Rev. Kevin Tarsa UUCM Minister



We know it is helpful and good for us to recognize the blessings in our life, no matter what else our lives contain, and yet, and once again our Soul Matters authors point us beyond the usual or obvious:

"... it's not just about widening our view to see the gifts and blessings themselves; it's about widening our understanding of life. Pointing to blessings repairs our relationship with life, allowing us to see it as generous instead of indifferent or threatening. And that's no small thing. Because when the world seems stingy with us, we start getting stingy with others. In contrast, those who feel blessed have little trouble passing blessings on. Most important, as you meet with and speak with others, take a minute to tell of the blessing that you are recognizing and celebrating that day, perhaps the blessing that that person is to you in that moment.

On Sunday, June 5, in a service and picnic at Condon Park, we'll bless one another in all our very human fullness – warts, scars, imperfections, and all. On June 12, we'll celebrate music as a blessing, and celebrate all the blessing that Jordan Thomas-Rose has been to UUCM in his years here. And on the final Sunday of June, we'll celebrate connection, with special refreshments in the sanctuary and joining UU's from around the country in the service being broadcast from General Assembly in Portland, Oregon, the big annual UU gathering.

I am writing this the day after completing our annual Community Business Meeting. Those of you who attended know that I had to conduct the meeting on Zoom as I was sick with a nasty sore throat. I was worried about conducting a multi-platform meeting from Zoom, but it all worked out with only a few glitches along the way. And I am happy to say that we successfully adopted our new budget and elected new board members. I will save the introductions to the board for the next Mountain Chalice, after our new board assembles in July. For this article, as I am still quite under the weather, I am going to cheat a bit and give you a section from my annual report that focuses on our committee achievements this year. The committee members work hard, and this is a good way to spotlight their work.

FROM MY REPORT:

Over the last two years, the transition to our new governing structure has been working well. As we settle into this model, the Board and Minister have been presented with opportunities to reflect on who makes what decisions and to clarify responsibilities. This has allowed both the Board (on the governance side) and Minister (on the ministry side) to focus on what is important in each of the two areas.

Our Board Committees have continued to provide necessary support to the board in spite of lacking enough members.

Our **Governance Committee** Chair, Janet Dunstan has continued her tireless work to organize and align our policies, procedures and committee work. This year three policies have been revised: The Destructive and Dangerous Behavior policy, the Building Access and Keys policy, and minor updates have been made to the Personnel Policy to align with new Federal and State laws.

The Pandemic Health & Safety Committee, under the leadership of Gene Gilligan has consistently provided us with the guidance necessary to weather the on-going storm of COVID. With their council the board made every

effort to be responsive to ever changing restrictions and to the health and safety of our community.

The Finance Committee, led by Carol Richey, has worked diligently, not only to keep our finances in order, but also to adopt new software, *PowerChurch*, for our church operations. This is a major undertaking, one that is still continuing, and when fully implemented should relieve some of the accounting burden that is now carried by the Treasurer and Finance Committee. We are anticipating that *PowerChurch* will be fully operational by July first.

The Committee on Shared Ministry, under the leadership of Lindsay Dunckel and Kathryn Young, conducted the evaluation of our minister this year. They worked to create an evaluation that reflected the respect, mutuality, love, and support embodied in our covenantal relationship with our minister. They focused on areas of ministry that are viewed as key to helping guide Rev. Kevin in his professional growth, thus providing an evaluation that was both helpful and meaningful to Kevin.

As a board member I get to witness firsthand the dedicated work that so many wonderful individuals contribute to UUCM. It is an honor to work alongside them.

What Role Does the Endowment Committee Play?

Previous articles in this series have described the Endowment Fund. We've seen that the Fund is unique in that, as a true endowment, it can help finance church operations, but contributions to the Fund will "live forever" because they cannot be spent. Churches that have built strong endowments over time are relieved of their absolute dependency on pledge payments and plate donations.

We've also seen that the Fund is built by both regular "Simple" gifts that often honor a special individual or cause, and by "planned" giving. Planned giving allows donors to relinquish meaningful sums of money to their beloved church at the end of their lives. This way we can honor the important role UUCM has played in our life at a point in time when we can spare it without putting ourselves in financial jeopardy.

Those articles have mentioned the **Endowment Committee** and its duties only in passing, so today I want to focus on it. Like other UUCM Committees, the Endowment Committee serves the Board of Trustees in important ways. At its core, the Committee takes care of the fund, encourages its growth, and determines where its earnings will be spent. It can be one of the easiest jobs in the church, but at times it can be one of the most important. The first thing the Committee does is receive donations and coordinate with the Treasurer for their deposit into the bank or the UU Common Endowment Fund, celebrating the gifts so the Congregation will know about them. The Committee keeps a simple record of gifts received and communicates with donors of Simple Gifts, thanking them for their generosity.

