This nice photo of your new Board of Trustees was taken on July 11, 2025, at our retreat. We took the day to get to know each other and to reflect on how we can focus our work and lead UUCM into the future. We also reflected on meaningful experiences we had at UUCM to remind ourselves of what we love about being a part of this congregation.

First a word about our Board members. *Gail Schulz* is our most senior member and is ending her second three-year term as Treasurer. With Taylor gone, we're down to one retired attorney on the Board. ## Articles of Incorporation, Bylaws, Passing the Flame, and a Change of Location

During August 1995 the momentum continued toward UUCM becoming an 'official' church. An Articles of Incorporation document is legally required for a church to obtain non profit status. It is a relatively straight forward document for

non profit organizations. It required signatures of those vested in the organization. UUCM's document was signed by members of the Boards. The Articles document was filed on November 30, 1995.

The bylaws were a bit more complicated because this document established organizational structure. UUCM's original was eight pages long and was modeled after the bylaws of two other UU churches. The current bylaws for UUCM have 14 pages and has been updated 14 times (the last time being in January 2025).

The Bylaws Committee had been established in March, 1995. The Committee proposed a deadline of the end of July. Initially there was no section on the Minister. However, the team was certain UUCM would eventually have a minister so Article VIII was included.

UUCM had also organized itself into committees to do the work of the group early in 1995. The organizational Chart showed the Planning Committee at the head with John Church as Chair and 11 members. The Committees were RE, Finance, Program, Membership and Publicity with two ad hoc committees – Bylaws and Long Range Planning. Each committee had developed time lines for reaching goals through February 1996. The Planning Committee dissolved when the first Board was elected on September 24, 1995. The Board consisted of John Church as President, Bonnie Bennett as President-Elect, Jeanie Faulk as Secretary, John van der Veen as Treasurer, and Sarah Heinsel, Paul Malmuth, and Dave Marsden as At-Large. The Committees continued on as before after the election of the Board.

BY-LAWS UNITARIAN UNIVERSALIST COMMUNITY OF THE MOUNTAINS Article I. Name The name of our religious society is Unitarian Universalist Community of the Mountain Article II. Purpose The purpose of our Community is to foster liberal religious living through worship, study, service and fellowship. We seek the enjoyment of religion founded upon devotion to individual freedom of belief. Relying upon reason as our guide, and upon freedom as our method, we seek to grow in understanding of ourselves and of our world, to promote and serve the universal Article III. Membership and Friends Eligibility. Membership is open to any person regardless of creed, race, age, gender, exual orientation, ethnic and national origin, social status, economic status, marital status, disability. Membership. Active members are those who have signed the membership book and made an annual contribution of record. They may vote 60 days after signing the book. Acrive members are the only ones included in the population count of the society. Withdrawal. Individuals shall be removed from the membership roll when 1) they request in writing to be removed; 2) they move out of the area, unless they specifically request to remain as 3) they have not made a contribution of record since the previous annual meeting and do not make such a contribution when contacted by the Secretary of the Board of Trustees or a designated representative of the congregation Friends. Friends of the congregation are those who are not members but who actively support the congregation through pledging and/or non-voting participation in programs and Article IV. Denominational Affiliation Our Community is a member of the Unitarian Universalist Association and of the Pacific Central District. It is the intention of our congregation to make annual fair share financial commit to the Association and the District. Article V. Fiscal Year. The fiscal year of the Unitarian Universalist Community of the Mountains shall be July 1 through June 30.

**UUCM By-Laws in 1995** 

Article VIII had seven subsections. These subsections have remained through the years with some additions and changes of wording. The bylaws were accepted by the Board on July 31 and were passed at a congregational meeting on August 6 with only two small changes. The original bylaws lasted seven years with the first amending occurring on May 19, 2002.

The twice-a-month Sunday afternoon meeting was at the library in Nevada City. There was growing sentiment for a different space with more room, more storage and a larger space for RE and to have services every week. Beginning on September 24, 1995, UUCM began meeting at the Nevada City Elementary School in Nevada City. The group also began having services every week on Sunday at 4:00 PM. The Passing of the Flame service with the Sierra Foothills church which took place in Auburn at SFUU on October 22, 1995 established UUCM as a completely separate group from SFUU.

There is a new bulletin board display now located on the History bulletin board in the small room off the coffee room. The subject is the various places that the group met in 1994-1995 and the presentations that were offered at the Sunday

services. Please continue your 1995 UUCM history lesson by enjoying the bulletin board.


## Food for the Soul

When I was little my family rode on the Atchison, Topeka, and Santa Fe Railroad in the summers, going east to Chicago and back west to our ranch in New Mexico. My grandfather was often with us. He loved trains.

