We begin the month by practicing the opening up of our imaginations, both playfully and meaningfully. On the second

Sunday, we apply our imaginations to our personal and our shared lives, informed by the difference between a boundary and a horizon. The third Sunday offers an anniversary that invites us to celebrate the imagination and the imaginers (or "imagineers," the term Chuck Champlin brings us from his experience working at Disney) that gave

birth to UUCM 30 years ago, and the imagination of UUCM's

newest members. As of this moment, the final May service is incubating in the wonderfully fertile imaginations of Lindsay Dunckel and Randy McKean. Imagine!

What's coming up in my memory are the many ways my seven siblings and I relied upon our imaginations for so much of our play. Truth be told, for so much of our lives. This was aided significantly by the fact that my family did not have a television during much of my childhood and teenage years, a conscious choice of my parents. Our imaginations were also called forth by the reality that our family did not have much money to spend beyond the essentials.

All of this, nurtured by my parents' encouragement, cultivated what I have come to appreciate as a tremendous life-long gift the ability to see beyond the obvious and the singular, to imagine new possibilities for what is already around us and for most anything within reach. Sometimes this manifests as an ability to make do with what we have, which is really about creatively making for ourselves what we don't have. And sometimes, it is the

This is my penultimate President's column before my term ends on June 30. While I'm not going to recite the stains and scars of this tumultuous year, I'm not going to ignore them, either. Mostly, I'm going to grieve the loss of faith that has

brought our nation to the brink of ruin in just a few short months.

Through the music of George Mann and Bodhi Busick, one of our most famous UUCM members, Utah Phillips, has been on our minds. Long ago, Phillips offered that he was a philosophical anarchist because he didn't need the government to tell him how to be a good person. I assume that he and his friends and associates had faith in the inherent goodness of people. That they would stick to their sides of the street when navigating the inroads and "out roads" of civilization, impelled by their shared faith to watch out for each other.

I first read of these Phillipsian ruminations in the early 70s,

shortly before scaling my own Mt. Everest-like challenge of personal shortcomings and law school. What I learned there was that Utah was right ... sort of. He expressed that being good and orderly was a matter of common sense, and I realized that the law was essentially the codification of that notion, to be consulted whenever the common part of our social senses required.

For the most part, our civil rules and regulations are society's way of erecting channel markers through the dark and confusing times when the course is not clear. The civil laws of a nation are its collective statements of faith - I'm not ignoring criminal laws, but those apply when the civil rules have been breached beyond genteel rehabilitation.

Our Founders had faith that the Constitution they crafted to breathe life into the new nation would forever guide and draw

us back to the bedrock commitment to steward and safeguard the common good. They were not naive. They recognized that the realization of their dream inevitably would require tripping and stumbling as the distractions of factionalism, selfishness, stupidity, and greed fought for dominance. But - and this is my projection - they held fast to faith that the agreement penned in Philadelphia would prove stronger than the barbarians at the gate.

the views of common people no longer resonate with the shared purposes that once animated the heart of the Republic. Today, what we regard as objectively true has to vie with and struggle against the plague of disinformation, the stock-intrade of corporate predators for which turmoil and doubt generate more profits than peace and tranquility.

Since the election, when the conflict between the real and the unimaginable exploded upon us, many people have struggled with their beliefs and faith in . . . everything. But knowledge, and the thirst for it, are the keys to everything. In response, our services have grown from a few empty seats in the sanctuary on any given Sunday to every seat filled and the Channing room pressed into service to accommodate some of the overflow. Zoom attendance may add over forty more attendees.



• Meet Phil Horning •

I grew up back east in Pleasantville, New York, a suburb of New York City. My mom taught nursery school and did oil paintings as a hobby. As a kid I liked to draw and did a few paintings. In high school I worked for a neighbor down the street and built a dry wall and installed landscaping. The interest in art and landscaping led me to pursue Landscape Architecture as a profession.

After graduating from Syracuse I joined the Peace Corps in Iran and worked there for four years designing and building city parks in Gonbade Kavoos and then worked for the Iranian National Park Service in Tehran. During this period, I did drawings when there was time and continued this when I traveled for nine months through most of Asia.

Upon my return to the United States, I worked for the U.S. Forest Service on four different forests in California and took a special assignment to Tasmania, Australia, to set up a visual management system for the Tasmanian Forestry Commission. Throughout my career I have had the opportunity to hike and ski in a wide range of mountainous and forested areas and these experiences have been an inspiration to me.

Now that I am retired, I paint scenes that I hope capture some of the experiences that I find inspiring. Some of those experiences include my time as a Peace Corps Volunteer. In those cases, I take pictures of my 50-year-old slides projected on a wall and then store them digitally. Sometimes it is the special lighting as the sun sets, sometimes it is the composition of ridges and mountain peaks that attracts me. One of my favorite activities is downhill and cross-country skiing so you will see several snow scenes.

Typically, my photos of snow capture the bright white during the middle of the day, so I change the shade and lighting in the paintings to create more interest. In other cases, it is the vivid colors of fall, or the dramatic motion associated with a large waterfall that I capture. It seems to me that Mother Nature provides endless opportunities, both dramatic and subtle, to observe amazing colors, shapes, textures, and compositions, and I just try to paint a few of these examples to share with others. Please enjoy."

One hot summer day a little girl climbed a silver poplar tree. The tree was old with an ancient trunk and sturdy branches. She had two best friends who helped her

build a treehouse in the silver poplar. When the house was finished it had a plank floor, plywood walls, and a piece of corrugated tin for a roof. The three friends constructed a ladder from the ground to the door of the treehouse using slats of wood nailed to the trunk of the tree.

