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From the Minister

With the arrival of February, our monthly Soul Matters theme guides our focus toward another kind of liberation, "the gift of Justice and Equity."

Annnnnd about now I can feel some people leaning in for more, and other people giving this another three sentences, max, before tuning out. I'm still trying to figure out how to help people bridge the supposed spirituality/justice or personal/political divide. Know that underneath it all, the theme this month is meant to support your own liberation, your empowerment, your understanding, and your deepened compassion and clarity (to draw on a book description in our Soul Matters packet of resources).

Justice is love writ very large. *Politics* is community and relationship writ very large.

And spirituality, including our strongest sense of what's true about reality and our strongest sense of what matters, is woven through every bit of both.

We've been told that religion and politics are not to be mixed, which has been mistaken to mean that the two have nothing to do with each other, or ought not to, anyway. What's true about that for me is that a religion ought not be allowed to impose its beliefs on others. Draw on the power of persuasion, yes, with integrity, honesty, and respect. But impose? No. To the extent that religion genuinely speaks to and cultivates spirituality (meaning our deepest sense of what is and what matters), the values inspired by such spirituality (or "perspective," if you prefer) cannot help but influence our expectations, desires, and hopes for the wider realms of humanity, earth, and all life, and so, the politics that seek to embody those values.

Believing the story that "religion" and politics don't mix serves to hide that relationship. It cuts off our compassionate, outward-facing impulse to relieve the suffering and enhance the thriving of others (our pursuit of justice and equity) from the spiritual grounding that most fully empowers and sustains it. It allows our spiritual understandings to stay comfortably sheltered and small, only partially developed and realized. Believing the story that "religion" and politics don't mix inhibits us from using more of our individual and collective power for collective good. Most conservative religions, with an ordering of values very different from our tradition's values, do not allow their political influence to be so restricted. Clearly.

And, I know, this gets really messy, especially now, when it comes to family and friends and neighbors. But I think that separating politics from our spirituality is part of the problem here. Trying to engage those we love – or at least those we live around – at the level of politics by itself, is missing the deeper elements of our values and what anchors them. We end up arguing about the particular political expressions of our values rather than utilizing our precious energy to speak the deep values that inspire them, rather than listening for the deep values that inspire others. Until we get there, we are rather hopelessly stuck.

I don't know if this is helping or making the spirituality/justice divide even stronger in your heart and mind. That the two are inextricably linked is clear to me. And important. This month, let's tease this out some more together, for the sake of our relationships, our community, our world, and everyone's children and grandchildren.

Board of Trustees

I submit to you the mid-year President's report on the governance work of your Board of Trustees.

In July, we gathered at the Board retreat to celebrate renewal, reconnect, and embrace the future with a citizen/owner model. Rev. Kevin, having just returned from his sabbatical, shared skillful Enneagram knowledge for a fun exploration of our individual leadership styles. We confirmed that the eight of us have a hardworking balance of pragmatism and idealism. We also took on the book Trusting Change – Finding Our Way Through Personal and Global Transformation by Karen Hering as a Board read. We understand the importance, in this transformative time, of remaining open to change. The Board is sharing and building the skills necessary to live on our thresholds, both individually and as leaders of this community.

In these years following a pandemic of grief, UUCM has shown remarkable commitment and resilience. We are reconnecting to one another and deepening our purpose. To meet the community where it is, the Board changed its approach to their goal setting process. Previously, governance and ministry goals were arrived at separately. This year, the Board goals were developed jointly with Rev. Kevin's ministry goals, but with separate governance and ministry tasks. In this way, the Board is collaborating to meet the future while being grounded in our mission and covenant. We hope that by focusing on our shared goals, UUCM will be strengthened beyond measure. realistically fit our small-ish congregation. We will continue to actively listen to member feedback as we seek to "rightsize" the governance model where possible. A committee of wonderful folks planned and carried out the Board's Open Questions workshops to invite sharing on who we want to be for each other at UUCM, and who UUCM wants to be in the wider community. The Board will listen to the results you've shared, and these results will directly inform next year's goals. Another way that the Board is involved in collaboration is by expanding the Ministry Council to include Board committee leaders. This leadership sharing circle is increasing communication with one another, and interconnection and collaboration about the shared goals.

The second goal of the Ministry and Board: create a new process for a successful Stewarding year. In the past, Stewarding depended too much on the small Stewardship team tasked with the monumental responsibility of meeting UUCM's financial budget. This work was unsustainable, and the very dedicated members were suffering, so they suggested that the Board reorganize Stewarding. With representatives of the Board, Finance, Membership and other visionaries, the Stewarding Guidance Group was formed. Rooted in a citizen model of being stronger together, they are creating a process for Stewarding with shared tasks among many folks. We hope that all will attend the Congregational Dinner—after a fouryear hiatus—on Saturday, February 24.