Grandpa had a private car, a caboose at the very end of the train. When we traveled together Grandpa often invited me for dinner. The caboose was as no ordinary caboose. It was fitted out with brass fixtures, a table with a linen tablecloth, candlesticks, real silver forks, knives and spoons and beautiful plates with flowers on them. I watched while Grandpa cooked dinner. We had creamed spinach, lamb chops with tiny white hats on them, mashed potatoes, puffy dinner rolls with lots of butter and ice cream for dessert.

Looking back on those dinners I remember how proud I was to be with my grandpa. I felt whole and I was happy.

Edna, the cook on our ranch, tended a half-acre vegetable garden. One of my chores as a child was to help her pick peas, green beans, onions, and strawberries. My favorite were the onions. I crawled on my stomach along the rows of onions, pulling one every now and then and chomping on it. I washed the dirt off at a faucet by the fence.

I still taste the onions and I still hear Edna saying there will be no onions for the pea soup if I keep on eating them.

The sun was hot on my back in the garden. Flies were a constant distraction. I forgot about the heat and the flies. Working with Edna in the garden was a time of peace. I was safe.

And then there was Mrs. Trujillo. She and her husband cut and delivered firewood. The Trujillo's were poor. My family was well-off and the pantry in our kitchen was full.



I have enduring memories of meals where there was no table and the flatware was plastic.

The Navajo People live in Canyon de Chelly in the summers, their ancestral home. They cook meals over wood fires under stands of cottonwoods. Darkness falls and fireflies dance in the willows by the stream. Meat from a butchered lamb and fried potatoes were the usual dinner-fare. Breakfast was fried potatoes and tortillas.

Under the trees with my Navajo family, I scraped every morsel of food off my tin plate. My heart and my stomach were always full. I knew I belonged and I was content.

I started stealing canned goods out of the pantry and taking them to Mrs. Trujillo. She never let me go home without giving me something in return for what I'd given her. It might have been a few roasted green chilies or tortillas wrapped up in a small piece of cloth.

My crimes were never discovered, although I am certain Edna knew. Mrs. Trujillo's smile, the food she gave me, changed me forever. A deep sense of satisfaction arose in my soul for having given her a gift she really needed.

# VIRGINIA POSTCARD BLAST OFF

It's been a wild ride with lots of atmospheric interference, but they can't slow down the UUCM Get-Out-The-Vote Postcard Campaign. The nation is watching what happens in the Virginia General Election this fall. Once again we will do our part to see that all registered Black voters in Virginia know the critical issues at

stake and how to find the info they need to get to the polls. Our goal for this campaign is 6,000 postcards.

#### WHY DOES THIS STATE ELECTION MATTER?

Virginia is considered a bellwether state for the 2026 midterms. To understand the impact of Reclaim Our Vote (ROV) postcarding, the historic comparison shows that "likely African-American" voters' turnout in the 2024 primary was 16,992; in 2025 (after our ROV campaign) it was 44,374...more than double! Virginia has seen thousands of its citizens lose their jobs due to DOGE, and a 350% increase in immigrant arrests, more than any other state.

Packets of 20 postcards, stamps, info labels, script, and samples will be available starting Sunday, July 27. Many of you have already ordered your packets for a total of 5,000 postcards ordered! Those packets will have your name on them and will be waiting for you on the left end of the postcard table in the foyer. Others of you prefer to sign out single packets from the postcard table. You will find those on the right end.

Many of you know that the price of postcard stamps went up again on July 13. It now costs UUCM \$13 for each packet. We are so grateful for those of you who can and do reimburse us that amount for each packet. We are also very grateful for those of you who donate funds to cover the costs of the writers who can't. As usual you will find a large jar on the postcard table and small envelopes for your checks or cash. (Please make sure to mark cash with your name so we know which packets have been paid for and who to credit for the donation.)



So many of the activities that are available for the grownups who make up our UUCM congregation are also available for our children who attend Kids' Connection upstairs on Sunday mornings. For example, just as the grownups often gather together downstairs to share their spirits and energy while working side by side on their individual art or craft projects, so do our children. On one Sunday in mid-July, four of our youngsters chose on their own to sit together while they painted. I was heartened as I watched them share materials and talk to each other about their artistic decisions related to the pieces they were producing. Even more impressive to me were their conversations about their lives more generally. I was witnessing evidence of community and connection in action.

The children's needs for community and connection are as palpable as the grownups' needs for community and connection. Upstairs we have beautiful, well-supplied spaces and a thoughtfully designed program that meets our children's needs just as the grownups have spaces and supplies and programs available downstairs that meet their varied needs.

I'd like to close by suggesting that the deeply appreciated adults who spend time upstairs in service to our children and the Kids' Connection program are quick to acknowledge that their own needs for community and connection are met on a regular basis through their Family Ministry service.