It is not unusual for the church to go several months between donations, so these duties require only patience and awareness. During these times, too, the Committee gets "the word' out to the Community on the importance of the fund and the opportunity it presents Community members to really make a long-lasting difference. No specialized knowledge of trusts and wills is needed; donors will be encouraged to get this information from estate planning professionals and, ideally, inform the Committee of their bequest plans. The UUA has lots of planned giving resources online for those who might want to learn more.

The final duty of the Endowment Committee is the annual determination and recommendation to the Board on how

Fund proceeds should be used. The Committee, and especially the Chair, exert the strongest influence on the Board in deciding if and how the earnings are to be spent, or if they will stay intact to help compound interest and maximize fund growth.

Please consider taking on this much needed and very valuable service opportunity. This is a place where you can make a difference for UUCM.

After a pandemic hiatus, and in preparation for the sabbatical renewal times next year, Rev. Kevin will once again facilitate a lay sermon-writing seminar for a circle of 6-8 people.

Using *The Shared Pulpit* book and the rich and connective process developed by the Rev. Erika Hewitt, each person will gradually develop a complete sermon over eight sessions, with support, feedback and encouragement from the rest of the circle. Then, willing members will work with Worship Team members and our Music Director to develop a service around the sermon and its theme.

This will be a significant and meaningful commitment, as the group will meet once in June, and then every two weeks for three hours July through September. The experience will function as both a space of learning and self-discovery as well as a small-group ministry, building deep connections en route to deep expression in one's authentic voice. Our hope is that these sermons/services will then be offered on Sunday mornings, and so benefit the Community as well.

The group will find a mutual meeting time once the membership of the group is settled.

UUCM Renewal Leave/Sabbatical Planning Committee Update

By this fall Rev. Kevin will have accrued six months of renewal leave (sabbatical), one month for each year of service. With the Board's approval, he has chosen to divide that important time into two segments, six weeks from October to November 2022, and 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ months between January and May 2023. Such leave is used by ministers for spiritual renewal, study, writing, meditation, and other forms of professional and religious growth.

The congregation will manage the October to November portion of his leave on our own and we will hire a Sabbatical Minister to help us with the January to May portion.

The Renewal Leave committee has been meeting weekly since last October. In January we polled our community on their concerns and priorities about the renewal leave time. Additionally, through conversations with the Board and the Ministry Council which is composed of one member of each Ministry Team, we have identified the specific roles and activities that Rev. Kevin now fills that will need to be met during his leave and how those needs will be met.

We have developed a job description for our Sabbatical Minister that has just recently been posted and we are ready to receive applications. This renewal leave will also be an opportunity for growth for our community as some of Rev. Kevin's roles will be taken on by the Ministry Teams while other roles will be filled by the Sabbatical Minister.

Have you ever thought about HUGS? During the pandemic, when hugging was forbidden, the meaning of what it is to give, or receive, a hug took on whole a new meaning. Hugging is fundamental, from the time a baby is born to when someone dies. Many creatures hug. Orangutans hug their offspring for years. So do chimpanzees, monkeys, and gorillas.

Where would we all be without hugs? My cat requires regular doses of hugs, squeezes, caresses, embraces, and of course, meals on demand.

We found out the importance of hugs when the risk of contracting an incurable virus forbade close contact. Rubbing elbows took the place of hugging. Most people found this a lame expression of affection. Better than nothing, one supposes. Better than staring into a friend's eyes wondering what to do next.

Showing we care about each other may be by hugging, but spend a minute thinking about other ways. You will make discoveries. You may come to realize looking at someone tenderly replaces a hug. Or sitting by someone's bedside, or taking a child's temperature, or smoothing the frizzy hair on your dog.

Consider joining a group of people who focus a good deal of their time on showing they care. This group is called, go figure, The Parish Caring Team. In spite of lingering questions about getting the virus the Caring Team is as active as ever. A short list: delivering groceries, prescriptions, shopping, making phone calls, sending pet cards and cards for people with illness or broken bones.

A Self-Described Introvert

A Profile of Gwen Eymann by Jennifer (Jenny) Dewey

To know Gwen Eymann in action makes it extraordinary that she describes herself as an introvert. A shining example of how unlikely this description is can be witnessed every Sunday Service at **UUCM** watching Gwen moving about. When I was a newcomer to the congregation, feeling shy and consumed by the urge to flee, watching Gwen greeting people, talking easily, even



at the same time she understands boundaries. Perhaps this skill developed when she practiced nursing. Nurses can go just so far in soothing and healing sick, wounded people. There are limits, no matter how much you care.

A kid outside the circle of popular girls, growing up in straitened circumstances, and being alone a lot, helped cultivate Gwen's introverted

hugging people, I immediately defined her as an extrovert.

