A founding father of USA progressive movement Guest Speaker: Sidney Morrison, with Tracy Pepper and Gail Johnson, Worship Associates

This is a service not to be missed. Our guest speaker is Sidney Morrison, whose new novel on Frederick Douglass has just been published to national acclaim. The book is described as a "mesmerizing historical novel richly detailing Douglass' life and the Civil War Era." Mr. Morrison will speak on Douglass' life and dedication to social justice, including his early and radical support of Chinese migrant workers who labored in the gold fields of our region.

This period of Douglass' life has consequences in our own time. America in the nineteenth century was a crucible of crisis over slavery, the Civil War, and the crusade for women's equal rights. We can learn so much from the life of this man who exemplified how we become our better selves when we become the ally of those who are not ourselves.

With the arrival of August, we are half-way through our summer services, many of them crafted by the Worship Associates, either individually or in pairs. It's very satisfying to start with an idea, flesh it out, discover or write the elements, find participants, see what music Rev. Kevin and Toby suggest, and watch it grow into an entire service. It often takes on a life of its own with the final product seeming bigger than the sum of its parts.

Our worship planning this year is enhanced by our use of a new UUA resource, "Worship for Transformation." This is an in-depth look at worship which consists of 12 video sessions, featuring 15 religious professionals, many of whom are people whose works we read as service elements (chalice lightings, opening words). It's fun to put a face with a name and to see them talking informally and interacting with one another.

Each session is jam-packed with thought-provoking ideas, plus exercises for participants to do. We are taking this large body of work in bite-sized pieces, watching one or two sessions at a time, doing the exercises individually and then sharing with each other. There are lots of insights, flashes of recognition, and spontaneous laughter and conversation. Using this rich resource helps us individually and collectively. The better we know ourselves and each other, the more cohesive we become, the safer it is to voice our thoughts and feelings and give and receive feedback. It helps us stay motivated, grow, and delight in what we do.

Our summer services perhaps reflect the interests and styles of each team member a bit more than during the rest of the year when we are guided by the Soul Matters themes. We hope you are finding them uplifting, stimulating, connective....perhaps even a bit transformational. Let us know!




UU101

A Fiscal Year End Update from the Treasury

I can't believe it, but we did it! Our budget for FY 23-24 started out with a deficit of almost \$10,000. However, we ended the fiscal year with a \$345 surplus! Thanks to all you faithful donors who paid your pledges and continued participating in our church activities. And a big thank you to the staff, teams, and community who stayed within budget, while managing to have a varied, rich, and lively church year.

We still have a few people who may have missed a payment for one reason or another, and we will reach out to them in the coming weeks. Any money brought in on last year's pledges now will be used to augment and replenish our Capital Expenditure Reserve, after money was spent fixing a leak in the roof, and a few other things.

Going forward, we will continue to send detailed quarterly statements, which should help us all to stay up to date.

I would also note, that in addition to managing our operating budget well, our very generous community supported the Haitian Family relief fund with over \$20,000, poured money into the postcard project, and increased our endowment nicely! Thanks to all for these efforts. It is my pleasure to be your Treasurer.

Guess Who He Is?

The person I am profiling will remain nameless until the end of this piece. If you cannot endure the mystery, you may look at the end where he is named. This will ruin everything, of course. But, it's up to you.

The man is busy volunteering and participating in

innumerable activities at UUCM. He is understated in his presentation. People might think he is shy, and they would not be far off the mark.

He assumes small but essential tasks. Giving him recognition for this brings on a smile and a shrug. He is never temperamental and makes friends easily. On occasion his genial manner might be misleading. People may assume he is nice, but without substance. This is far from the truth.

Once you get to know him beyond first impressions you discover surprising aspects of his character. When I first came to UUCM this person got in line for Joys and Sorrows and I noticed he was wearing running shoes and shorts. I was dismayed. I assumed people dressed up for

church, or at least did not wear shorts and running shoes. It was winter and cold. Why wasn't this person freezing?

The answer came when the man told me he's been a runner all his life. His running history reflects total commitment. He says running "saved him" because as a student in high school he was mediocre. His passion

for running gave him an alternative, a way to succeed. He has worked with disabled kids and more recently has been a running coach for a local high school. His knowledge of famous runners from the past is all-inclusive. He celebrates Roger Bannister, the first man to break the four-minute mile in May 1954. Dressing like a

runner is second nature to him.

He has a habit of self-effacement. Friends have told him it's a mistake to view himself this way. He uses the word goofy far too often. His mentor in writing sessions (who shall remain nameless) asked him to write an essay on the word in an effort to reduce the number of times he used it to describe himself.

He wrote the essay, and it was well written (he writes well), so now he uses the word less often.

He is a loyal and loving father to his daughters, and a grandfather deeply involved with his grandchildren. By now most of you know who this person is, and maybe you're right. Of course you may be shaking your

head, clueless and bewildered. As my 500-word limit approaches I will reveal his name: Gene Gilligan. The next time you see him greeting people before a service consider shaking his hand. Or maybe a fist-bump or a hand on the shoulder, or even just a smile. I know Gene will appreciate any gesture of friendship you offer.

Climate Champions on Parade!

