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From the Minister

Rev. Kevin Tarsa UUCM Minister

One of the readings I've drawn upon numerous times, for closing words in meetings, circles, and Sunday services, offers the wisdom and encouragement of the Rev. Wayne Arnason:

Take courage friends. The way is often hard, the path is never clear, and the stakes are very high.

Apt for this moment. Apt for most moments.

And of course, he doesn't leave it there.

As I write, I am down to the final couple weeks before our shared six-week fall sabbatical-renewal begins on October 3. Yes, it is meant to be a time of renewal for the minister, but it is also a time of renewal for the congregation. It is a chance to strengthen identity, confidence, skills, and emotional resilience in ways that are not dependent on the presence of the minister. It is a time to discover that, "Yes, we can do this! And not only that, we can do this really well!"

One never knows what will arise in the course of six coming weeks in a world of events that keep defying our assumptions and expectations, but no matter what arises, know that you are in good hands. By that, I'm referring to not only your elected and appointed leaders, who are continually generous and amazing, I am also referring to your fellow members and dedicated friends. You are in good hands and good hearts with each other. If any moments get sticky or messy, I encourage you to remember this.

Sometimes, when an identified leader is away, people's discomfort or worry manifests in unexpected ways. People may, for a moment, not be at their best. You, for a moment, may not be at your best. And... you and other people may, for a moment, rise to your absolute, shining best.

No matter what arises, in your midst or in the world,

Take courage. For deep down, there is another truth: you are not alone.

You have not only each other, and your UUCM Board and other leaders, you also have available to you significant goodwill in the wider community and among our neighboring faiths, and the support of the wider UU Association.

For my part, my goal for these six weeks is to unplug deeply, to let go of any concerns other than being present to the



moment. I'll spend three of the six weeks camping, just me and the rhythms of the sun and stars, moving water, and the quiet spinning of the Earth. I hope to reach a deep enough stillness to hear what's stirring at the center of my heart and of my awareness. From that place, I will discern what the longer sabbatical-renewal time in the new year most needs to be. This is a journey I used to take at 7-year intervals, but I missed the last round, so I am overdue. I am very much looking forward to it, and to the ways it will allow me to be of stronger and more sustained service here at UUCM.

May this renewal time allow the congregation to hear, in its own way, a bit more of what's stirring at the center of its own heart and awareness. I look forward to sharing our stories and our newfound awareness afterward, and to anticipating the deep opportunity coming in the new year.

At a recent Caring Team meeting Penny Harlan told the story of a fire that threatened her grandson's small farm. The evacuation order was in place. Jason, Penny's grandson refused to leave saying, "I won't leave my pigs."

Jason joined the firefighters in their efforts to subdue the fire, which burned to within ten feet of his property line.

The farm was saved, and so were the pigs.

A happy ending to a scary story? Yes, but the story does not end there.

We learned one of the firefighters came by a few days after the fire and bought six pigs.

The message from this story is: A good result may follow a difficult situation.

The Caring Team focuses on helping turn a difficult situation into a positive one: a UUCM-er is having surgery, or needs a grocery pick-up, or a prescription delivered, or maybe just a check-in phone call. Simple, easy, non-intrusive, and always gentle, the actions of the Caring Team make a difference. Surprising turns of fortune, like the firefighter wanting pigs, happen every day. These happenings often occur behind the scenes and go unrecognized. No matter. The point is made: someone cares.

I've always enjoyed painting and drawing. I spent a lot of time in the art room in high school, painted at home, and was lucky to receive hand-me-down

darkroom equipment and a 35mm camera when I was 16. I loved the magic of composing a photo and then watching images develop on film and on paper. In college I majored in photography and continued to take drawing, painting, and printmaking classes. It was a wonderful time of exploration and expression. After college I explored botanical illustration and graphic design.

I loved art history classes, participation in group critiques, and visits to art museums.

As I entered my late twenties I let my inner critic question my abilities and creative process. I struggled to trust my voice. Eventually, I let go of my daily practice of drawing and painting and focused on practical matters. I navigated a commute between Redwood City, San Francisco, and Hayward for work and graduate school and let my artistic practice dwindle.

