UUCM Acquires Squirrel Creek Property to Support Growing Congregation

Grass Valley, CA – The Unitarian Universalist Community of the Mountains (UUCM), a liberal faith tradition, has purchased the property at 12582 Squirrel Creek Rd., marking a new chapter after 25 years at its South Church Street location. Recent growth has created a need for more space for services and community events.

The purchase, finalized after a December 7th congregational vote, involved close collaboration with Bethel Church and overcoming insurance and legal hurdles. The transaction was completed on schedule thanks to swift action by all parties.

New Covenant Baptist Church will remain as tenant until March 20, 2026 while UUCM prepares for transition, including selling the 246 South Church Street building and planning a capital campaign.

UUCM has been led by Reverend Kevin Tarsa since 2016. "As more and more people with progressive values look for meaningful connection, the new campus will allow UUCM to live its values more fully, serving the wider community as well as those who are seeking a liberal religious home. The thought of a larger facility has already been liberating energy and ideas and I look forward to discovering what this property will make possible."

Lay Pastoral Care Team

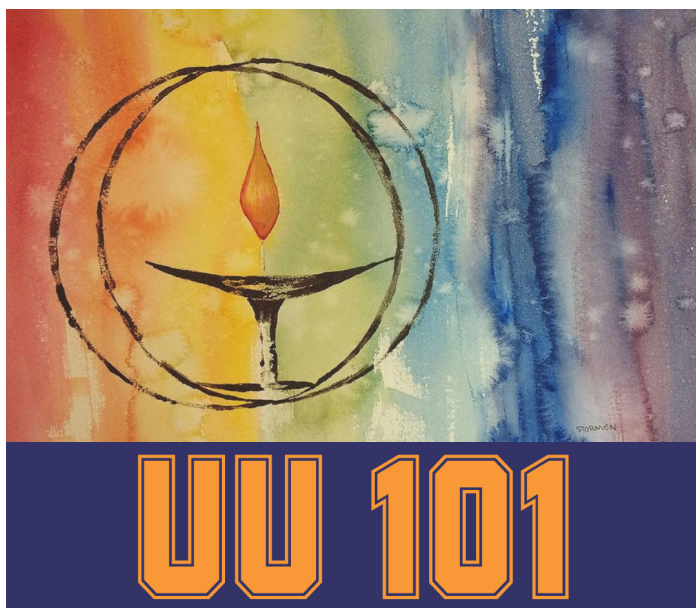
ARE YOU FACING A LIFE CHALLENGE?

Honoring Member Joel Houtman

Celebration of Life on Saturday, January 24, 2026 at 2:00 PM

Joel Houtman liked to say he was born a child in South Dakota, despite lack of photographic evidence. He was born to second generation Dutch-Friesian parents and the fifth of six children. His favorite memories from childhood included fostering an orphaned raccoon and shooting gophers (ineptly) with his dog Zip.

Despite being told by a high school counselor to forget about college because he was a mediocre student, Joel graduated from South Dakota State University with a physics degree. He began working on his master's in physics at University of Colorado at Boulder. While in college, Joel found his voice and life long passion for social justice.

His induction into the army during the Vietnam War ended his graduate education, but not his anti-war activism. His proudest memory from his army service was joining GI's United and legally circulating a successful anti-Vietnam petition at Fort Huachuca. They successfully obtained 3000 signatures out of 8000 personnel stationed on the base.

After his army days, Joel joined a fledgling truss company owned by the Hanson brothers as a draftsman. Deciding engineering was physics for slow learners, Joel studied briefly, then aced the civil engineering test, and was soon leading the engineering department at Hanson Truss. He spent the next several years designing the truss software that helped Hanson Truss to become a successful company. He continued to work for Hanson Truss for three decades.

During this time Joel met his future wife Theresa. Joel gained three adult children and became the grandfather to eight. Joel was lovingly involved and supportive of his family his entire life. Being a grandfather was one of his greatest joys.