The mystery is solved by talking to Gwen one-to-one. Like many others she began attending UUCM (twenty years ago) feeing uncertain and shy. It took time before she was ready to became involved as a volunteer. She says, "It takes a lot of energy to be socially involved."

This is the introvert speaking.

As the daughter of a doctor, she learned early the value of caring for people. The UUCM congregation offered a chance to be part of a group of people with strong concern for others.

Gwen's life has been altered by tragedy: the sudden and unexpected death of her husband when their daughter was in her early teens devastated them. This event led to a powerful desire to find something everyday life does not offer: to be guided spiritually.

"Nursing and motherhood have given me the greatest joy." This statement reveals a secret "self" hidden within the introvert-extrovert. Nurturing comes naturally to Gwen, and

side. Wanting and needing meaningful human connections made UUCM ideal ground for developing the person she wanted most to be.

There is, still, the question people are bound to ask: is she or is she not an introvert? Watching her in action, one scratches one's head to sort out the answer.

One thing absolutely and clearly true about Gwen is her courage. When writing a story for a picture book I asked Gwen to describe an event from childhood that altered her perspective on life. She told me about a neighbor who did not mind a small girl's unannounced visits. From this stop she wandered on for a long time through the neighborhood, winding up at the home of a well-known judge. The judge was an impressive figure who might have scolded her. She felt no fear, and no guilt for roaming around on her own. The judge took her home.

Courage – this is part of mystery of Gwen. It takes courage to become involved with large groups of people, to accept responsibility for others, to admit one's shyness and shortcomings and move forward anyway.

Justice Team Update

Lots of things are happening with justice at UUCM. Here are just three projects you should know about.

- The Bending the Arc task force is hard at work sending postcards to voters throughout the United States to encourage greater voter participation. Almost 2,000 postcards were sent to Georgia voters in time for the May 25 primary. Thanks to all UUCM members who sent postcards. Next up is the Florida primary election to be held August 23. Of course, the November mid-term elections are just around the corner—lots of postcards to write!
- The Get Out the Vote Postcard Club has been launched to continue our get out the vote efforts in a more sustainable way. Anyone can join the club the UUCM community, family, friends, or anyone who wants to help counter voter suppression. Each month members of the club will be provided with one packet of 20 postcards, stamps, and addresses. Club members can write postcards, contribute financially to this project, or both. For more details contact Gail Johnson Vaughn at gail@giv4kids.com. (Also see page 4.)
- Response" to events or actions that are unjust. A Rapid Response could be a demonstration, a march, a letter writing campaign, or similar activities. Here's the plan:. Any member of UUCM who becomes aware of an unjust action may propose a Rapid Response and then forward the proposal to a contact person from the Justice team. The contact person will alert co-chairs of the Justice team, who will recommend approval or disapproval of the proposal. The final decision will be made by the minister. If the Rapid Response is approved, the person initiating the request will be responsible for organizing the response with assistance from the Justice team, the minister, and the congregation as needed.
- Opt in email list for current events: Would you like to have a handy tool to keep you organized? Have you ever missed participating in a demonstration because you found out about it too late? Did you really want to volunteer for a project but cannot remember the date and time? If so, never fear, your Justice team has the solution! The team is creating an opt-in email list for members and friends of UUCM. If you agree to have your name placed on the list, our team will make sure you receive prompt notice of justice events, demonstrations, and volunteer opportunities. Keep in mind that notification does not mean you must participate in any event or project if you

Justice Warrior of the Month: Carol Kuczora

Carol Kuczora has had a full but difficult life which has long been motivated by the desire for justice. The need for fairness felt instinctive to her and was present from

an early age. Carol says that she actually likes herself now, but her incarnations have been unwanted baby, lonely child, shy teenager, depressed wife and mother, stressed divorcee, and late graduate (in Humanistic Psychology). Her allergy to chemicals led to successful research into its etiology. Also, she has been a caretaker, world traveler, and climate activist. She was a fan of Abraham Maslow and wanted to rewrite textbooks to include love, compassion, courage, creativity, "peak experiences," and an ethical sense under motivation theory.

After a particularly difficult period in her life, she "fell straight up" to a god-like vantage point where all the mysteries of the universe seemed clear and all the sciences rhymed with each other, reflecting a common pattern. She felt that this Divinity wasn't an entity, but a principle.

Carol moved to Grass Valley in 1994 to help her ailing father. After his passing, she traveled the world including France, India, Thailand, Cambodia, Egypt, Jordan, China, Tibet, Australia, New Zealand, Fiji, Israel, Palestine, Turkey, and Greece! Most of these trips were by herself.

