Meeting the Moment

As we move into summer, the human universe seems to have taken on the familiar dynamics of our local fire season: tinder-dry accumulated loads ever at risk of igniting, already burning, or being addressed (in hopes of containment) by both professional and volunteer firefighters and other first responders. Plus, fires are being lit intentionally and continually by those trying to ensure a narrower ordering of humanity and/or power and wealth in the future. It's a fear-inducing, sometimes (or often) overwhelming set of challenges to body and soul these days. What's a UU to do?

I am writing this on my way home from the annual gathering of Unitarian Universalists, called General Assembly, throughout which we were invited to "meet the moment." But not with anyone's predetermined answers. The leadership of our Unitarian Universalist Association is embodying the truth of our interdependence, inviting all of us, including you, to bring our insight and lived experience to the table so that we can best meet the moment together. We are invited to a communal praxis, meaning a continual cycle of shared reflection that leads to learning that leads to action, that then calls forth new reflection, launching the cycle again. We are invited to engage this cycle at large and at very local scales, meaning right here, among us.

First, to ask together, What is the Moment We Are In?

Followed by, What are the Most Urgent and Important Needs of this Moment?

Then, What do our Values Call Us to Do in Response to this Moment?

As some of our faith leaders have written, "The heart of our faith transcends cultural shifts and political trends. But at key moments throughout the centuries, our religious ancestors have also always been willing to transform themselves and their faith to meet the needs of the moment – to let go of what no longer serves, to open to new possibilities, to seize opportunities and lean into aspiration and innovation. At our best, Unitarian Universalists are both deeply grounded in our core values and shared commitments and nimble enough to respond to the challenges and opportunities that emerge in rapidly changing times."

I name this here, at the entrance to summer:

- to lift up that meeting the moment requires all of us, not just known leaders or experts, to understand well what "the moment" is. We are so in this together.
- to note that there are deeply spiritual, deeply relational, and deeply political layers to this moment, to its most urgent and important needs, and to what our values call us to do in response. Both inward-facing and outwardfacing aspects (spiritual and relational/political aspects) are crucial as well as linked.
- to invite you into these conversations, in all the ways they can and will unfold at UUCM, in our wider community, and in our faith tradition. What we can see, know, learn, and do is lessened without your voice and your insight.

It's going to be a real fire season for the foreseeable future, with or without our permission. Preparedness can help (go bags and evacuation plans and keeping personal gas tanks mostly full), and our mitigation efforts may genuinely reduce the risk and damage for ourselves and vulnerable others, but in the end, I expect we are going to keep finding ourselves at new front edges, at the next moment that needs defining, identifying the new urgent and important needs and what we're called to do in response.

Here's to the practice and praxis ahead, developing the heart, the spirit, the muscle to keep meeting the moment, ever and ever more wisely, nimbly, and deeply.

Meet Gail Schulz

"I started needlework when I was 5, just the cross stitch on stamped pillow cases, taught to me by my grandmother. I enjoyed it, but did not keep it up.

Years later, in about 1993, I was doing a lot of trips to London on business. One day I wandered into Harrod's and saw a display of needlework kits. Since I did not like to watch movies on those trans-Atlantic flights, the light bulb went on, and I bought a small kit that I could work on the plane. I really found it relaxing.

When I retired in 1997, we moved to Charleston, South Carolina. And I saw a notice in the local newspaper about a meeting of the local Needlepoint Guild, and I promptly went. They were getting ready for a class with a visiting teacher, and I was fascinated. I realized that there were techniques I needed to learn, and all kinds of challenges to take on. That was the real beginning.

I quickly realized that I love to do complex pieces and projects. It seems that the same part of my brain that thrived on dealing with complex regulatory systems as a lawyer would also thrive dealing with complex designs and projects. I'm still at it, and I love the challenges, the work with color, and the sense of accomplishment."

Summer 1995 UUCM News

In the June article from The History Corner, we left the UUCM story on a high note. Enthusiasm for moving forward with the steps toward UUA approval continued into the summer. However, leadership was about to change. Anita had agreed to help her husband Bill Tuttle with his summer tennis engagements. Bill, at age 82, was a well-respected and talented tennis player in his senior age group. He had just won the championship at the El Dorado Senior Tennis Tournament

in May and was ranked number 29 in the country in the 80-85 age group.