Joel and Theresa also traveled extensively and visited over thirty countries. Their adventures included hiking the Camino de Santiago in Spain, sailing down the Mekong



River from Cambodia to Vietnam, and visiting Cuba, which was one of his life-long dreams.

Joel discovered woodworking and created exquisite furniture pieces that he generously shared with friends and family. In the late 90s, Joel and Theresa designed and built a home on the central coast that included his cabinetry and reclaimed maple floors. The home was gradually filled with the

beautiful furniture he built. He especially enjoyed building a tree house, cribs, desks, and a sewing center for his step-children and grandkids.

In 2005, Joel and Theresa moved to Grass Valley. They embraced the Unitarian Universalist Community of the Mountains as their spiritual family. Joel loved his men's and humanism groups. He served as Treasurer and on many committees, including social justice, and of course he built furniture and a wooden logo for the church.

During his four year journey with Parkinson's, Joel's community surrounded him and Theresa with love and support. They never had to worry about how to get to doctor's visits or if Joel would have someone to visit with.

Joel left this world on his birthday, as he predicted he would, with the dignity and wit he demonstrated throughout his life. Joel was surrounded by his friends, wife, and beloved dog as he transitioned from this life. His passion for social justice and his love for the wonders of science were with him until the very end. Joel's intelligence, kindness, and sense of humor will be greatly missed by his family and friends.

Jenny Dewey

"A long career writing and illustrating books for children has given me deep satisfaction. The artwork I am exhibiting here is not from my books. I've assembled a group of pictures showing progression from my early work to the present day. The dates from past to present will be posted underneath each picture. Also, the medium will be described.

At present, I experiment with creating new images fresh from my imagination. Most are a reflection of no longer being obliged to abide by rules associated with illustrating books. I have the freedom to figure out what the pictures mean - which includes being aware they simply are, without any meaning attached."

Tamar Shaddeau

"The word I use to describe my work is multimedia. I am at my best when free to use whatever materials are at hand. These are often 'found objects.' I love knowing I have no rules to follow, other than my own.

When I see river rocks, I may want to take one home and turn it into an image. The same goes for having an idea requiring metal, wood, paper or clay.

I'm trained as a graphic designer. My study of graphic design informs the art I do today. However, I feel free to depart from strict rules associated with graphic design."



Marking Time

A Special Feature by Jenny Dewey

Zozobra, or Old Man Gloom, is a 75-foot marionette, made of shredded paper, set on fire one night a year to celebrate renewal and bright hopes for the future. The burning of Zozobra is tradition in Santa Fe New Mexico, where I grew up. I was ten when I was tall enough to participate in Zozobra celebrations as a "Gloomlet." Gloomlets wore white sheets with eyeholes and danced around Zozobra's feet before he was burned.

The wrangler on our ranch had a warning for me: "Don't get yourself set on fire."

Burning Old Man Gloom is one of a multitude of traditions around the world held annually to celebrate rebirth. Traditions range from the bizarre to deeply spiritual.

Five thousand years ago, hunter-gatherer societies linked hope for renewal to cycles of life, to sunrise and sunset, and the position of stars in the sky.

Four thousand years ago, in Babylon, an eleven-day festival called Akitu was held to celebrate the Spring Equinox, the return of light over darkness.

The name January comes from a Roman god named Janus, a two-faced deity. Janus looked forward to the return of light, and he looked back on darkness. He represented the transition from winter to spring.

What is entertaining, if not educational, is the way cultures around the world enjoy particular ways to "Ring out the old and ring in the new."

In Romania people drive out evil spirits and welcome good ones by dressing up as bears and dancing to drums and flutes. In Denmark people smash dishes. The house with the biggest heap of broken crockery is considered the luckiest.



In Brazil people "jump waves" to bring on better times. In Spain people eat twelve grapes, one each for the last twelve minutes before the new year begins. Oysters and champagne are consumed in France (what else for the French!). In Columbia people run around with empty suitcases hoping to fill them with good luck. People go ice-fishing in Canada. Many Latin American countries believe wearing colorful underwear brings good times. The Irish go up and down streets banging on pots.

