SUMMER WORSHIP THEME: Love in Action

Dr. Cornel West has so eloquently stated, "justice is what love looks like in public." The worship theme for this summer's Sunday services is Love in Action, directly inspired by the revisions of Article II of the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) currently being considered. The theme of Love in Action provides us with a lens to explore what these revisions might feel like.

Many of us have asked "why the change?" As one member of UUA's Article II Study Commission put it, "we need more verbs." The existing Article II's Seven Principles are an individualistic set of ethics and theology. The new language integrates the Seven Principles into a set of values organized around an aspirational goal of doing. Centered in a shared value of love, this goal reaffirms our commitment to personal, institutional, and cultural change and roots that change in practices of anti-oppression, anti-racism, and multiculturalism.

This summer, we immerse ourselves in love-centered values and the possibility of living them into being.

Some members feel that UUCM is too focused on justice and not attentive enough to members' spiritual needs nor to interpersonal connection. Others, with equal conviction, feel that UUCM is too focused on spiritual needs and interpersonal connection and is not interested enough in justice.

Both sets of real and valid needs suggest that what's missing among us is a deeply felt sense and meaningfully held awareness that spirituality, interconnection, and justice are fully intertwined. "Politics and religion don't mix," so the warning goes, though in fact they are very much bound up with one another.

For me, this is what grounds and enables and sustains all the rest.

I'm curious about which direction calls most immediately to you? It's a variation on the question, "What are you seeking in being part of UUCM?" To be called inward, yourself? To be called outward, yourself? To be called inward, together? To be called outward, together?

Inward and Outward. And so, onward!

Unity Church-Unitarian in St. Paul Minnesota years ago dug in to explore what they were about, at heart, as a church. As I remember it, they discerned then that religious community ideally calls us both inward and outward – inward to internal soul searching, integrity, and acceptance (inner spiritual work that cultivates our wholeness), and outward to connection, empathy, compassion, and care (outreach, justice, equity, and making a difference in the world).

We need to be called in both directions, they concluded, in varying ratios at any given moment or part of the journey, to be sure, but definitely both. In fact, the inner work enables skillful, sustained, and courageous outer work; the outward-facing work strengthens and grows our inner wholeness and integrity.

And they further realized that our UU tradition and the ways that we live it ideally call us inward and outward not only as individuals, but also as an entire community.

At our best, they found, we move and help each other to move and grow in all four directions over time. More than ever before in my 35 years of UU life, I am right now feeling a pull toward all four directions at once:

I'm feeling the powerful need for UUCM to help people reach inward toward true personal spiritual depth and courage, to cultivate sustained and sustaining spiritual practices that help us to be present, to know and understand and accept who we are, and so to be liberated into living our most authentic and expansive selves.

I'm feeling the powerful need for UUCM to call people's authentic and courageous selves outward, toward engagement, connection, mutual support, and the well-

A Few Tips for Setting Up Your Annual Pledges

Just a few quick things to note as we move into our new Fiscal Year.

For those who donate through the website, I learned recently that several people had duplicate contributions in July. How did this happen? Well, turns out that as originally structured, our website did not have a way to enter an ending date for repeating contributions, so when a new one was entered, there were two contributions in the same month! We caught this very early in the process, and I have now arranged with our system provider to add a place for you to enter an ending date for your repeating contribution. Meanwhile, for all Fiscal Year 2023-24 pledges we have manually entered an ending date at the end of the fiscal year.

Second, Siobhan did some research, and on our website you can now see exactly the fees that are charged for any of these transactions done through the website or PayPal. They are listed in order, from least costly to most. It might give you more of an idea of the least costly way of contributing to the church. (Since PayPal is the most expensive, I'd like to phase it out and will be contacting those donors who use this method.)

Third, for those of you who like to use the text donation method, I've learned that if you need to update your credit card information, send a text to the text number that says "Edit" and you'll be able to update your credit card. The site already tells you how to repeat the transaction and how to cancel a transaction.

And finally, you have all received updates of the status of your FY 2022-23 pledge payments and a separate note confirming the amount of your pledge for this new fiscal year. We plan to keep the information flowing during this fiscal year like the last. If you have any questions or concerns you can always contact Siobhan at <u>admin@uugrassvalley.org</u>, and me at <u>Treasurer@uugrassvalley.org</u>.

Meanwhile, a grateful thank you from the Finance team for keeping your contributions flowing so we can continue our work both within the walls of the church and in the broader community.

Ruth Edwards – Sensitivity and Spirituality A Profile by Jenny Dewey

Ruth Edwards describes sensitivity as a trait that is "... in our DNA." If you look up the definition of the word, sensitivity, you make surprising discoveries. Ruth

is correct: there is a genetic component to exceptionally sensitive individuals.

Highly sensitive people, and Ruth is one, seek out safe places where intense emotions and selfawareness are advantages. not strikes against them. Another quote from Ruth: "Sensitive people matter." As with the phrase, Black Lives Matter, these words imply difficulties when it comes to fitting in.

Ruth was very young when she began her journey to fit in, one where being shy and acutely aware was honored, not rejected. She fled from a church service at age five. The church was "mainstream" and, for a perceptive five-year-old, a spiritual desert.

As she grew into an adult the effort to learn to be less shy was never-ending. Social awareness was not an

advantage. A complex inner life did not make life easy.

After college she tried fitting into academia and found it stifling; a world where men made all the rules. She learned foreign languages, specializing in German and Russian. She worked for various companies, one where experiments were conducted to determine how to create the best fertilizer. She had good offers for excellent jobs and either turned them down or guit after a short time.