The first goal: cultivate the "ownership/citizen model" with UUCM members and renew and strengthen member connections through explicit invitations and opportunities. This concept reaches into practically every aspect of community life as we experiment with new ways for mutual collaboration among members, teams, and committees. The Board has been inviting more member involvement to simplify governance policies and procedures so that they more

The third goal: reach out to the wider community by emphasizing communications and social media channels. One example is the Board's support of the Justice ministry team's project to assist the Andou-St. Fort family in their effort to reestablish their lives away from Haiti. UUCM members were encouraged to create a network of generosity, which they did with time and financial resources. The Board also set up a nationwide crowdsource campaign using the Faithify crowdfunding app. We will continue to support ways

for UUCM to reach out to the wider community to be known, inviting, and welcoming, as well as to serve.

I want to express deep gratitude to all UUCM members and friends on whose behalf we work. With special thanks to all who were able to attend the January 21st Mid-Year Community Business Meeting. By the skin of our teeth, we reached a quorum of 40% of members, which enabled a vote on simple by-laws changes, two acts that helped streamline governance. We also voted to renew the ongoing work of the Nisenan Task Force as well as the Bending the Arc Toward Racial Justice Task Force. We also cheered the work of the Stop the Mine Task Force and thanked all those, especially Jim Bair and Martha Turner, who dedicated themselves to this critical justice work.

Your Board has been hard at work embracing collaboration and change to meet the future while grounded in our mission and covenant. As stated above, we hope that by focusing on shared goals, together UUCM will be strengthened beyond measure.

Selections From CHIRP's Visibility Through Art Collection

From January 18 to March 15, the UUCM Library and Art Gallery will show an exhibit of works from the Visibility Through Art project, produced by the Nevada City Rancheria Nisenan Tribe.

CHIRP's Visibility Through Art Initiative (VTA) is inspired by the Nevada City Rancheria Nisenan Tribe's desire to engage local artists to create artwork that authentically represents the Nisenan and their rich but nearly forgotten history here in Nevada County.

VTA is a community art initiative produced annually as part of CHIRP's Arts and Culture Program. This intentional and informed collaboration includes hours of consultation with the Tribe, and each year a theme is produced to best address their visibility needs. Beginning in 2017, VTA has exhibited over 150 original artworks created through the project. This VTA exhibit includes artworks by artists Alyssa Walz, Andy Cerrona, Ashely Foreman, Brianna French, Chula Linda Gemignani, Ginger Covert, Ember Amador, Lorena Davis, Lori Lachman, Mira Clark, and Sarah Thomas.

VTA is intended to generate cultural awareness and specifically build an understanding of the Nisenan through art. The VTA project requires continuous navigation of the sensitive topics of cultural appropriation, privilege, and erasure. Nancy Finlay and the "Golden Mean" A Profile by Jenny Dewey

Nancy Finlay says she is an optimist and explains that her optimism is (in her words) "an ability to relish the moment." Nancy has dealt with serious illness for decades. She has experienced grief and sorrow, and she is aware the future is unknowable and unpredictable. Nancy was thirteen when one of her sisters died, leaving a three-year-old boy behind. Though still a child herself, Nancy embraced her role caring for the boy. Around this time, she started baby-sitting. What most kids her age considered a necessary evil was something she loved.

At age thirty-seven Nancy was diagnosed with Lupus, an auto-immune disease with no known cure. Lupus is a disease where the body attacks vital internal organs, such as the kidneys, the heart, and the lungs. Someone with Lupus lives with chronic illness. Nancy has had many surgeries, and she has faced death. Based on illness and physical suffering, no one would be surprised to hear Nancy call herself a pessimist. No one would blame her. She is a realist and accepts the reality of her situation, yet this does not make her a pessimist.

Philosophers through the ages have suggested that optimism and pessimism are essential for survival and that the ideal is to find a balance between the two. This balance, or

She became a pediatric nurse because in her words: "Working with children is more important than anything." She goes on to say neither she nor her co-workers ever lost hope treating sick children.

Nancy walks every day. She has loved walking all her life. She and her husband, Allan, walk to the pond on their property where five geese live (Nancy calls them "Our geese"). There are ravens, too, and Nancy counts them, and wonders why one or another goes missing from one day to the next.

Nancy is not an enigma, while at the same time she is. The word enigma means mysterious. She is not mysterious, but how has she survived living with chronic illness

stability, is called "the golden mean." The "golden mean" is the middle ground between two extremes.