A tiny Micronesian island in the Pacific Ocean known as Christmas Island (Kiritmati) is the first inhabited location where the new year officially begins – one full day before Times Square in New York City is jammed with people waiting for the ball to drop.

Lambing season begins in early January on the Navajo Reservation; lambing ewes bleat and sheep dogs circle protectively. Lambs drop on cold ground softened with fresh hay. The people watch. Children's eyes are wide in amazement.

Rebirth. This is how our time is marked, ripe with opportunities for better things to come.

Bending the Arc Task Force: YOUR POSTCARDS MADE A DIFFERENCE!

Once again UUCMers lived our values by confronting voter suppression through our 2025 Reclaim Our Vote postcard campaign. Our postcards to get out the vote for the Wisconsin Supreme Court, and the Virginia primary and general elections totaled 15,547, and boy! The results showed our efforts matter. Good job!!

2026 is a critical midterm election year, and our partners at Center for Common Ground are already planning voter contact campaigns in Virginia, Georgia, North Carolina, Alabama, and Texas, plus Wisconsin Supreme Court elections. Mark Your Calendar

CFCG expects to start the 2026 campaign with this year's Wisconsin Supreme Court elections (April 7, 2026). Once again, it is a critically important event. We are likely to get addresses and scripts in February. I'll keep you posted as we know more.

They also let us know Virginia may hold a special election in April to draw new congressional maps (similar to California's recent redistricting election). If this happens, we'll be mobilizing voters for a statewide ballot initiative.

The Intercultural Development Inventory (IDI) is a research-based assessment that supports individuals and congregations in understanding how we engage cultural differences and how we can grow toward greater inclusion, equity, and belonging.

WHAT DOES PARTICIPATION INCLUDE?

- At-home online assessment (approximately 20–25 minutes)
- Confidential results, shared only between the participant and the Qualified Administrator
- One-on-one post-assessment debrief with individualized guidance
- Personalized intercultural development plan
- Optional monthly IDI discussion groups to support ongoing learning and practice

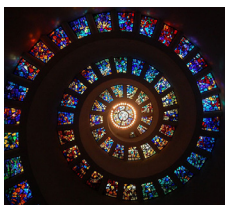

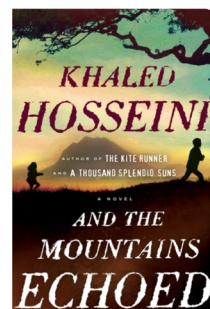

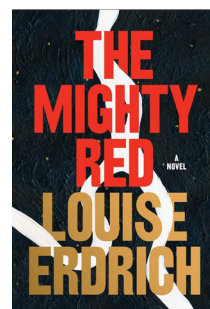

Looking Forward in 2026 – The OWL Program

As we begin a new calendar year, we all look forward to new endeavors, new adventures, new projects. Family Ministry is no exception to this forward-looking spirit. This year we are looking forward to bringing the OWL program to our youth. "What is the OWL program?" I imagine some of you are asking that question.

Well, the acronym OWL stands for Our Whole Lives. It is an educational program "that fosters informed, responsible, and values-based decisions about sexual health and behavior." The OWL curriculum is a collaborative publication from the Unitarian Universalist Association and the United Church of Christ. While the entirety of the OWL program is designed to address issues across the life span, ranging from very young children to senior citizens, the specific course that we will start up at UUCM in January 2026 will focus on middle school youth (grades 7-9). This effort to serve the youth associated with UUCM will also serve as a collaboration between UUCM and SFUU (Sierra Foothills Unitarian Universalists). Lindsay Dunckel, who participated in a training designed to prepare facilitators for OWL courses, will work with a representative from the Auburn Family Ministry team. Our youth will have the opportunity to connect with the SFUU youth as they explore issues related to human sexuality that are appropriate for this middle school cohort. The participants in this OWL program will meet weekly over the course of the winter and spring months. If you have questions about the program, especially if you have a young person from one of the middle school grades who might want to participate in this program, please contact Lindsay Dunckel at familyministry@uugrassvalley.org.