Later, as a mother, I dabbled. When my two daughters were in preschool and primary grades we spent time each day with arts, crafts, and storytelling. It was richly fulfilling. However, I



didn't use this time to make art for myself. It was enough to share the joys of creativity and self-expression with my children. I marveled at their creations.

Art always beckoned me. Over the past 35 years I felt at home and restored while painting or visiting a museum but rarely gave myself over to it.

These paintings are from the past five years. I was ready to play and explore. My inner

critic was now on my side and showed up as a kind, gentle, and helpful voice. (Thank you, Brené Brown.)

I enjoy a very abstract creative process. I let the image develop and 'speak to me,' to tell me what makes sense. Sometimes I work from a photo, sometimes I start with a stroke or a penciled outline of a composition. I focus on a feeling, a place, memory, or really all of that at the same time.

I allow curiosity about the image as I create it. Some images are uncomfortable and represent hurt or healing. Others capture something about a place – the colors, shadows, shapes that happen at various times within a day or season. I let myself journey into the process, make decisions, be in the moment, and declare a stopping point when I feel the painting has completed its mission for me. It's about curiosity, observation, self-reflection, and freedom.

I welcome the journey of each painting. I hope I can provide you with an opportunity to find a connection to an image. What does it evoke in you?

It is a very personal process and I appreciate the opportunity to share it with you.

Profile of a Profiler by Jenny Dewey

From Rev. Kevin Tarsa – "Author Jenny Dewey is usually writing about others in these monthly Mt. Chalice profiles. This time she turns her thoughtful eye on her own journey."

The profiler is someone who once dreamt of riding bareback on a fast horse, racing away into the hills and becoming an Indian maiden wearing a soft, buckskin dress and beaded moccasins.

The profiler's reality was a small, dusty valley where everybody was a Catholic and she wanted to be one too.

Her father told her if Holy Water didn't freeze, he would allow her to be baptized a Catholic.

It was winter and the Holy Water froze solid.

The profiler contented herself by going to church with her friends, listening to the music,

smelling the incense, loving the candlelight, and wishing she could be confirmed and wear a white dress and lacetrimmed socks.

The profiler's family disintegrated, blew up like a bomb, and everything changed.

The profiler was sent away to boarding school where all but a handful of the students were Jewish.

She learned about the Jewish faith and thought of becoming a Jew. The opportunity never came, and the idea drifted away.

The minister at the school was Protestant. His sermons were about Heaven (unreachable) and Hell (where we were all destined to end up).

The profiler became confused and angry, and this is when her search began.

She read philosophical books and learned about the religions of the world. To the profiler, these religions seemed remote, too hard to reach out and touch, hard to become one of.

The profiler's search went on and on. She grew up and had a child of her own, a daughter. She wanted her child to have a "heart place," an expression the profiler learned from the Navajo People. The heart place is where communities meet, join together, and celebrate.

The child was tiny when the profiler learned of a religion that didn't speak

of Heaven or Hell. She learned the name of the religion. It was called Unitarian Universalist. Within these two words what the profiler had been searching for seemed attainable. For herself and her daughter, this was the heart place.

The profiler knew it would take time. There were Principles to learn about, trust for people around her to be developed, and friendships to be made.

Now the profiler is an old woman. Her child is grown with a life of her own. But they share a bond, a recognition of what is still, for both of them, the heart place.

Writing as a Means to Connect

Always wanted to write? Got a seed germinating? Curious about exploring the writing process? Looking to connect with others?

Join writer and artist Jenny Dewey in a gentle, meaningful process of expressing yourself, beginning with writing and sharing an introduction to who you are. (See Jenny's profile in the October Mt. Chalice, page 8). Then move to the writing that calls you next.

Connecting with others occurs in a variety of ways. It is a process. Imagine yourself a voyager, a traveler. Chances are you will never grow close to those you meet along the way. As a wayfarer your goal is to observe and to keep moving.