People say an optimist is a person who does not accept reality while a pessimist is someone who does. This is simplistic. To say someone is an optimist versus a pessimist suggests the two traits are not intertwined. and maintained a capacity for joy? Perhaps there is no answer to this question. Maybe the "golden mean" is unobtainable, a philosophical construct having nothing to do with human experience.

Never mind optimism versus pessimism. Never mind "the golden mean." Get to know the person who appears enigmatic and make all sorts of wonderful discoveries. You will be glad you did.

Bending the Arc Task Force

DEMOCRACY ON THE BALLOT

Make no mistake, the stakes for the 2024 elections are frighteningly high! The unthinkable demise of democracy could actually happen if democracy defenders like you do not step up to get out the vote.



Your Bending the Arc taskforce members are busy preparing packets of 20 postcards, stamps, address lists and scripts for our 3rd Reclaim Our Vote postcards campaign. Our goal is 14,000 postcards (700 packets) to be sent to Black voters in voter suppression states. The first set of packets will be available March 3 at UUCM.

To make the coordination of this effort sustainable we are reconstituting our Get Out the Vote Postcard Club. This lets us order and assemble adequate numbers of cards, addresses, stamps, etc. needed to have packets ready to go when you need them.

Members commit to writing at least one packet of 20 postcards per month March – July.

You can choose from three types of memberships:

- Write/funder (covers the \$10 cost of the packet contents);
- Writer-only (writes postcards but need help covering the cost);
- Funder-only (unable to write postcards so contributes funds to help cover packet costs)

Nevada County Bright Futures for Youth will be our April "Pass the Plate" recipient. On January 16, BFFY Director Jennifer Litton Singer hosted four UUCM members at their beautiful facility, which is housed in the massive Litton Building, located just above Briarpatch Coop.

The mission of BFFY is "to ignite the potential of youth today for a vibrant community tomorrow." Working with less advantaged Nevada County youth is an ambitious goal, but we were thoroughly impressed with the programs and personnel they have assembled, as well as the incredible physical facility. We learned of their recently inaugurated NEO program, as well as the Friendship Club and the SAFE program. The range of assistance is broad, from providing after-school meals, activities, and mentoring, to extensive efforts to help at risk and homeless youth.

The physical space is enormous, well planned, and graciously furnished. Some of the many activity rooms/centers include Crafts, Art, Music, and Games. They boast a large and immaculate "restaurant-worthy" kitchen and offer quality nutritious meals after school. And they serve a large number of Nevada County youth. Before our tour of BFFY, we had not heard much about this impressive NGO, which is offering a vital community service to Nevada County. If you have ten minutes, do yourself a big favor and look at their website and Facebook page, full of photos telling you more than I am able to in a few paragraphs. And then try to get on a list for a future tour!

Changes in Kids Connection – Come See For Yourselves

Over the last few months, as we have been redesigning our Kids Connection spaces and rituals, we have been moved to consider how our Kids Connection program might affect our UUCM children in the long run. What will our children remember about their time in Kids Connection at UUCM? How might their memories of Kids Connection influence the people they grow up to be?

To cast these questions in terms of our community-wide theme for February: will experiences in Kids Connection help our children to understand how they can be carriers of justice and equity out into their worlds?

These programmatic questions cause me to reflect on how children learn about what is just, what is fair, what is equal, what is right. Certainly, there are many distinctive learning experiences that lead children toward an understanding of issues related to justice and equity. One that seems especially resonant with what we are attempting to make happen in Kids Connection is captured in the following quote by H. Jackson Brown: "Live so that when your children think of fairness, caring, and integrity, they think of you." A very slight rewording of this quote might better reflect what we intend as outcomes in our Kids Connection setting— Live so that when our UUCM children think of fairness, caring, and integrity, they think of their time and experiences in Kids Connection.

Our hope is that value for, understanding of, and actions aligned with justice and equity will be learned through immersion in the just and equitable environment that is our Kids Connection program. We believe that our children will learn through the actual connections they make with other children and the adults who show up to co-create Kids Connection for that week. Ideally, our children's memories of Kids Connection will include how it felt to be in the spaces and with the people who constitute the Kids Connection program at UUCM. Justice, fairness, equity, and integrity should feel good, in the moment and as a future memory!

As I suggested in the opening sentence of this piece, we have made many changes in the physical and ritual aspects of our program over the last few months, always with an eye on helping our UUCM children internalize the principles and values that are the heart of Unitarian Universalism. Please feel free to come up to see what we have been up to. Included below are a couple photos of our warm and inviting new room arrangements.
