This will be my final month as your Board president and I want to share that, from my perspective, we are reeling a bit. We are a bit undone and have yet to find the words or understanding to fully realize how our needs have changed since Covid. How much has our Covid experience sapped our energy, changed the way we respond to things, reinforced our introversions, added to, or taken away from, our trust in just about everything?

We can take solace in the fact that we have held together,

and we have found support in each other, but I do not believe that we have fully understood the ways in which we have been changed by this collective world-wide experience. This subtle undercurrent of disquiet affects us all and it may be that true understanding and healing will be a much longer process than first imagined.

I am saying this because it affects our community: the way we work, how we support our connections, and the energy we have to carry out tasks and to live our mission. Let's be sure and

leave space for this healing and discovery of what we need in this liminal time between COVID's peak and whatever emerges in our post-COVID world.

Now on to my year-end report: The Board works within the framework of goals, policies, and procedures. We structure our agenda each month to pay attention to our goals and to assess our progress. We also spend time problem-solving current issues and keeping abreast of the plans and activities of our various committees and teams. And, in spite of our well-laid-out governance model, we still have surprises and challenges to take care of as they come up.

One of the major goals for this year was to accomplish a successful renewal year. At the recommendation of the Sabbatical Planning Committee, the Board took a giant

leap into the unknown and agreed to hire a virtual minister. Hindsight proves that we were wise indeed. We have virtually enjoyed the presence of Rev. Janet Onnie throughout Kevin's sabbatical. She has served us well and far beyond her "parttime" status. We have all benefitted from her insightful sermons and her wise counsel. She has been instrumental in achieving the goal of a successful renewal year, and I am most grateful for her presence. And though we call her "virtual," she has been a very real presence in our lives this year. Thank you Rev. Onnie for all you have done for us.

I think the community as a whole has done a pretty good job of achieving a successful renewal year. Our entire community of volunteers has continued to do the work of the church, continued to hold meetings, work toward goals, create Justice

opportunities, and support each other in need. We have done this without undue panic (though I had my moments) and proven that we are a capable and strong community. Kevin's absence has reinforced our self-image as capable UU'ers with faith in the betterment of our world.

But this has not been an entirely easy year for us. We are all still dealing with whatever the post-COVID world is going to look like, we all struggled through the massive snow storms this winter, and we came to the aid of member Jenny Dewey when she lost her home to

when she lost her home to the storms. We all managed to say farewell to staff who will be missed and to welcome new staff who are ready to support us as our community grows. And we found, and then released, what appeared to be a close-to-perfect church home on Squirrel Creek Road.

This year we have also struggled with giving - both in finding adequate volunteers to do the work of the church and with our ability to pledge enough to keep the church on an even keel. I believe these struggles are, in part, a result of our post-COVID exhaustion, in part the economy, and in part that we are missing Kevin's leadership. This coming year we must find a way to help our members discern what they need, what is most important to the UUCM community as a whole, and how much we are willing to support our findings with our time,

### Stewardship

Our 2023-2024 Pledge Campaign ended with a triumph! I can almost hear a celestial orchestra playing, "We are the Champions."

We began this year's campaign concerned about both a loss of pledging members and an increase of expenses. UUCM was not an anomaly. Small businesses, churches, and civic organizations were feeling the effects of three years of financial uncertainty.

At the point in time when the Finance Team and Stewardship



were most concerned that UUCM would operate with a deficit budget, something brilliant happened. A wise anonymous member presented us with a challenge: this member would match any increase in a member's 2023-2024 original pledge, up to \$10,000. We could have, possibly, \$20,000 more in our operating budget! Our most generous members quickly responded, and we reached \$7,600. It was uncertain that we would reach \$10,000. Then the true heart and spirit of UUCM pulled through! A member posted that they could give up their favorite cup of coffee each month and add the \$10 to their original pledge. Many others (who I know watch their budgets carefully) followed this generous model and in no time we met the \$10,000 goal. In fact, we reached \$11,370. We added \$21,020 to our pledge totals and nearly closed our budget deficit!

"Money can't buy you happiness" is a wise old saying but, in certain circumstances it doesn't apply. In this instance, money, truly generously given, without expectation of personal gain, brings spiritual grace and inner joy.

This is the last article I'll be writing as Stewardship Chairperson. And I'm writing this with a sense of admiration and love for our UUCM membership. We rose to the matching pledge challenge. We rose to the "Stop the Mine" challenge. We rose to the restoration of the Nisenan Land challenge, and we are continuously working to challenge the carbon threat to our environment.

