July 3Principled and Purposeful:What does it mean to be UU in these times?Rev. Kevin Tarsa, Cheryl Morris, Worship Assoc.

We launch our summer theme – asking what our Unitarian Universalist Principles ask of us – by asking what it means to be Unitarian Universalist in these times. And how and why does being UU matter? Freshly informed by the gatherings of UU ministers and UU members from across the country just one week earlier, we'll look ahead with principles and with purpose for the spiritual center of this tradition.

July 10 UU Principle #1: Let's Start at the Beginning Lindsay Dunckel, Worship Leader

The first principle might just be the bedrock of UUism: It calls us to accept, way deep down, the inherent worth and dignity of every person. What does this look like when we put it into action? And how would people change if they knew we thought this of them? Join in while we explore this in story and song and ... real life.

The third principle calls for the acceptance of one another and the encouragement to spiritual growth in our congregations. UUCM members have a rich array of ways we feed our spirits. Got a Message in You?

After a pandemic hiatus, and in preparation for the sabbatical renewal times next year, Rev. Kevin will once again facilitate a lay sermon-writing seminar for a circle of 6-8 people.

Using *The Shared Pulpit* book and the rich and connective process developed by the Rev. Erika Hewitt, each person will gradually develop a complete sermon over eight sessions, with support, feedback and encouragement from the rest of the circle. Then, willing members will work with Worship Team members and our Music Director to develop a service around the sermon and its theme.

This will be a significant and meaningful commitment, as the group will meet in July, and then every two weeks for three hours July through September. The experience will function as both a space of learning and self-discovery and as a small-group ministry, building deep connections en route to deep expression in one's authentic voice. Our hope is that these sermons/services will then be offered on Sunday mornings, and so benefit the Community as well.

The group will find a mutual meeting time once the membership of the group is settled.

Join the "Get Outthe Vote Postcard Club"

The tally jar poster is filling up fast and the word is spreading! At Juneteenth we signed up six new postcard club members (600 postcards) and gave out an additional eight packets (160 postcards). Additionally, a representative from the Business and Professional Women of Nevada County came and picked up 25 packets (500 postcards)!

HOW DOES THE CLUB WORK?

Members commit to sending a minimum of 20 cards a month (one packet) for June through October. Our June and July postcards get out the vote for the Florida Primary (August 23.) August through October cards get out the vote for the November general election. Postcards are targeted to registered Black voters who haven't voted in recent elections many due to voter suppression laws. Our postcards encourage them and give them important information for navigating around the new laws.

HOW ARE WE PAYING FOR THE COST OF STAMPS, ETC?

We have three kinds of memberships -

- Writer/funders who pay the \$10 cost of each packet (\$50 for all five months),
- Writers-only whose packet costs are scholarshiped
- Funders-only who contribute to the Writers-only packets

Thanks to all of you generous UUCM members and friends, <u>Child Advocates of Nevada County</u> will receive **\$768.54** to support its advocacy for the best interests of abused and neglected children. **Child Advocates of Nevada County** work to provide healthy baby home visits, through which new and expecting parents learn to solve problems, manage, stress, and enjoy and understand their child at every stage, from infancy to kindergarten.

We are currently completing June collections for the <u>Nevada County Veterinary Disaster Response Team</u> (NCVDRT), also known as Nevada County Animal Evacuation, which houses, feeds and procures medical attention, if needed, for animals evacuated during fires or floods.



Our July partner, <u>Nevada County Habitat for Humanity</u>, brings people together to build homes, communities and hope, in a county where more than 48% of residents pay more than they can afford in housing costs. The Philosopher A Profile of Chuck Champlin by Jennifer (Jenny) Dewey

This writer interviewed Chuck Champlin without having known him, except by sight, and ended up discovering a man with profound ideas about the world and the human role in the "web of life." His thoughts and ideas flow easily, and it is clear he has spent a lot of time in reflection in order to arrive at his beliefs.



When I visited Chuck, we sat in the shade of a wide umbrella by the swimming pool and talked about everything from Unitarian principles, (how basic and true), to views on the Universe. Chuck spoke easily of these things. I was struck by his selfconfidence.

Chuck has had scary moments in his life. He

Chuck was raised a

Catholic. He long ago left the Catholic view of human life on Earth and developed his own theories. These theories carry one's mind into areas of thought that are unique and challenging. At the same time, one rarely meets a person so down to earth and basically easy to talk to, someone open to discussion on a variety of subjects.

One subject is especially delightful: how Chuck and his wife Lesley originally met. They were high school sweethearts, aged around fifteen and sixteen. Their youthful romance ended and both married other people. Many years later they met again and were free to pick up where they left off so many years ago.

Visiting this pair is a joy. They live in a sunny, spacious house (with a swimming pool to envy), and have a couple of small dogs and a cat. Chuck's office has bookshelves sagging with a wide variety of titles. He has favorite authors, one of them being Carl Sagan. He also has his own books to share, books expressing a combination of innate optimism, scientific thought, and ideas about consciousness. He has one novel to his credit. experienced cardiac arrest and were it not for quick action on Lesley's part, he probably would not have survived. The pair moved to this area seven years ago to be close to family. It is obvious when visiting them, that this is one happy couple with shared views on life.

My daughter was with me when I visited Chuck. They got on famously, and immediately, and discussed esoteric (to me) subjects as if they'd known each other for years. My daughter is a librarian at a charter school. She has recently acquired a grant to bring speakers into the library to talk to kids. She asked Chuck if he'd be willing to be a speaker and he instantly and enthusiastically agreed.

Chuck is open to the world. He obviously enjoys sharing his ideas with others. It is also clear he absorbs information easily without prejudice. Such a person is a gift to the UUCM community, and to the community at large.