Since the July 4th parade provides a captive audience, the Citizens' Climate Lobby has used it to promote their climate advocacy. In the past two years they have paraded the giant SHOE (showing carbon 'footprint' and built in a UUCM garage) and a float promoting healthy forests, permit process reform, electrification, and a price on carbon. This year, they changed it up to demonstrate that many organizations are concerned about the climate crisis, not just Citizens' Climate Lobby.

Under the banner of "Climate Champions" they recruited other organizations to march together. The group included Nevada County Climate Action Now (wasteNOT – Plastic), Energy Action Plan Working Group, and several churches (Nevada City United Methodist, Quakers, St. Patrick's, and of course, UUCM).

UUCM was well represented including Jim Bair, Cindy Burton, Taylor Carey, Chuck Champlin, Andy Dooley-Miller, Keith Johnson, Steve Temple, and Kathryn Young. Kudos to those who braved the 104°F heat! It was great marching with a varied group and we definitely got some appreciation from the crowd — though not quite as much as the ones that tossed candy, sprayed cold water, or had dancing merfolk!

The concept of "Climate Champions" brought many organizations together and was a success. We hope to use this unifying theme at other events. Watch uucmConnect for announcements of such opportunities to the UUCM community, so all who want to take part can do so.

POSTCARDS: MORE IMPORTANT THAN EVER

Thank you, thank you for writing postcards and/or funding stamps for writers who can't. We all are so concerned and grateful to have an answer to the question "but what can I do?"

And thanks to those of you who have enlisted your friends to write postcards and/or held a Postcard Writing Party. We're not the only ones eager "to do something!" Our team is ready and willing to make as many packets for people as are needed, whether they are part of the UUCM community or not. They can sign out packets Sundays before or after service, and Monday through Friday mornings. Non-club members can come to the Walsh Street door where Siobhan can help them. Feel free to direct them to GOTV@uugrassvalley.org if they have questions.

Now that we are working to get out the vote for the November election, the process is to Write, Hold, and Mail in October. We have a box at UUCM where you can put your finished postcards, or you can hold them at home. We are finishing up the Florida packets and then will start to reach out to Black voters in the swing state of Georgia. For GA, we're writing with the Team Unity GA coalition to registered Black voters in Georgia, where basic civil rights are threatened, to emphasize that their vote is consequential. Our postcards urge Early Voting to avoid overly long lines and other Election Day hazards Black voters have experienced due to targeted voter suppression.

To help voters understand a complex ballot, Center for Common Ground (our postcard partner) endorses ActiVote, a secure platform from a small team devoted to democracy and voter privacy. ActiVote provides ballot and polling info, ranks candidates in relation to a voter's surveyed views, and verifies registration, Voter ID, etc.

So pick up your packets, have fun writing, and don't forget to put your dot on the Tally Jar poster.

Looking Forward to September with a Newly Re-Vamped Kid's Connection

Even though the calendar year starts in January, for those of us who have spent our adult lives tending to the educational, spiritual, and emotional needs of children and youth, the new year really begins in or around September. The Family Ministry Team spent most of last year, the FY23-24 year, reconceptualizing our Kids' Connection program to better align with the number and ages of the children who tended to show up each week, as well as the human resources we had available to offer this experience for the children each Sunday.

As we rethought the program, we experimented with alternative versions of it. We made changes based upon how the children responded and discovered new ways to use the space available upstairs to better meet the needs of the children and provide the breadth of experiences we wanted them to have. This year, the FY24-25 year, we feel confident that we have beautiful and functional spaces for the children, with engaging materials that reflect our UU values. We hope to share these values with the children through rituals, readings, conversations, and most importantly, play.

We are proud of what we have to offer, so the time has come to shift our priorities to recruiting more children. Toward that end, we have three special events planned.

On Sunday, August 11, the service at UUCM will focus on the Kids' Connection program. I will present the message to the congregation on that day. The service, which is entitled Upstairs/Downstairs: Living and Learning Together, will describe the philosophical and UU values inherent in our Kids' Connection program. In addition, I will include photos and stories from "upstairs" that illustrate or reflect those philosophical and UU values.

On Sunday, September 8, National Grandparents' Day, we will have a Bring Your Grandkids to Church Day. The children's day will begin, as usual, downstairs in the sanctuary. After the congregation sings the children on their way to the tune of "This Little Light of Mine", we will convene upstairs to hear stories about grandparents and create special pieces of art to give to their grandparents.

On Sunday, September 15, we have scheduled a Kids' Connection Open House. We are reaching out to families


(for whom we have email addresses) that have attended Kids' Connection over the last year, and we hope to attract new families from the larger community who might be interested in our Kids' Connection program. The Open House will begin after the service at noon, and last until 1:00 or 1:30 PM. After the downstairs service, grownups will reconnect with their children upstairs where they will learn about our Kids' Connection program, take part in some UU-inspired routines and rituals, and most importantly, meet other families who participate in the Kids' Connection program. Lunch will be served.

We are hoping to involve the whole community in our efforts to get the word out about our amazing Sunday morning program for young and elementary school-aged children. Building this program should be an "Upstairs/Downstairs" endeavor. Help us get the word out to the larger Nevada County community!