The little girl liked to read. Sometimes she went to the treehouse alone and lay on her stomach and read until she fell asleep.

Ravens and magpies came to the tree. The birds squabbled and picked on each other and played and flew away and came back on broad wings, legs and feet dangling.

Tired of reading and feeling drowsy, the girl lay on her back and watched the birds, and she knew she could fly, too. She knew this the way she knew the heat of

summer on her skin and the relief of shade under thick, dark leaves.

Ravens and magpies flew to the river and the girl went with them. She ran across the ground, but her feet never touched down. She shared the air and the joyful

sensation of flight with wings as wide and black as the wings of the ravens.

The girl never remembered the day she realized she wasn't really flying. One day she just knew. She wasn't sad, because the memory of it was sweet and

unforgettable.

The girl got older and along the way she imagined many things. The world around her, what she watched and felt and absorbed, made her imagination all the more precious. In hard times she imagined how things would get better. There were times she took wing inside her head and dreamed, which is very like imagining.

The older she got, the more she could not fathom those around her who spoke harshly about imagining things, as if everything had to be dead-on factual and tangible and true and real.

They'd say, "Oh, you're imagining that. It isn't true."

The girl realized people who felt this way about the world had no safe place to go in times of struggle. Imagining things

didn't mean ignoring reality. The girl was wise to reality. She knew the meaning of contradictions and danger and sacrifice.

Now as an old woman she sometimes remembers flying. What a joy that was. How lucky to be able to fly if only for a while.

The First Signers of the UUCM Membership Book

In last month's Mountain Chalice History Corner, I documented the beginnings of UUCM. Please read that article to set the stage for this month!

This year is the 30th anniversary of the founding of UUCM. The first signing of a Membership Book (which UUCM still uses) took place on May 21, 1995. The May 18 service this month will honor the 29 "First Signers."

The following signers were the leaders in the beginning of UUCM; their photos can be found on the bulletin board hanging in the Hosea Ballou room (the old nursery). Please note that the accomplishments listed below reflect those that happened before 1995.

- Anita Wald-Tuttle is the only remaining current member from that first group. Anita brought the idea of an outreach meeting from the Auburn church which ultimately led to
 - the UUCM we know today. She also found speakers for the early meetings.
- John Church, a retired education administrator, quickly became the organizational leader. He also became the first Chair of the Planning Committee and President of the first Board.
- Maybelle Church, John's wife, supported John, was Planning Committee Membership Chair, served on the Caring Committee and the Refreshments Committee and helped with the mailing list.
- **Judy van der Veen** provided music for the Sunday services and was on the Program Committee.
- **John van der Veen** was on the Program, Religious Education, and Strategic Planning Committees.

- Leal Portis planned and ran the RE program for children in the lobby of the library and was on the Planning and Program Committees.
- Barbara Hoyt, who was not a member because of affiliation with Noetic Science, provided UUCM with the three paintings that now hang in the foyer and the Martin Luther King painting, as well as innumerable drawings for posters and orders of service.
 - Nancy Malmuth was on the Planning Committee and the Planning Committee for RE and provided leadership in spirituality.
 - Gini Merrill was on the Program Committee and served as the Historian, and as a Greeter. She also kept the phone list up-to-date and hosted meetings and picnics at her home.
 - Yvonne Strecjek had a strong feminist bent which led to a number of home-grown programs. The Women's Group encouraged her to enter the ministry at Starr King.

These ten First Signers and their partners were responsible for the incredible energy needed to create a UU church. Other First Signers contributed as well. Please enjoy the bulletin board in the Hosea Ballou room (the old

nursery). It should be up by May 1.

The First Signers will be honored along with new members who have joined in 2024 and 2025 in the Sunday, May 18 service. Current members will have the opportunity to sign a special 30th Anniversary Book following the service and continuing through June. Helpers will assist members in their honorary signing of the Anniversary Book in the Hosea Ballou Room. Please stop by to take part in the signing. (Note that this signing opportunity is not related in any way to each current member's signing of the original UUCM Membership book. This ceremony honors UUCM's growth from 29 original signers to a robust 133 current members.

Get out the Vote Postcard Update


TIME TO START MAILING TO VIRGINIA!

The time has come to start mailing your postcards to Virginia voters! Because Virginia has 45 days of early voting we have until May 30 to get them in the mail, but the sooner the better. Although we'd been told that there were no more address lists to be had, we managed to find enough to make 25 more packets (bringing our Virginia total to 4,400!) You'll find them on the postcard table in the foyer.

So, what's next? Virginia's November general election. That campaign begins in July and will have 900,000 addresses available. You'll have the month of June to rest your writing hands and refill your colored ink supply before they begin again the next round of this important work.

Perhaps you are new to our Get Out the Vote postcard campaigns. UUCM is combating voter suppression one postcard at a time. We sent 3,000 cards to Black voters in Wisconsin to inform them about the issues at stake in the Wisconsin Supreme Court election. Did you know that Wisconsin is a voter suppression state? Well, it is!

Now we are writing 4,400 postcards to registered Black voters in Virginia who did not vote in November. Our nonpartisan postcards invite them to protect jobs, healthcare, housing, voting rights and reproductive health for Black families in Virginia by voting in the June 17 primary election. Research shows that these postcards not only increase the voter turnout for the primary, but increased primary voting in turn increases the turnout in the following general election.



We make it as easy as we can for our postcard writers, assembling 20 stamps, 20 postcards, and other supplies into packets. Writers who can reimburse UUCM for the \$12 cost of the packets. Folks who support the work but aren't writing donate \$\$ to cover the costs of writers who cannot. Contact gailjv@uugrassvalley.org for more information.