She defines herself as Spiritual Progressive but decided that she can't be one all by herself. That's when she joined UUCM and felt she had a home. She now calls herself a born-again Unitarian. (Until then she had proudly called herself an atheist.) She also joined other local groups, and she volunteers at the Interfaith Food Ministry and Earth Day. However, she feels that she enjoys a sense of accomplishment only when she writes a letter to the editor. She added that she hopes that the UUCM congregation will recognize that climate change is a dire emergency. In doing so, we should waste nothing, avoid plastic, drive less, use the train, save water, and buy used goods. We should also move savings out from banks that fund fossil fuels, and we should lobby governments, manufacturers, and distributors to do the same.

Thank you, Carol, for sharing the story of your remarkable life with us. We are indeed fortunate to have you in our congregation.

Stop the Mine Task Force in Major Push Against Huge Threat

The STM Task Force has been exceptionally active testifying, writing letters to the Board of Supervisors, getting businesses to sign the petition to stop the mine, personing tables in public venues (our Briar Patch table was very popular!), putting up signs, and more.

Progress on Top Objective. To move toward our objective, we are scheduled to meet with

Supervisor Sue Hoek, (District 4) Board Chairperson, on May 2. Of the five Supervisors (Sue, Heidi Hall, Ed Scofield, Dan Miller, and Hardy Bullock), Sue appears to be the most undecided.

Scofield and Miller are very likely to vote for the Mine, and Hall and Bullock are almost certainly to vote against it, as is Lisa Swarthout, if elected. Sue is likely the swing vote, but she is up for re-election. Subsequent personal meetings are to be with Hall and Scofield.

While UUCM may not endorse particular candidates, we can share where candidates stand on issues. Here are the candidates for June 7:

District 3: Valentina Masterz, Patti Ingram Spencer, <u>Lisa</u> <u>Swarthout</u>

District 4: Calvin Clark, Susan Hoek

Those underlined are predicted to oppose the Mine. Restaurant owner Masterz has no experience but vocally opposes the Mine (and thus will be barred from voting on it if she were to be elected.)

Hundreds of Comments Delivered. Despite the overwhelming opposition expressed in comments on the DEIR (Draft Environmental Impact Report) there is still danger that political predisposition will prevail in the Board vote. We pushed hard to get comments written and attendance at the County Planning Commission special hearing, and helped get one of the largest turn-outs ever to a Planning Commission meeting: About 450 citizens overflowed the County meeting facilities on March 24!

Despite forcing the DEIR to be rewritten because it didn't

provide valid mitigations of dozens of negative impacts, the Mine's revised version could still be approved by the Board of Supervisors in a few months.

Backroom Intrigue. Frank Lawrence, our Nisenan attorney, wrote a scathing legal DEIR comment for the Nisenan. Even though State law requires that the Tribe be consulted on matters impacting their ancestral land, they were not. The CEO of Rise Mine, Ben Mossman, responded with a private email to the County Planners and Frank saying, "The county is so naive in trying to assist this group to gain status. Welcome to Canada." There has been outrage!

Be Active Now. Soon the County's Economic Impact Study will be released and we need to be ready for public hearings. Claims of economic value by the Mine are refutable, but we have to get the word out. Letters and testimony to the Board on economics are crucial at this time. There are some persons who believe that jobs and County revenue are worth the risk of lethal air pollution, water and well loss, serious noise, explosives, traffic, and environmental destruction. Let's continue to be a voice against falsehoods.

Our June Theme: CELEBRATING BLESSINGS

A Soul Matters facilitator once shared, "I guess after plan A fails, I need to remember there's still a whole alphabet out

Who of us doesn't need a little help remembering that? Especially after enduring Covid for so long. And the ongoing reckoning with racism. And the world's inability to deal with climate change. And political division. You get the point. It's easy to feel demoralized, daunted and defeated these days. With so many things going wrong, it's easy to overlook the many things going right.

For Unitarian Universalists, this tunnel vision is the central tragedy of the human condition, not just of our times. We respect those who frame the human problem as sin or twisted wills, but it's nearsightedness that our religion is most worried about. Which is also why blessings are so core to our faith. They are our way of widening our view.

You see, unlike some of our sibling religions, we don't say a lot of blessings. But we do point to them. For us, blessings are not so much about giving something to each other as they are about helping each other notice all that's already been given.

And it's not just about widening our view to see the gifts and blessings themselves; it's about widening our understanding of life. Pointing to blessings repairs our relationship with life, allowing us to see it as generous instead of indifferent or threatening. And that's no small thing. Because when the world seems stingy with us, we start getting stingy with others. In contrast, those who feel blessed have little trouble passing blessings on. Life spills into us and we spill into others.

And in that overflow, it does indeed get a whole lot easier to notice that there is, most certainly, a whole alphabet out there.