I am personally thankful to have had this opportunity to serve my beloved community. Generosity, like service and giving your time, is an act of spirituality. The rewards grow as your commitment grows. I feel a strong bond to UUCM. I developed friendships with team members that I value. I got to work closely with Anita, who will always be my role model. She's living a strong, committed, generous, active, and very long life. Lesley Champlin, Lin Jovanovich, and Susan Merrill each had skills that blended to create a thoughtful, diligent team that got us through the difficult tasks of Stewardship during our Covid years.

### Bright Blue Eyes

### A Profile of Siobhan Boylan by Jenny Dewey

When first meeting Siobhan Boylan, one is struck by her bright blue eyes. And then, immediately, her big smile and welcoming expression.

My first encounter with Siobhan occurred some years ago when she was circling from room to room in the UUCM building, urging people in the congregation to sign up for something. I can't remember what she was "selling," but I remember the fresh openness of her approach. I was struck by her lack of shyness, her ability to go from one person to another with an almost childlike eagerness. She was dressed, if I remember right, like an elf.

For some, her name has been a stumbling block. Siobhan is a Gaelic name. Siobhan's older sister was christened with all the requisite family names, so none were left over when Siobhan made her

appearance. She has always liked her name.

Siobhan's history reflects strong intellectual energy, the story of someone determined to think and act in forceful, meaningful ways. Her experiences and passions include map-making. She made maps with fabric and homemade paper. At one point she thought about opening a paper-making studio.

Siobhan trained to be a teacher. In her words: "I love teaching best of all." Her teaching career ended when the Covid pandemic made its appearance. Returning

to the classroom meant dealing with children who had been isolated for too long, separated from friends, unable to develop social skills. The youngest children had no concept of being away from home. They required

the reassurance of an adult at their side every minute. In a class of twenty-plus little kids, this is an impossible expectation.

Siobhan claims she was not a good teacher, this despite her well-defined list of what she views as essential teaching tools: learning through play, writing personal narratives, learning about language through writing, and more.

At first glance it is surprising to see Siobhan sitting at the Audio-Visual table during Sunday services. A dedication to getting it right – as in perfect – is evident, exactly as it was when she was a teacher or an elf.

Summing up Siobhan's abilities, pinning down the composition of this person, is difficult. Her range of interests and experiences is broad and defies categorizing. Some of us are adept with technical matters, others with artistic and creative endeavors. Siobhan covers both bases. She is someone easily described as multi-talented. Skills in communicating are clearly evident in the openness of her smile, and of course those bright blue eyes.

### Stop the Mine Task Force Update

THE "STOP THE MINE TASK FORCE" MAKES A MAJOR CONTRIBUTION

Our Justice Team was a major force! When the five Nevada County Planning Commissioners voted unanimously to recommend rejecting the Rise Gold Corp.("the Mine") proposal, many of us in the packed (several hundred attended) Nevada County Board Chambers cried tears of joy. The Commissioners cited our overwhelming community opposition as one of the important reasons they voted no.

The UUCM Stop-the-Mine Task Force was second only to the MineWatch organization in actively opposing the project. We initially enlisted UUCM members to write 359 letters of opposition to the county, citing heinous damage to our people and environment by reopening a huge gold mine. We set up and ran information tables at key locations around the area and attracted hundreds of citizens who signed the MineWatch Stop-the-Mine petition (over 5,500 signatures were submitted to the county.)

We developed reports, fact sheets, handouts, posters, and presentations to show the negative environmental impacts. One of our task force members even wrote to the Rise Gold Corp. Board of Directors in Canada asking them to consider the destructiveness of their huge industrial factory in the midst of family residences. We provided detailed analysis to the county on the economic reports that falsely claimed the Mine's financial benefits to our community. Our letters to the editor of The Union were posted on the MineWatch websites.

We became a resource for the Board of Supervisors and had meetings with three of them. In addition, when the Planning Commissioners made their declarations at the hearing, they used our material and identified our UUCM task force leader as one of two key contacts. Overall, there wasn't a single public meeting about the Mine where we were not present.

One of our contributions was making public the Mine's attempt to erase an earthquake fault line running though their industrial facility. After the revelation of that attempt at the hearing, an earthquake shook the Chambers and set off alarms! What could be more improbable . . . and more timely?

Our work is not done. We need to help the Supervisors make the final decision in August.

Let's continue to counter greed with truth. Onward together!

### **Expressing Delight Completely**