Creating lasting relationships usually begins with small gestures, a smile or a nod. One cannot know the outcome of any relationship until time has passed and trust has been established.

People attending UUCM hear a lot about the significance of making connections with people around them. They want to know more about each other. This can be a slow journey with bumps, setbacks, and even the urge to abandon your goal.

Writing is like this. It, too, is a process. Writing includes setbacks and the urge to give up. Imagine you have a tiny seed in the palm of your hand. The seed has promise. You know there is a chance it will grow beyond its unimpressive size. It will change from a small thing to something bigger.

A desire to sit down and write requires courage. You are likely to begin with an idea, and, as it is getting to know someone, the idea changes over time. You understand this. You accept it as essential to the process.

Sessions offered under the UUCM "tent" provide a chance to express yourself with words. Unlike the roamer, here is the chance to explore in a deeper way the world you are passing through.

We will spend our last Sunday service of October Remembering our Ancestors at our Day of the Dead service. (See page 1.) Let's reconvene in the evening with a potluck supper that continues the celebration...

We all have favorite foods that instantly remind us of someone who has passed on. Whether it's Great Granny's dinner rolls, Auntie's Peach Pie, Grampa's famous brisket... recipes that, each time we make them, fill us with memories of our Beloved Dead.

This time of year, when the veil between the worlds of Living and Dead is thinnest, is a perfect time to gather together as a community to feast, sharing recipes as we share old memories while making new ones. Justice Warrior of the Month: Eileen Hale

Eileen Hale is our Justice Warrior for October. Her active justice work began in college when she participated in sit-ins in 1967 at the Oakland Induction Center protesting the Vietnam War. That activity led to her arrest and spending 10 days in jail and becoming a founding member of Honkys for Huey. Then she dropped out of Mills College and spent 1968 in Berkeley as a hippie.

Fair treatment for farmers, ranchers, and workers (including coal miners) is also important to her. She hopes for a balance and coordinated solutions to problems between the concerns of these groups and our concerns for wildlife and the environment. She has started to learn and teach PNDC (Powerful Non-Defensive Communication) partly because of the difficulty humans have talking to each other about these issues. Also, she feels like the systems for working with nature that come out of Perelandra* offer the same peer-balancing tools for human-nature interactions that PNDC does for human-to-human interactions.

Eileen has pursued learning the Mountain Maidu language but recently shifted the focus of her support to the Nisenan people. She is also broadening her view towards other tribes, such as in Berkeley (Muwekma Ohlone) where she was born, New Jersey (Leni Lenape) where she was raised, and eastern Massachusetts (Wampanoag) where she has family. Also, she is happy hearing about tribes beginning to get some of their land back and about beavers moving back into more areas.

In UUCM she finds so many people who share her concerns and are active in the gazillion other ways no one person can

cover. She cherishes our congregation's connection and support for the Nisenan and appreciates the stand we have taken against the proposed mine. Also, she is glad that her skills and aptitudes can contribute to UUCM behind the scenes and that her art and poetry feed our community in a different way.

She says one of her deepest wishes is for everyone to be included and respected – for all of life to be included and lived within (sometimes contentious) harmony. She wishes for more balance, caring, mutual respect, and mutual caring among different groups of humans and between humans and the environment; she feels those attitudes will lead to a more beautiful and joyful world for all. We are so blessed to have Eileen in our congregation.

*Note from the Author: Before writing this article I didn't know about Perelandra. Maybe some of our readers didn't either. The name of the research center came from the title of one book in a science fiction trilogy by C. S. Lewis, later re-titled "Voyage To Venus" Perelandra's offerings have been described as being for everyone who wants to take charge of their health, life, and environment in simple, new, and extraordinarily effective ways.

Courageous people change the world. There are so many examples of

that this month. October's celebration of LGBTQ+ history month reminds us of the many who bravely moved (and continue to move) our world toward greater acceptance and affirmation. The revolutionary prophet of peace, Mohandas Gandhi, was born on October 2.