Postcarding Begins Again!

Postcards for Virginia's General Election are available at UUCM now. As before, we are working with the Center for Common Ground's Reclaim Our Vote Campaign to get out the Black voters in voter suppression states.

For this campaign they are targeting selected House and Senate contests where there is a clear choice for a candidate with a strong track record of supporting voting rights. Their campaigns are well organized and highly effective, making a significant impact on the election outcomes. The post cards are scripted as before. All you do is print the words on the cards and send them beginning September 8. (Early voting in Virginia begins September 22.)

WHY A STATE ELECTION?

What happens in state legislatures affects us! By now most of us realize that those elected to state legislatures have an immense importance in defending or defeating democracy in the country. After years of clandestine strategy, extreme right candidates have gained the majority in many states. We are watching them pass laws to suppress the minority vote, eliminate reproductive rights, outlaw the teaching of factual US history, ban books in schools and publicly funded libraries, gerrymander voting districts, and more.

WHY VIRGINIA?

Virginia is unique in holding its statewide elections in off years. All legislative seats are on the ballot. In November, Virginians will be electing state house and senate positions. Many local offices are also on the ballot. Virginia is the last southern state without an abortion ban. Their governor has said he would "happily and gleefully" sign an abortion ban if it reaches his desk.


THREE WAYS TO PARTICIPATE - (SOME PEOPLE DO ALL THREE!)

1. Sign up to join our Post Card Club.

Club members agree to write and send a minimum of 1 packet of 20 post cards in August, September, and October. (This helps us plan for ordering needed supplies.)

Packets include stamps, postcards, addresses, a script, and instructions. Each packet costs us \$10 - a bit more since the cost of postcard stamps keeps going up: \$.51 now! Members who are able to do so donate \$10 cost per packet. Members who want to support the effort but not write postcards can be "funding members" and cover costs for fellow club members for whom cost is an issue. Bending the Arc Book Study Group Begins September 24

A new book study group will start up in late September, with the first book for discussion *Mistakes and Miracles: Congregations on the Road to Multiculturalism*. This book, the UU Common Read for 2022-2023, sparks transformative conversation about making Beloved Community real while dismantling white supremacy in our Unitarian Universalist faith communities. Co-authors Nancy Palmer Jones and Karin Lin – a white minister and a lay person of color – explore five UU congregations' journeys toward Beloved Community and share the mix of joy, disappointment, and growth these congregations found.

According to UUA, "engaging with this book can help UU congregations grapple with our movement's charge to dismantle white supremacy in ourselves, our communities, and our world. Doing this Common Read together is one way for a UU faith community to engage in this important work."

The study group will meet for four 90-minute sessions starting on Sunday, September 24 at noon in the Channing Room. The dates for the remaining sessions will be decided by the group. Kids Connection – Summer Mode

I bet if we were to gather a group of us together for a discussion about some of our fondest memories from childhood, many of those memories would be related to how we spent our summers. My childhood summer memories mostly involve palling around with neighborhood friends: participating in seemingly endless sessions of hide-n-seek or tag-you're-it, usually at dusk; competing against a very best friend all afternoon in impossibly long games of Chutes and Ladders or Monopoly; swimming all afternoon at the local high school pool and coming home thoroughly sunburned and ready to do it again the next day; walking half a mile (which seemed more like three miles) to the local branch of the town's library to return a pile of books and get a new pile to replace it; and riding bikes from one school yard recreation program to another, looking for opportunities to engage with the recreation leaders (fabulously charismatic high school students whom we adored).

Your specific activities were certainly not identical to mine, but they likely had some of the same feelings of open-endedness, possibility, and connection that mine had. Shift to the task of putting together a summer program for pre- and elementary school UU children. How great it would be to capture some of that magic—the open-endedness, possibility, and connection—that we recall from our long-ago summers, in my case well over 60 years ago. That goal may be too ambitious for a once-a-week program in a moderately sized UU community in the years following a pandemic that shifted everyone's ways of engaging with their world. But we on the Family Ministry Team are still holding the significance of memorable summer experiences in mind as we build the lessons each week for the children who show up to spend an hour engaging with us. The scale of our operation may be small, but our intentions are robust and heartfelt.

Through the month of August, we are continuing to use the UU Summer Curriculum entitled Can Do Summer. So far, this summer we have constructed and launched paper airplanes, built a fairy house, and explored all things fishy. Before the official publication of this newsletter occurs, we will be building blanket forts and exploring our bodies as percussion instruments. In August we will be building junk sculptures, making our way through obstacle courses, designing toothpick architecture, and perhaps creating our own minigolf experience. Let me end by saying we are always looking for people who would enjoy spending a Sunday with us in Kids Connection from time to time. We have a core group of dedicated people who have been helping as second teachers for a long time now, and we so very much appreciate them. If we could double that core group of people from about 4 to 5 to about 8 to 10, then no one person would be called upon to serve as a second teacher more than once every two months. The role of the second teacher is to be a presence in the room and help as needed. Mostly, it is a chance to enjoy the children. We hope that a few more of you will find your way to this opportunity to serve our UUCM community. It is a relatively low pressure/high reward way to serve UUCM, and if you would like to explore this opportunity to serve, contact us at familyministry@ uugrassvalley.org. We would be glad to share with you some of the joy that we experience by spending time with the youngest members in this UU community.