• THE BENDING THE ARC TASK FORCE

The evening will conclude with a discussion about your impressions of the documentary as well as short presentations from task force members concerning what we at UUCM can do to combat voter suppression. GUN VIOLENCE

Rev. Kevin recognized the need of many members to respond to the recent acts of gun violence.

He initiated a series of three conversations:

In the first, participants expressed and shared their grief In the second participants, who believe in common sense gun control, answered a series of questions. The questions were intended to clarify their own experience with guns and explore how they might discuss gun related issues with others who have different views.

He asked the Justice Team to consider the form of the third conversation.

I believe that debates or discussions between individuals with different views risk further polarizing those involved. One of the participants in the second conversation decided to simply listen to the views of others. Perhaps this is the approach we should take for the third conversation. What do you think? Justice Warrior of the Month: Joel Houtman

I was born and raised on a farm in South Dakota.

I got a degree in Physics and was working on my PhD when the Vietnam war intervened and I faced the draft. I became ardently opposed to the war. I originally decided to refuse induction and go to jail, but in 1969 it became apparent that there was a rising revolt in the military against the war. So like many young men, I decided to comply with the draft and go into the army and join in the antiwar movement in the military.

I joined with other guys to form **GIs United Against the War** on Ft. Huachuca, Arizona. This effort was highly successful. We started a monthly newsletter and participated in many actions. The most successful was our demand that we had the right to circulate a petition on fort against the war. Much to our amazement the brass allowed us to do so. It was spectacularly successful. Shortly thereafter I found myself out of the Army as result of being investigated by the FBI for being a subversive security risk.

After my stint in the Army I continued my activism. The war continued for several more years and I joined Vietnam Veterans Against the War. I also was the Colorado Socialist Workers Party candidate for US House of Representatives in 1972. Naturally, I was resoundingly defeated, but it was fun. I moved to the Los Angeles area and became highly active in the solidarity movement with the people of El Salvador and Nicaragua.

When the first Gulf war began, I became active in the movement against that war. During that protest movement I met Theresa in a protest on a street corner in Claremont, California. That was probably the best thing that happened. We got married. We later moved to the Central Coast and then to Grass Valley.

We decided to check out UUCM. As an atheist I resisted joining anything "churchy," but I was drawn to UUCM's activism in social justice. I liked both the tradition of UUCM as a community and its activism in the wider community.

I was also pleased to discover that UUCM had a Humanist group. This allowed me to have a community that also did not require one to be "spiritual" but championed the science and naturalism of Humanism.

Over the years I began to be drawn into the organization of UUCM itself. To enjoy the benefits of membership of UUCM requires one to actively volunteer for the organization itself. I became active in various roles in the community including the Building and Grounds committee. I also was Treasurer and member of the Board of Trustees for three years.

Although I enjoyed that work, I feel the heart and soul of UUCM should be its social Justice work. That will continue to be the source of our growth.

Stop the Mine Task Force Finding False Claims by Rise Gold Mine

Active Members of the STM Task Force have been continuing to discover falsehoods perpetrated by Rise Gold Mine Inc. Most recently, we presented our economic findings to Bob Branstrom, Grass Valley City Council Member. He found our discovery of false claims* in the Rise Gold Economic Impact Study to be valuable and recommended we make our findings available to the public. (Of course, local government officials must abide by the policy of not taking a position until "final" results of the Environmental Impact Report and the County's Economic Impact Report are completed). An "economic subcommittee" of diligent volunteers is meeting to translate the economic impacts into eye-catching sound bites.

We are also getting approval for and preparing (cheers for Marion Blair and Anita Wald-Tuttle) to run a table at Briar Patch publicizing the Mine's impacts and obtaining MineWatch petition signatures. **VOLUNTEERS ARE NEEDED** for this fun interaction with the community.

Perhaps they believe that medical care, especially ER visits, will dramatically increase jobs because of the extremely dangerous work in the tunnels, several hundred feet underground, 12 hours. a day...!" - Jim Bair

Justice News and Updates

Reflections on US Democracy in the Light of the January 6th Events

I am writing to share my anguish over the revelations of the House Select Committee investigating the Jan 6th insurrection. And I do this because putting my feelings into words sometimes succeeds in moving me to a better place, and I suspect that others in our UUCM community might find a bit of relief in my sharing. Much of the evidence being presented was already available, but somehow seeing such a forceful organization of the following facts have hit me very hard, and I feel mentally (and to some degree physically) depleted.

- I find it incredible that a politician (from any political party), having taken the solemn oath of the US Presidency, would be capable of planning and conducting a campaign to break the laws of the orderly transfer of power that characterize our democracy.
- I also find it incredible that, with a few notable and courageous exceptions, the President's entire family, legal and advisory staff, and elected Republicans in both houses of Congress, either supported his illegal coup attempt, or kept their mouths shut.
- I find it tragic to listen to the hatred and violence heaped on public officials who resisted illegal pressures and respected their own oath of office.
- And more than anything else, I find it incredible that a huge percentage of our fellow citizens (and some public media) continue to deny the mountain of evidence, refuse to condemn the attempted coup d'etat, and continue to honor the villain who heaped so much evil on our country.

At this moment, it is difficult to say if I experience more pain personally from feelings of betrayal by our elected leaders, and/or the ache that comes from asking myself where we are headed as a society and as a democratically free (and dare we say informed) country. If we cannot agree that an attempted and illegal coup is not acceptable in the United States and to its people, what do we have left to believe in and bind us?

Thank you for reading. I would welcome meeting with others interested in sharing feelings and discussing the way forward, which seems quite difficult right now.

COVID 19 protocols state that anyone with symptoms of respiratory infection (e.g., cough, runny nose, fever) must not