So how was it that Bill Tuttle was able to lure Anita away from her beloved fledging group? Bill was very active in the Auburn church (Sierra Foothills UU). In fact, he was one of the group of four who started the church. He had moved to Nevada City after living in Walnut Creek and being a UU at the Mt. **Diablo Unitarian Universalist** Church. He wanted to be near family, so he found a home in Nevada City and began participating in the SFUU. Anita had lost her husband shortly after moving to Grass Valley and was attending SFUU when Bill's wife died. Bill asked Anita if she would be his hostess for the soirees at his

house that he periodically organized. She agreed. Anita was between housing when Bill said she could stay temporarily at his house. This arrangement was so successful that they eventually got married.

The group that started meeting in early 1994 first met at Bill and Anita's house. Bill had deep allegiance to SFUU, including a large investment in a piece of land that SFUU owned in anticipation of building a church on it. Bill supported Anita and her new group but continued his attachment to SFUU. In fact, he did not join UUCM until August 2, 1998. By that time the SFUU land had been sold because it became obvious there would be two churches, one in Auburn and one in Grass Valley/Nevada City. After he left SFUU he supported this new fledgling church with very generous pledges and donations.

During the spring of 1995, Anita had been keeping her eye on the ideal candidate to lead the group when she was away: John Church, who with his wife Maybelle, was a member of Anita's group who had recently retired from a high-level

position in education. John readily agreed to Anita's request. So, circumstances aligned to allow Anita and Bill to spend a good part of the summer of 1995 with each other, knowing that the group would be well taken care of.

The UUCM people were also enjoying the summer. The newsletter listed a Music Workshop, a campout at Chapman Creek including a Kentucky Mine concert with folksinger David Maloney, and a potluck barbecue and beach/pool party at Lake Wildwood. The group energy was strengthened by these opportunities to bond with each other. John and Maybelle also attended the annual UUA General Assembly in Spokane, Washington.

When I think of Mark Grove, I think of his music.

I also think of failing to see him when he comes into the UUCM building unless he is wearing the hat he always wears. When he is hatless, I have to look twice to be sure it's him. I know Mark to be understated, shy, always direct, and funny. In a short span of time, and through his generous nature, he has become an integral part of the Unitarian Universalist Community of the Mountains.

Mark arrived at UUCM when Reverand Kevin Tarsa was on sabbatical. It was, for Mark, a critical turning point, a time in his life when he was looking for a place to experience community and contribute something of himself. UUCM has become the ideal place for him to flourish.

Mark grew up in Pennsylvania where as a child he was immersed in the natural world. He says he wishes his parents had insisted he focus on a specific skill. Instead, they put no restrictions on what he showed an interest in. They had no expectation of his choosing one pursuit over another. This approach to raising a child might be seen as detrimental. After all, children are supposed to pick a profession and stick to it. In Mark's case, his freedom to explore possibilities provided him with a range of skills he wouldn't have otherwise. He was twelve when his interest in music started to develop. He now plays a variety of instruments. His wife Heather is a professional pianist, a singer, and a song writer.

Watching Mark by the podium playing his double-bass is just one aspect of his overall presence. There is a lot more to his involvement with UUCM. Much of what he does goes uncelebrated, and he likes it this way. A lot of the volunteers at UUCM are like Mark. They go about doing what they do without much visibility.

Mark received a Viticulture degree at the University of California, Davis and entered the California wine industry. He worked as a winemaker for several wineries in Northern California and eventually became the wine producer for the State of California with E&J Gallo. He gave up this enterprise to find a deeper sense of purpose.

These days Mark is everywhere at once. He expresses being overextended, and this is probably true. It is not an uncommon state for new members to find themselves in. People usually explore a variety of possibilities and figure out where they can make a difference. This is certainly Mark's goal.

Most members of UUCM may not be interested in dancing to Mark's music, but they definitely hear him play.

A Tribute to Carol Hyndman

"A friend is someone who likes you." (Quote from The Nutshell Library, by Maurice Sendak)

Carol was cautious about making friends. Getting to know her and gain her trust required patience. Once gained, Carol's friendship was guaranteed forever.

Carol regularly came to a writing group I facilitate at UUCM. She shared her writing with members of the group and what she wrote was never predictable. She wrote an essay on dandelions, her favorite flower, and a description of a pond where every animal, from a dragonfly to a basking turtle, played a significant role.

Carol had a menagerie consisting of a tortoise named Mr. T., a box turtle named Flower, and numerous cats. Mr. T. was in her life for forty years. She kept hedgehogs, nourished baby birds until they flew away, officiated at animal blessing ceremonies, and took in abandoned cats regardless of how many cats she already had. She cared especially for cats nobody wanted because they were sick and needed medication.

