Happy New Year everyone! I hope this newsletter finds you safe, healthy, and ready for whatever 2023 brings. Last month the Board was finally able to meet for our long-delayed annual retreat. We use our retreat to review the work of the Board and how best to work together to support the mission of UUCM. We develop our goals for the year and familiarized ourselves with the nuts and bolts of the organization. Each year at our retreat we revise our Board Covenant. Reading our Board Covenant gives one a good idea of how we work together and so I am sharing it with you here:

UUCM BOARD COVENANT

We, the members of the Board, enter into this covenant of mutual expectations for Board service. Members of the Board are asked to be our best selves, and with compassion, hold each other accountable for these commitments. Each new Board may review and update this covenant.

As Board members, we will:

- Prepare for Board meetings.
 We read the Board materials prior to the Board Meeting and we will use our best efforts to make all materials available at least one week before each meeting, and accept responsibility to seek and provide information necessary for the Board to make well-informed decisions.
- Attend Board and Community Business Meetings. We attend all duly-called Board and Community Business Meetings and arrive ready to begin on time. We end our meetings on time. If it is necessary to miss a Board meeting or arrive late, then we inform the Board President as early as possible. If we do not expect to be able to attend meetings consistently, then we resign for the good of the Board. If a member of the Board misses two monthly Board Business meetings in a twelve-month period, we agree to enter into conversation prior to a third missed meeting (see UUCM bylaws regarding Removal of a Board Member).
- Participate in Board meetings. We listen fully to others with our eyes, ears, heart, and soul, giving special attention to ideas and perspectives different from our own and allowing time to process, knowing that

everyone does so at different rates. We feel free to state what seems obvious and ask questions when we do not understand. We notice, name, and attend to the feelings in the room. We speak forthrightly in Board meetings and vote our individual conscience in the best interests of our community and according to the Board's understanding of the community's mission.

 Share the work of the Board. We respond to e-mails and other communications within three days. We notify our Board colleagues when we know we are unable to respond. We accept assignments and other tasks and complete them as agreed. Each Board member is equally responsible for speaking up to ensure compliance with the bylaws, ethical values, and this covenant.



• Treat one another with respect, courtesy, and kindness. We recognize and honor others' strengths. When we have disagreements or conflicts, we address those directly with the persons concerned, seeking assistance from others as necessary to sustain a positive working atmosphere at the Board table. We do not share

Board interpersonal dynamics with others or engage in gossip regarding the Board and its members.

- Support a healthy work environment. We commit to meet in places and ways that are accessible to all. We hold our time together sacred, and our work holy. We recognize the value of laughter, joy, food, and fun.
- Serve as a united team. We use discretion when communicating about Board deliberations and communicate clearly and transparently about Board decisions. We speak respectfully of the Board's authority to make decisions, even when we do not agree, and support our fellow leaders and decisions made by the Board. We do not misrepresent or denigrate another Board member's opinion. When the Board agrees that certain matters are to be kept confidential, we honor those agreements even after leaving the Board.

A Profile of Jesse Wightman

"He is a good kid..."

These words from Jennifer, Jesse's mother, are based on what a great kid Jesse is and not "motherly bias." Many remember the little boy running up and down the aisle

in the UUCM Sanctuary, racing with Norah Wiley close on his heels, indifferent to the solemnity of the service.

Back then Jesse was a lapkid, a small boy sitting on his mother's knees, half his face obscured by a mop of curly black hair. I remember thinking about that head of hair, how it would grow exponentially over time, and Jennifer would be stuck trying to decide to insist on cutting it or leaving it to Jesse to make that decision. Turns out Jesse did make that decision and his hair has continued to grow unimpeded.

Jesse grew the same way. There were a few instances when I saw him standing by his mother's side wearing a

baseball uniform and twitching the way small boys do, probably imagining himself anywhere but in the foyer of the UUCM building. Once Jennifer whispered in my ear saying, "We're learning how to hold still."

Jesse is a self-described "voracious reader," an aficionado of baseball, cross country running, and a lover of "game nights" at Jo Water's. He scored 100% in advanced math class, likes drawing, dislikes speaking before an audience, and hopes one day to be an expert at water polo. In our interview for this profile Jesse declared he

remembers nothing, including "what I wore yesterday." As the questions and answers went on, it turned out Jesse remembers a great many things (I didn't ask what he wore the day before).

He remembers being four years old and begging to be in

his mother's class at school. Now he is in his mother's class and describes being "embarrassed" by the things his mother says about him out loud. Jennifer denies any wrong-doing. Jesse loves working with the AV at UUCM services and once did this entirely on his own. He keeps up to date on national and international news and has strong opinions on all pertinent issues. He loves the ocean.

Of course, there are typical twelve-year-old boy behaviors. It would be strange if this were not so. During our meeting at an ice cream parlor Jesse frequently rolled his eyes at his mother, disdaining her comments. He devoured a gigantic ice cream cone

decorated with gobs of chocolate and colored-sugar sprinkles. He found it hard to keep his eyes off a wall of jellybeans of every flavor possible in the universe.

In the final analysis this interviewer found it easy to agree with Jesse's mother – that he is good kid.


