, Robin and Reine. We plan to keep the table there until all Members who want to have sent and handed out letters.

- While the letter writing campaign is in full swing, we also plan to study the DEIR (Draft Environmental Impact Report) and comment on specific parts of it. Comments on the DEIR should be coordinated so we can get broad coverage and provide unique comments. The County does not like repetition of technical points; on the contrary, they like knowing if we are for or against the project which is what our "formatted letters" do. Some of us have already signed up to comment on a DEIR section, e.g., Marion Blair for biological impacts. Comments on the DEIR are due March 4. February: Widening the Circle