She cared about people, too. She was deeply empathetic and attentive when someone needed support. As her friend I felt comfortable reaching out to her when I was distressed.

Carol was unique in ways both expansive and particular. I miss the person who made it clear what her priorities were, and I also miss the person who regularly wore a backpack decorated with a stuffed white unicorn.

Knowing Carol, being her friend, was a gift.

Time to Order Postcard Packets for Virginia State General Elections

Postcarding for the General Election begins July 27. The price of postcard stamps is going from 56 to 62 cents on July 12! Now is the time for

me to stock up on stamps and postcards. After the Virginia Primary, we will be writing for the Virginia General Election and then, in 2026, the midterms. It's never been more important to turn out every vote, and we have our work cut out for us. It's going to be a busy year ahead.

VIRGINIA GENERAL ELECTION THIS FALL:

We will be launching the Virginia General Election Campaign on Sunday, July 27 with packets available at UUCM. Let me know if you'd like to help assemble the packets on Saturday July 26.

You'll have lots of time to write as the mail date will be September 15 to October 20. Virginia is a bellwether state and this year, they will be electing a Governor, Lt. Governor, and the entire House of Delegates. We'll be part of writing to all 918,860 registered Black voters and it's so important that we reach all of them. It might be a good time to start planning a couple outdoor postcard writing parties while the weather is warm and sunny!

As the price of stamps goes up, so does the cost of the postcard packets. (Cost of postcards went up, too.) UUCM underwrote the last increase in stamp cost by \$2/per packet to the tune of \$3,300 in 2024, beyond what our writers contributed (plus the full packet cost for writers who needed the financial help.) We just don't have the funds to keep that up. In my last email I let you know we were going to have to increase the cost of the packets from \$10 to \$12. We will continue to seek donations to cover the "scholarships" for those who can write but not cover their own costs.

My plan is to load up on stamps before July 12. That means I need to front the cost. Tens of thousands of stamps at \$.56 each is a lot, so if you haven't already, I am asking you to tell me how many packets you plan to do for the Virginia Primary and the 2026 midterms. That's how many stamps I will buy at \$.56. Please also let me know whether or not you will be able to cover the cost of \$12 per packet. If possible, it would be extremely helpful if you could reimburse UUCM for the packets you plan to do by July 1. I will have a postcard reimbursement jar in the foyer of UUCM along with envelopes for cash and checks on which to write your name. Donations above covering costs are warmly welcomed from writers and non-writers.

Note: cost of packets requested after the increase in stamp price will be \$13 to cover the \$1.20 increase of the 20 stamps.





Two Big Kids and a Toddler Walk Into a Sanctuary

During the summer months, the number of children attending our Kids' Connection program on any given Sunday diminishes, understandably so. Nevada County living beckons with all that it has to offer during these vibrantly sunny months. Even so, we have some lovely days upstairs with the children who do find their way to us.

One Sunday, in early June, two big kids (five-year-olds) and a toddler (less than two years old) walked into our little sanctuary. That day provided me with a serene and heartwarming experience as I saw how these three children have taken ownership of the rituals we use in our little service upstairs each Sunday morning. As we left the downstairs sanctuary to the tune of This Little Light of Mine, the two five-year-olds darted up the stairs, while the toddler and I, hand in hand, took our time negotiating each big stair-step together. By the time we got into the sanctuary, the five-year-olds were well into the process of building our altar. This altar building routine has become so meaningful and familiar to them that they do not need any adult prompting or direction to carry it out. This ritual is one I am certain they will remember when they are old enough to have kids of their own.





That idea is one that guides Lindsay and me as we think about the learning experiences we create for the children. How can we create experiences that are powerful enough that they become integrated into the children's very identity as UUs?

> On this day in early June, the building of the altar went on and on. The two older kids collaborated with each other, discussing their thoughts and decisions about which pieces to include and how to arrange them. The toddler eventually thought "enough already," and she sat down to read a book to herself while the other two dithered on about the placement of pinecones, feathers, and stars. Eventually, all three of them agreed that the altar was complete, and we celebrated with a group photo. You can see the pride of accomplishment in the faces and the thumbs up stances of the two older children, the primary designers of the altar on this day.

I am absolutely ebullient when we have energetic days with 12 children upstairs. And, days like this one in early June, when two big kids and a toddler walked into our sanctuary, are also heartwarming because they provide moments of closeness and intimacy in our connections with each other. No matter what, the spirit of Unitarian Universalism sustains all that we are and do with each other upstairs in our Kids' Connection program on Sunday mornings.