BOOKLIST FOR 2023

January 8, 2023 - West With Giraffes, by Lynda Rutledge, 2021, 300 pages

This delightful novel is a road trip like no other set during Depression-era America. It is based on a true story of two giraffes who are transported across America to the San Diego Zoo. Presenter: Ruth Edwards

February 12 - How To Change Your Mind, by Michael Pollan, 2019, 464 pages.

In this book, Michael Pollan writes about his own consciousness expanding experiments with LSD and psilocybin. He makes a case for why shaking up the brain's old habits could be therapeutic for people facing addiction, depression, and death. Presenter: Jo Waters



UUCM Sunday Book Group

March 12, 2023 - A Map of Salt and Stars,

by Zein Joukhadar, 2018, 368 pages.

The ancient, sometimes mystical connection between maps, people, and knowledge is central to this first novel by Zoukhadar. It is a double tale of voyage and exile that moves between contemporary war-torn Syria and the caravansaries and khans of the past. Maps are mentioned on almost every page: not just making them but the decisions that making them involves, what lands they cover, and what lands they leave out. Presenter: Susan Merrill

May 14, 2023 - *The Invisible Child*, by Andrea Elliott, 2021, 520 pages

New York Times journalist Andrea Elliott immerses herself in the life of a New York family suffering from poverty, homelessness, drug addiction, and despair. The invisible child is Dasani, a talented girl who wins a scholarship to an elite school in Pennsylvania, which presents a fundamental conflict between her ambitions and her loyalty to her family. This book won a Pulitzer. Presenter: Keith Johnson

June, 11, 2023 - *The Swimmers*, by Julie Osuka, 2022, 192 pages

An intensely touching novel-part memoir highlights the relationship between the author and her mother. The author sensitively weaves the progression of her mother's dementia into the storyline as well as an insightful and humorous story about the community pool members. The repetitive language structure enhances this endearing book.

July 9, 2023 – *The Song of the Cell*, by Sidhartha Mukherjee, 2022, 496 pages

In this highly reviewed book, Mukherjee, a Pulitzer Prize winner, tells the story of how scientists discovered cells, began to understand them, and are now using them to create new humans. He seduces you with writing so vivid, lucid, and suspenseful that complex science becomes thrilling. Presenter: Joel Houtman

The Grimkes, The Legacy of Slavery in an American Family, by Kerri Greenidge, 2022, 404 pages

Sarah and Angelina Grimke were born and raised on a South Carolina plantation. Renouncing their family and heritage, they moved north and became prominent abolitionists in antebellum America. Author Kerri Greenidge presents a parallel narrative of the family, shifting focus from the sisters to the black members of the Grimke family which deepens our understanding of the family and the struggle for racial equality. Presenter: Keith Johnson

September 10, 2023 - *Demon Copperhead*, by Barbara Kingsolver, 2022, 560 pages.

Set in the mountains of Appalachia, Demon Copperhead is the story of a boy born to a teenaged single mother in a single-wide trailer, with no assets beyond his dead father's good looks and copper colored hair, a caustic wit, and a fierce talent for survival. This novel borrows its narrative structure from Charles Dickens' novel about David Copperfield. It was named one of the "Ten Best Books of 2022" by Washington Post and the New York Times. Presenter: Mary Pickett

October 8, 2023 - The Lincoln Highway, by Amor Towles, 2021, 592 pages

Towles' Great American Road Novel tails three 18 year-olds, who met in juvenile reformatory, and a brainy 8 year-old as they set out from Nebraska in June of 1954, in an old Studebaker in pursuit of a better future. Hitch into this delightful tour de force and you'll be pulled straight through to the end, helpless against the inventive exuberance of Towles' storytelling. Presenter: Susan Merrill

Soul Matters: Finding our Center

When we talk of finding our center, it's natural for calm and rest to be the first things that come to mind. Who would expect anything different? After all, the need for calm is everywhere we look. So, so many of us are tired. We're overworked, over-busy, over-committed, overly scared. We are often so weighed down by responsibility and worry that it only takes one drop of something unexpected to tip us over. So, yes, we long for rest. Yes, we want the swirl to stop.

And yet, helping us find peace and calm is not the only work found on this path of finding our center.

As our faith reminds us, being a "centered person" often involves the opposite of keeping things calm. In order to move toward a balance of justice, we have to upset the current state of things. Oppressive systems need to be challenged and toppled. And to accomplish that, we need to sacrifice calm and comfort, including our own. We need to remember that achieving a balance of equality requires us to be purposefully off-balance and out-of-step with our culture, or as Martin Luther King Jr. said, we need people who are "maladjusted to the way things are."

Add all this up and suddenly "our center" appears to be a much richer place than is often recognized.

It's not simply a place of peace and calm; it's also a place of being pushed and launched. What you hear in this deep space within is not just the whisper of "Rest" and "Breathe," but also "Take a deep breath and jump!" We encounter an invitation there, not just relaxation. It's a still point, yes. But a still point upon which we pivot and turn to something new.

So as we try to make sense of "finding our center" this month, it's fine to pull up the image of the Buddha sitting peacefully under a tree, but we can't let that overshadow the image of a diver balancing way up there on her diving board, pausing to regain her composure and courage so she can leap and go "all in."

Maybe in the end, instead of only asking each other, "Are you centered these days?" we need to ask, "Where is your center sending you these days?" and "Where is your center calling you to go?"
